Tom Goodner Dies From Explosion Injuries

A tank explosion at the Phillips plant at Borger last Thursday morning claimed the life of a popular Clarendon youth, Thomas Conrad Goodner. He died from injuries, received in the blast, Saturday morning at Phillips Pantex Hospital at Borger.

Tom was working inside the tank which was said to be 90 feet off the ground at the time of the explosion. Two other workers, working on the outside of the tank were killed instantly.

His death came as a great shock to the entire community as Tom enjoyed a wide acquaintance of friends both young and old. He was very studious and made high grades in all his school work, both in high school and college. He attended Tech at Lubbock and the local schools here. He came to Clarendon when a young boy with his mother, Mrs. M. C. Goodner, who is head of the English department in the Junior College. He has always shown a willingness to get ahead and has worked at a number of jobs while attending school.

Survivors include his mother, a brother, Paul V. Jones, Jr., Amarillo; two sisters, Mrs. Will Jones, Dallas, and Mrs. Tom Turner, Tulsa; and a grandmother, Mrs. N. P. Cook, Dallas.

Funeral services for Tom were held Sunday afternoon at the First Methodist Church with Rev. E. D. Landreth officiating, assisted by Rev. S. W. Hayne.

Pioneer Lady Buried Here Tuesday

Mrs. Sarah M. Stocking, widow of Dr. J. D. Stocking, deceased, first doctor in the Texas Panhandle, died Sunday night in an Amarillo hospital. She had been ill for 12 days following a fall in which she broke her hip. She had lived in Clarendon since 1887 and was 80 years old at the time of her death.

Funeral services for Mrs. Stocking were held Tuesday morning at the First Methodist Church with Rev. S. W. Hayne officiating.

Mrs. Stocking was born in Alton, Ill., and made the covered wagon trip to Texas in 1870, settling first in Clay county, 10 miles east of Henrietta. Her family made the trip west in 1887, arriving in time to make their home in the "New" Clarendon, after the toot of the first train whistle had sounded the death knell of the old town, located about 7 miles away from the rail right-of-way.

Mrs. Stocking was married in 1889 to Dr. J. D. Stocking who had lived in Clarendon, old and new, for the past four years at that time. The country had changed since that day of his arrival when, as Dr. Stocking recalled, "the chorus of coyotes added a note of loneliness to the little village." But it was still pioneer country and wide open for the cultural branding iron wielded mightily by women of Mrs. Stocking's generation.

While the Doctor made his rounds of a six county circuit, Mrs. Stocking was busy rearing her family and doing her share to give Clarendon its early reputation as a cultural center of the Plains.

Mrs. Stocking was a member of the Methodist Church of which Dr. Stocking was a leader until his death in 1918. She also took a leading role in women's club activities and still had time to devote to her hobby, writing of local history.

Her own intellectual attainments and ambitions were projected in the careers of her children, who have been notably successful in a variety of professional fields.

She reared 10 children, of whom six survive. They are Jerome D. Stocking, local druggist; Dr. Ruth Stocking, a practicing psychiatrist in Washington, D. C.; Dr. George Stocking, chairman of the social science department of Vanderbilt University, Nashville; Collis A. Stocking, an official of the Department of Labor, Washington, D. C.; Mrs. William McConnell, Perryton; and Hobart E. Stocking, professor of geology at Oklahoma A&M, Stillwater.

Another out of state visitor had recently visited the Hermitage in Nashville, the former home of Andrew Jackson. She asked if I had the book, "Breakfast at the Hermitage" by Crabb. So many top sellers are over-rated in the book reports of critics. One can not depend on this advertising to secure the most readable books. There must be something wrong with their reasoning at times.

to check their four books. The Library means more to these growing girls and boys than anyone can imagine unless given the opportunity to see their eagerness in securing their week's reading supply.



of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, has been removed from future disposals of surplus property. Heretofore, the RFC had preference rights in the purchase for resale to small business in all personal property sales and below government agencies in disposals of real property. In recent months this priority group has been active in securing camp buildings and other real property from War Assets Administration

for resale. But congress' new RFC act, passed May 25, 1948, repeals this agency's authority to function in the surplus property activities. However, War Assets Administration will continue to encourage the development of small business and will maintain the present priority accorded to dealers and businessmen who are World War II veterans.

