



TO BE STAGED AT COL-LEGE FRIDAY, SATURDAY


Hundreds of boys and girls of the county schools will flock Clarendon tomorrow (Friinto day) for the annual Interscholastic League meet which lasts two days.

Carrying a cargo of news of Texas prosperity to the North and the East the Texas Press "Full-House" Special, the New Deal Train, will get underway for a ten day journey in April. The special train will be he most modernly equipped steel crack train available running on the fastest office through the bonds of matrimony that deserves the schedules.

Sponsored by the Texas Press, and officially sanctioned by the State of Texas, the Capital (Austin to Washington) Special will bear 125 Texans, newspapermen, business executives, and others, to Kansas City, St. Louis, Chicago, Washington, Baltimore, Philadelphia, and New York, where news of the return of prosperity to Texas will be broadcast.

Two primary purposes lie behind the plans for the special, viz: to resell Texas, and its markets and advantages of today and to compliment Franklin Delano Roosevelt, who is leading the nation out of the depression and John Nance Garner, Texas Citizen, Number 1.

Concentration points from which the price of tickets have been figured are Austin, Corsicana, Dallas, Denison, Fort Worth, Galveston, Houston, San Antonio, Tyler, Waco, and Wichita Falls. The price of the tickets range from \$132.25 to \$162.03, according to pullman accomodations desired.

The price of the ticket includes hotel room at the Medina Athletic Club in Chicago; the Powhatan Hotel at Washington; the Ben Franklin at Philadelphia and the Governor Clinton in New York City one night each.

It also includes a return ticket from New York City and payment for the banquet which will be given in Washington honoring President Roosevelt, Vice President Garner and the cabinet.

MARRYING PUBLIC OFFICE

Texans ought not to need to be reminded that marrying into public office is unsound and holds the seeds of countless governmental ills.

Now there has arisen another form of entry into public condemnation of all thinking citizens who stand for better government and fitness in office. We refer to the habit of some county courts who on the death of some official fall before unthinking expressions of sympathy, and by hurried action name the widow to fill out the unexpired term of her husband.

Not a word can be said against full sympathy for bereft widows, but where public service is concerned, and where the interest of government demands fitness in office, the courts fail when they allow such pressure to lead them into appointments the vast majority of which cannot but cost the people in service and efficiency.

Let's abolish entrance into public office through matrimony, regardless of husband, wife, widow, grass or sod.

FARM INCOME RAISES 24 PERCENT

Of general interest to readers of The News is the release of the news that farm income in 1933 was \$1,240,-000,000 greater than in 1932-a jump of 24 per cent.

The chief reason for this, according to the Department of Agriculture press service, were increased prices for crops, and benefit and rental payments by the Agricultural Adjustment Administration. And it should likewise be remembered that the farmer's great allies in raising and stabilizing prices, and in framing governmental farm legislation, were the farm cooperatives.

The co-ops entered 1933 after one of the worst years in agricultural history—a year in which farm income was at the bottom. They went forward courageously and undismayed. They fought the farmer's battles with the middleman-they brought his point of view before the public and won its sympathy-they conferred with governmental officials on all manner of matters directly and indirectly affecting agriculture.

The cooperatives deserve a world of credit. They did much in 1933. And now, with the new year well started, they are going on to greater, more permanent achievement.
