### THE COST OF BAD ROADS

Some interesting figures on the cost of bad roads, to the car owner, were recently issued by the national bureau of public roads. They show that the saving in car operation, over a brick, concrete or bituminous road is enough, in gasoline alone, to pay for the paving.

If a car uses five gallons of gasoline to travel 100 miles over a concrete road, the bureau's figures show, it will use something over seven gallons to travel the same distance over a dirt road. At 20 cents a gallon for gasoline, this amounts to 40 cents for 100 miles of travel. On 5000 miles of travel, the saving on gasoline would be \$20. Multiply that by the number of car owners in any sub-division, and you have an impressive amount, one probably large enough to do some more paving




