The oil well which is located on the Donald Ballew farm about 3 miles south of town is rumored to be abandoned probably some OPEN FOR BUSINESS this week. No report has SATURDAY been received whether any important formations were encountered but according to an informed source the rig is to be moved off of the present location due to the loss of a section of drill stem in the hole. It was understood that several days have been spent in fishing operations in an effort to pick up the drill stem and bit but all efforts up until the present time have failed. This naturally necessitates the abandonment of a hole, for after a drill stem section remains in a hole several hours the hole begins to cave. complicating the matter to a greater extent. The depth at the time of the breakdown was believed at around 1,400 feet.






