It's Just A Lot Of Bull

Bull Delivered Here By Railway Express

Crated like a piece of machinery, the two-year-old bull ordered by Frank Cannon, local dairyman, arrived here in one piece last Saturday morning, a little lank, but reflecting his high breeding and long name. The young bull, Design Linda Joe, is a member of the famous Linebred Design Jersey cattle. He was shipped by Railway Express to Clarendon from Shelbyville, Ky. Express charges, Cannon said, amounted to \$126.53.

Cannon, twenty-five year old dairyman near Clarendon, ordered the animal sight unseen on its pedigree from Marview Farms near Shelbyville. It is classified as a five-star bull, a high type classification based on its immediate ancestry. The young sire is the son of one of the exclusive "ton-of-gold" Jersey cows, which means that she produced a ton of butterfat over a four year period.

"The bull is out of proven stock," the young dairyman said, "and should greatly increase our production." Cannon stated that the animal would be used to improve his own registered dairy herd.

In addition to his dairy, Cannon is also an instructor in the Veterans Vocational Agricultural school here.

Test Well Drilling Below 900 Feet

The Stratigraphic test well being put down at the Northeast corner of the old golf course west of town by the Honolulu-Oil Corp. was reported drilling at 900 feet Wednesday according to Joe Moore, company geologist.

The well will be drilled to an undetermined depth or until the same formation is encountered that was found in the wells on the Ozier place around 1200 feet. It was along this depth that a favorable oil formation was found, but the well was too tight to give up any oil.

Bumper Crops Predicted With Continued Rains, Cool Weather

TEXAS FARMERS MAKING CONSERVATION PROGRESS

Farmers of Texas are using the Agricultural Conservation Program with increased effectiveness in improving the farm lands of the state, reports Howard T. Kingsbery, Acting Chairman of the State Production and Marketing Committee.

Among the indication of progress in the 254 counties, the chairman cites the following figures:

Under the 1940 ACP Texas farmers spread 40 tons of lime compared to 102,138 tons spread under the 1946 program. 5,000 tons of phosphate were used in 1940 compared to 101,536 tons in 1946. The acreage seeded to pasture grasses and legumes increased from 306,124 acres in 1940 to 649,241 acres in 1946. Farmers constructed 12,393 earthen dams and mowed 489,495 acres of pasture during 1940 compared to 17,976 earthen dams and 1,201,736 acres pasture mowing during 1946.

One of the practices which has grown most in popularity during these six years is growing a cover of winter legumes. During 1940 farmers participating with the ACP seeded 57,000 acres to winter legumes while under the 1946 program 649,241 acres were seeded.

Among other practices receiving increased attention by Texas farmers are constructing terraces, constructing drainage ditches and the eradication of destructive plants on pasture and range land such as cedar, mesquite, prickly pear, underbrush, bushes, and shrubs.

Rev. R. C. Bolton Attends Fred Waring Music Workshop

Exclusive — Shawnee-on-Delaware, Pa.—August 1—Rev. R. C. Bolton, Minister of the First Christian Church in Clarendon, Texas attended the Fred Waring Music Workshop here last week. (July 25)

The Workshop is under the personal direction of Mr. Waring who brings his entire group of singers, musicians, arrangers and writers to broadcast their weekly schedule of six half-hour radio shows from the village fire hall.

Rev. Bolton observed the daily rehearsals and broadcasts of the Pennsylvanians, taking part in intensive choral rehearsals, studying methods of choral conducting, program building, sight reading and microphone techniques—all under the direction of Mr. Waring, his assistants and members of the NBC production staff.

Extra curricular activities at the Workshop included nightly recitals by individual Pennsylvanians and recreational activities around Shawnee Lake which is reserved for the exclusive use of Workshop members and the Pennsylvanians. Sports highlight of the week was a Workshop vs Pennsylvanians softball game. In spite of the efforts of Rev. Bolton who played on the Workshop team, and of Walter Reitz of Fredonia, N. Y., an outstanding pitcher, the Workshop team was defeated by the more experienced Pennsylvanians with a score of 6 to 3.

The 1948 session is the second year of the Fred Waring Music Workshop at Shawnee and about six hundred and fifty school, college, church, community and industrial music directors will attend the ten one-week sessions.

