DEATH FOLLOWS LINGERING ILLNESS TO BELOVED PIONEER WOMAN TODAY.

OLD AGE PENSIONS ARE COMING

While The News has never felt that such visionary schemes as the Townsend plan of the government pensioning all over sixty years of age to the tune of \$200 per month, had any chance or right of being adopted, yet in the light of modern thinking we do believe that some form of government aid to the aged is sure to come.

One of the great handicaps of life in this nation today is the fear that men and women feel of old age coming on them without provisions for the necessities of life. When this is lifted there will be more happiness in this country and there will be better work done.

Thirty states and territories already have some form of old age pensions and the public is so aroused along this line that it is only a matter of a short time until every state in the Union will have some pension plan with a uniform federal law the likely outcome ultimately.

They were told to make out the full four-year course that they would take if they had it all to do over again.

In some cases the results were startling. One of the most surprising results of all was the general acceptance of four full years of English. Since this is one of the subjects which curriculum changers believe should be revised, it was rather gratifying to see that all of the forty-eight voted for English I and II, all except one voted for English III, and axcept five were in favor of English IV.

In the field of mathematics, the results were more diverse. Nine did not want any Algebra at all, and eighteen wanted just one year of it. Plane Geometry was cast out as undesirable by thirteen students, and thirty-five voted against Solid Geometry. The other Senior Math course, Advanced Arithmetic, was cast out by twenty-two.

There was a large dissenting vote in most of the history courses offered. Thirty-two would not have taken Ancient History, and thirty-eight did not want either Texas or Modern History. The history courses in the higher grades did not receive quite so many negative votes. There were only thirteen who did not want American History and fifteen who would not have taken either Civics or Economics.

There were not many positive votes for courses in the scientific field. There were only about twenty who would have taken General Science and Biology. Chances for inclusion of Chemistry in the high school curriculum seem small, for only nine wanted

One of the courses which has been suggested as a high school subject is Spelling. However, there were only eighteen votes for this subjet, even though it might be very useful to many high school students.



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