South Texas will be the scene of considerable disposal activity during the latter part of June. Two sites at Orange, Texas, will be cleared of about \$75,000 worth of surplus June 21 to June 23. Mattresses, laundry equipment, hose, tubing, motors and pipe located at the Orange Naval Air Station and the Orange FPHA

plant will go under the high bid hammer. Veterans, dealers and the public are invited to attend the informal bidding at the naval station beginning at 10 a.m. June 23. Another disposal on the heels of this will occur at Hitchcock, Texas, June 24 and 25. Two sites, also housing \$75,000 worth of surplus, galley equipment, hospital supplies, warehouse equipment and miscellany, are the Hitchcock Naval Air Station and Camp Wallace. Bids will be taken at the navy station June 25 at 1 p. m.

Two industrial plants were moved into the ranks of private industry by disposal action this week. The Sunray Carbon Black plant, which has been operated under lease since 1944 by the Continental Carbon Company of Amarillo, was sold to that com-

pany for \$1,100,000. The government-owned toluene plant of Ponca City went to the Continental Oil Company of that Oklahoma City for \$175,000. This company plans to convert the facility to oil refining.

First two months of the WAA's new donation program witnessed a total of \$137,669.98 worth of government surplus turned over to Texan and other state educational institutions without cost. Most unique donation was 52 South American flags given to the City of New Orleans. Other items included obsolete aircraft and radio parts, telephone switchboards and about 13,000 volumes of textbooks, fiction and non-fiction books, many of which went to veterans hospitals and schools. The program is being administered by the priority claimants division of the Grand Prairie regional office.





Continuing its efforts to prevent overpayments of subsistence allowances, Veterans Administration again urges veteran-students and their schools to notify VA as soon as a veteran interrupts or completes his training program.

A veteran-student in training under the GI Bill is not entitled to subsistence allowances after the date he interrupts or completes his training. In some cases, veterans stop their training and receive additional payments before VA is notified of their change in status.

All such payments must be refunded to the government. Advance notice is preferable whenever a veteran decides to discontinue his training. However, prompt notice immediately after a break if training will help to prevent most overpayments.

Veterans' News

Veterans Administration has warned veterans, builders and lenders against the consequences of making or accepting so-called "side payments" in the sale of home properties to veterans with the aid of GI loans.

VA said such side payments—usually made for the purpose of evading the prohibition against sales to veterans in excess of appraised "reasonable value"—are a direct violation of law and subject offenders to possible federal prosecution.

Many cases have been reported in which veterans have been induced to pay the builder or seller an amount over and above the sales price shown on the loan report submitted to VA, and upon which the Government loan guarantee is based.

Veterans who knowingly conspire to evade the law by making such side payments risk loss of their rights under all veterans' laws, VA warned.

VA said that any lender who submits a loan to VA for guaranty while possessing knowledge of a side payment in connection with the sale—even though the payment was made to a third party other than the lender—will be suspended from further participation in the GI loan program.

COMMUNITY "H" IN THE AAA PROGRAM

This is the eighth and last in the series of articles concerning the farmers in this county. These articles have been designed to give the citizens of this county an idea of what the farmers are doing to cooperate with the government agencies in the soil conserving program. The farmers are doing a wonderful job and it is your duty as friends and citizens to give them your help and support.

This week our report is from community "H" one of the larger communities in Donley County. On the north and east sides its boundaries are the county line. On the west side the line begins

just east of the Rockledge district and extends south to the river, the river then forming the south side of the community. There are 58 farms and ranches in this community covering 85,967.5 acres of land.

A large part of this community is open range land, and for this reason there haven't been as many farming practices carried out as in some of the communities of smaller size. Of the farming practices we have one farmer who intends to strip crop his land. Bill Crisp has an approval for strip cropping 90 acres of his farm. Frank Hommel, and Frank Crisp seeded 985 pounds of winter legumes under the 1948 Agricultural Conservation Program. Jim McMurtry has applied 3000

pounds of 20% superphosphate to his Austrian Winter Peas this spring.

The practices for range land have been helpful to the farmers in Community "H". Fred Thompson, and Evan Sitter have seeded 1259 pounds of grasses in 1948. Henry Boyd plans to mow 200 acres of pasture land this year to control the weed growth properly. The pasture has to be mowed several times during the growing season, depending on how fast the weeds grow. The main purpose of this practice is to prevent the weed seed from maturing. Charlie McMurtry has drilled a well for livestock watering purposes. Buck Glass and Herman Hunt have constructed 2 earthen dams for watering purposes.

The terracing practice is more widely used than might be expected for the amount of farm land concerned. Three farmers alone have constructed 46,911 feet of large ridge terraces. These farmers are Joe Leonard, Frank Crisp, and Thomas D'Spain. The farmers constructing diversion terraces are C. P. Hamilton, Herman Hunt and Bill Crisp. They have constructed a total of 5,013 cubic yards of diversion terraces.