Continued rainfall and cool weather over Donley County makes a potential bumper crop inevitable, it seems. The CAA Weather Station at the airport reports 1.23 inches since last Thursday. This figure can hardly be near correct all over the county, though it is probably near the average. Little hail has been reported.

Undoubtedly, recent rains have set a record over a period of many years. As Donley citizens well know, the kind of weather common to the past three weeks is, most unusual for this country. "It's more like October and November," is the general opinion of those who commit themselves.

The optimistic farmer beams; the pessimist does likewise, but conceals his feelings and rationalizes by reviewing similar times gone by when hot winds swept over tender, amply watered crops and burned them to a crisp.

Both types are justified in his own convictions. Some have cotton and feed that are far enough along to make should the weather turn toward the pessimist's side of the matter, while others do not.

Those who had to replant after every washout, some as many as five or six times, are the ones in danger. Their young, tender crops are subject to great damage if hot winds should attack them.

Already moisture is reported as doing damage, in a sense of the word. Frank Hardin, prominent watermelon and cantaloupe grower east of town, states that his cantaloupes, grown large to the extent that a very few produce a bushel, are becoming difficult to market for that reason. They are also splitting open on the vines before he can get to them.

Gardens and yards in town flourish without the help of city water. No water shortage is anticipated as has been the trouble in recent summers.

The entire situation can be aptly summed up thusly: things look good; time will bear the situation out.

