The preparation of refreshments from the products grown by 4-H club girls was demonstrated by Billie Louise Spurgers and Ellie McKinney of Schleicher county.

Two Pecos county club girls, Ladye Anne Petsch and Wanda Jo Burcham of the Fort Stockton club, told of their achievements in growing vegetables.

The two methods used by these girls to combat limited rainfall wind, heat and frosts were subirrigation and the use of the frame garden. The girls demonstrated the mixing of cement and sand to form the tile, which was placed under ground to water the vegetables.

The frame gardens enabled the Pecos county representatives to produce lettuce, mustard, radishes spinach, english peas, beans, parsley, beets, carrots, and swiss chard for from 8 to 10 months out of the year, they reported.



Failure of either of the Texas Senators to endorse Allred for the post, together with his own persistent disavowment of ambitions along that line contributed to the uncertainty over the appointment. It is safe to assume, however, that the Governor will get approval of both Senators when his name is placed before the Senate for con-

Governor Allred has enjoyed unusual favor from the White House throughout his administration. He also is known, both in Washington and in Texas, as a close personal and political friend of Vice President Garner. It is possible that Allred received more aid from the Vice President during his first campaign for Governor than many Senatorial candidates are receiving from the President on his present swing around the country.

The appointment will meet with almost universal approval in Texas, in spite of the strong political opponents which the Governor has acquired through his eight active vears at Austin as Attorney General and as Governor, Governor Allred is a personable young man who makes friends readily. He has added greatly to the prestige of the Governor's office and of the standing of Texas with the outside world during his term of office. The appointment is a fitting and just reward for a service to the State that has been well performed.

The appointment carries out the President's announced plan of appointing younger men to the Federal bench. His policy, while possibly sacrificing somewhat the maturity of judgment that comes through long legal experience, has the redeeming trait of securing for the Federal bench the life and vigor of youth. In the case of Governor Allred, the President was able to avail himself of a young man who through a number of years of public service has demonstrated his ability to master difficult tasks and to adopt himself readily to new circumstances.

The appointment is a particularly happy one. Governor Allred will render the Federa' government, as he has the State, many years of useful service in this new position.

In re-electing Senator Thomas and returning to Congress all of their present Representatives, Oklahoma voters this week probably made the best selections available. ridden commonwealths. No doubt that was a great advantage in the Tuesday elections. It should be. It is interesting to note that Governor Marland, who rode with President Roosevelt through the State and was a candidate against Senator Thomas, ran third, with Gomer Smith, who was not accorded any privileges during the Presidential visit, in second place.

But what interested Texans most was the fate of those who ran with, apparently, no other qualification than a well-known name. There was some neighborly fear that Oklahoma voters might select Mae West, David Crockett, Daniel Boone, Huey Long, Will Rogers (no relation to the Congressman, who was re-elected), Josh Lee (no kin to the Oklahoma Senator by the same name) or some of the other so-called freak candidates. As well as could be ascertained, there was little upon which to base many of these candidacies other than that the names of the candidates were well known to the voters because someone else had given them prestige or notoriety.

There is a bit of consolation in the fact that all these were defeated-these and some others who ran in a most unusual primary in Oklahoma. That consolation comes from the knowledge that voters, in Olelahoma as in other States, are not so easily tricked as some people imagine. There must be something more than just a name. There must be something behind the name, it seems, to attract the voters. So long as voters insist on looking beyond the name and considering the qualifications, the government is not going entirely to the dogs. And Oklahoma voters are not much different from those in other sections of the

For the period 1932 to 1936. inclusive, the yearly totals of both arrests and convictions for arson underwent an uninterrupted decline-in spite of increased vigilance by police,

prosecuting authorities and insurance company investigators. In other words, the decline meant that the efficiency of this work proved to be a deterrent. A great many people who were tempted to commit arson saw that they couldn't get away with it.

During 1937, there was a slight increase in arrests and convictions over 1936, which is accounted for by the unfavorable economic conditions prevailing during the last half of the year. Even so, it is a noteworthy fact that in 1937 arrests were the lowest for any year of the past ten, excepting 1936, and that the ratio of convictions to acquittals was improved in favor of the former, which testifies to the success and energy of prosecutors.

The 1937 figures tell the story. Arrests rose 6 per cent over the previous year. Convictions increased by more than 21 per cent, and acquittals were less than 5 per cent greater. And the ratio of convictions to acquittals was 80 per cent.

This is good news for America. The arsonist deserves no pity. He works in the dark and every time he strikes, the lives of innocent persons are endangered. Due to the surprise element, the chance of loss of life in arson fires is often abnormally high. The men who are fighting arson are serving us all.





Recent Regulations Affecting Testing Of Milk Effective

New regulations will go into effect September 1 for uniform methods of testing milk and cream for butter fat content. This was assured Texas milk producers and testers Saturday with the promulgation by J. E. McDonald, Commissioner of Agriculture, of official rules and regulations governing the Babcock test for butter fat.

"Elimination of discrepancies in butter fat tests will result primarily in savings to producers and also to distributors," Mr. McDonald

The commissioner stated that manuals outlining the complete methods of procedure in the Babcock test, with illustrations of standard equipment, will be provided for licensed testers throughout the state.
