This week saw the inauguration of a new Governor of Texas. James V. Allred of Wichita Falls is the thirtysecond Governor of the State. Last year when he was cam

paigning for office, he promises a "new deal from a new deck." Indications at the outset of the Governor administration are that Texas

will see a different administration than it has had in many years. And, we hope, a better one.

Allred goes into office less fettered with political promises, less handicapped by political tradition, than any govecnor of the present generation. His election was not accomplished by any of the political strategy which has marked recent campaigns. Rather it was through sheer force of personality and an ability to hew out a new course which the people of Texas-at least a sufficient minority-approved.

Alfred is 35 years old-one of the two young Covernors selected by Texans in recent years. And for this reason, he has been compared rather freely with Dan Moody. But Moody rode into office through a circumstance of prejudice and the chance that made him the selection of established political factions, and thus the choice of the people. Allred had no such advantage. In fact, he saw much of the alignment that supported Moods in the opposition camp before the campaign ended.

Aside from a possibly unfortunate venture into the Speakership race during the past few weeks, Alfred goes into office without bitterness, and with the best wishes of the people. Even the Fergusons, his most outspoken opponents of a few months ago, were by his side as he assumed office, in fact if not in spirit, and it was a good sign.

The State needs wise government probably more than at any period of its history in the past. Behind him is an enviable reputation, but ahead of the new Governor is a tremendous task. It is the hope of all that he performs

But almost every driver has implicit faith in his ability to meet any possible emer-

Added to these factors, Mr. Long says, is the crucial problem of the drunken driver, with us during prohibition as well as now. While statistics so far available have not proved drunkenness to be the outstanding cause of accidents, many cities have reported substantial increases in accidents involving persons who have been drinking.

There also is indicated a relaxing of law enforcement in many parts of the country. Appropriations have been seriously reduced, many police departments are inadequately manned, and morale has suffered.



### Old-Age Pensions

(Fort Worth Star-Telegram) One of the factors contributing to the increased likelihood of early federal old-age pension legislation is the removal this month from federal relief rolls of all those who may be classed as unemployable. The 1930 census showed 6,623,-805 persons in the United States aged 65 or over. They constituted 5 1-2 per cent of the entire population. Only one-third of this group was reported as gainfully employed, and this percentage has undoubtedly decreased since that year. It may be assumed, therefore, that there are at least 5,000,000 persons in the United States 65 years of age or older who are unable to support themselves. FERA recently estimated that approximately 3,-500,000 persons now getting federal relief could be classed as unem-

The percentage of the aged in the population has been steadily increasing in recent decades due to the increase in the average life span. And the percentage of the dependent unemployed among the aged has been increasing at the same time. Reasons for this are: The tendency of trade and industry to impose lower age limits for employment; the introduction of complicated labor-saving machinery has favored the young and active workers who may still be adaptable to new methods, with the elderly usually the first to be laid off and the last one to be taken on; higher standards of living have resulted in later marriages and fewer offspring, so that there are fewer children to care for their aged parents or grandparents.

The traditional asylum of the indigent aged in the United States has been the poorhouse. Advocates of old-age pensions insist that the poorhouse is more expensive as well as socially less desirable than pensions. It has been reliably estimated that the cost of maintenance per poorhouse inmate ranges from \$80 to \$25 a month, with the average around \$40 a month, Thirty dollars a month is the maximum now being paid under the old-age pension laws of the state.