FATHER OF LOCAL LADY DIES SATURDAY

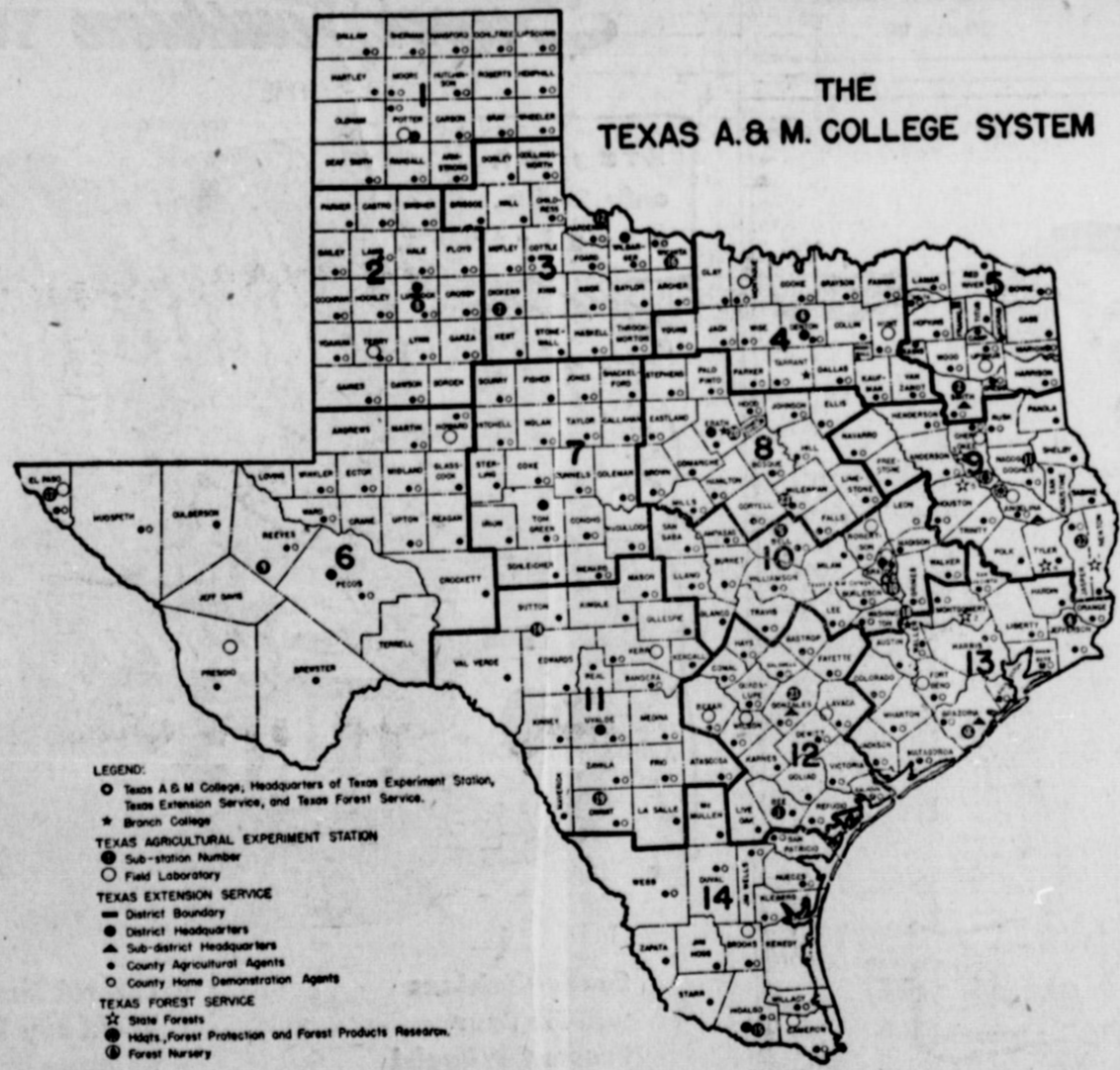

He made many friends on his rounds and had many interesting stories to tell of his wolf chases and traveling. He was a typical man of the old west, knowing no strangers and dispensing favors where his services were needed.

Veterans, state and local governments and other priority groups are advised to make hay in exercising their rights in acquiring surplus property while the legal sun still shines. The War Assets Administration's priority system for sale of personal property will be abolished August 31, 1948, after which date such surplus materials will be marketed without preference to such groups. The change was ordered by Congress in order to speed disposal of comparatively small remaining inventories. Existing priorities in the disposal of surplus real property will continue to be observed.

Expiration of so-called freeze orders on industrial war plants throughout the southwest is be-

ing followed this week by a call to private industry to buy or lease 13 facilities still on the non-productive surplus list. In Texas, these bargains in potential profits include the Continental Motors Plant near Dallas; Bluebonnet Ordnance Plant, near McGregor; Consolidated Steel Company, Orange; the Hughes Tool Plant and Todd-Houston Shipyards, both in Houston. These properties are wide open for negotiations, the War Assets Administration announced, and new owners may put them into operation at once under the terms of a National Security Clause allowing possible resumption of governmental control in war time. All interested parties are invited to contact the Grand Prairie office of Real Property Disposal or write to WAA's Industrial Division, P. O. Box 6030, Dallas.

Vehicles, scrap steel and lumber, office furniture and machines and an assortment of additional war surplus miscellany will go on

sale in Houston August 5. The bidding will be conducted at WAA Warehouse 6 in Houston at 4600 Clinton Drive. Veterans will still have opportunity for priority on this material.

Land, buildings and fixtures located at the Crystal City, Texas, Internment Camp, will be offered to priority claimants for onsite use, the WAA disclosed. The property includes a 33.4 acre land tract on which 49 buildings and other betterments are located. Federal agencies, state and local governments and non-profit institutions will have until August 3rd to submit applications to the regional office of Real Property Disposal.

Veterans of World War II still seeking automotive vehicles at a reasonable price will have the opportunity to bid on 21 surplus trucks and passenger cars in Okla. next week. Inspection may be made July 28 and 29 at Tinker and Will Rogers Fields, Oklahoma City, and at the Veterans Hospital, Norman. Competitive bidding on all vehicles, which will be open only to veterans, will begin at 10 a. m., July 30, at Tinker Field.

SOCIAL SECURITY INFORMATION

"What is my stake in social security? Those words are becoming more and more important to every man, woman, and child who works for a living, because each has a constantly growing stake in the program," John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo social security office said today. "To the worker who approaches the age of 65, the thought that he will have some financial reserve to depend upon, a reserve he has worked to build up, is a very encouraging factor in planning for a retirement which will be slowly but surely forced upon him," Sanderson said.

"The entire program is built on the basic idea that a man who has devoted his life to production for society has a definite right to the freedom which comes from the

knowledge that he and his family will have a regular money income. Even a modest sum, which comes regularly every month, looms large in importance as a means of helping to maintain a reasonable standard of living.

"The American worker seldom wants something for nothing. It is a source of pride and satisfaction to him to know that the social security benefits paid to him will come from the security trust fund which his contributions helped build. Social Security has established such a fund from the contributions of workers and employers in commerce and industry. Drawing on that fund is a right rather than a favor," Sanderson concluded.

The Social Security Administration will assist you in any way possible, to inform you of your rights under this program and assist you to apply for benefits. The office serving this area is located at the Post Office Building, Amarillo, Texas.

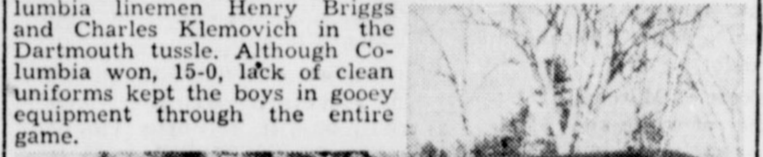
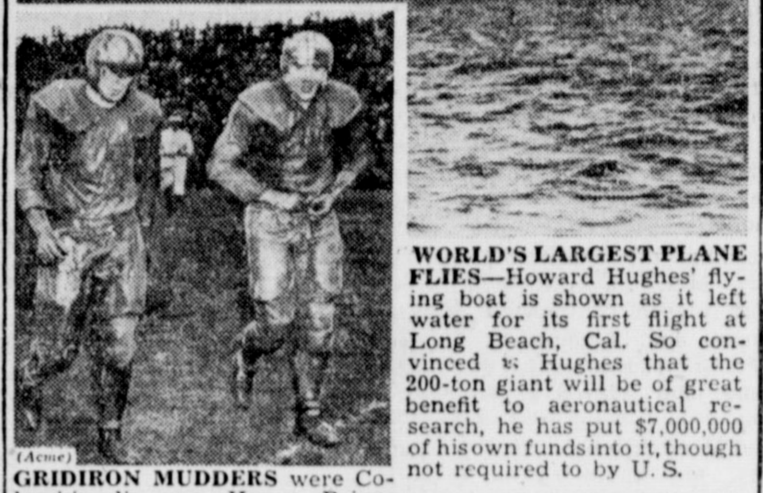
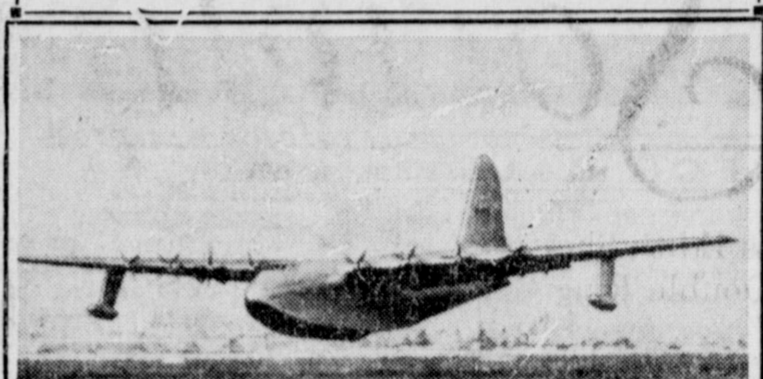

Health Notes

AUSTIN—According to the morbidity report for the week ending July 3, more than 463 cases of diphtheria occurred throughout the state so far this year.

The morbidity report is released weekly by the Texas State Department of Health. It shows the prevalence of communicable disease by counties.

"In the light of our present knowledge regarding the control of diphtheria, it is unfortunate that the disease is allowed to flourish," Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, said.

For the week June 26 to July 3, Nueces County reported four cases; Hopkins, Tarrant and Val Verde Counties reported one each. For the year 1947, seventy-seven deaths from diphtheria were recorded.

"A life-time immunity may be established in 90 per cent of the children receiving the diphtheria toxoid," the health officer said. "If all parents of children over six months of age would have their children inoculated, the incidence rate of the disease would be rapidly reduced."

The administration of toxoid causes little or no discomfort in the child, Dr. Cox added, and a positive immunity can be determined by a Schick test conducted four to six months after the final dose of the toxoid has been given the child.
