

In the past it has been the policy of the city, to forget about the penalties and interest on delinquent taxes. Remember, January 31, 1936, is the positive deadline for the payment of delinquent and 1935 city taxes with the addition of the penalty of six per cent interest.

In the future the policy of the City of Clarendon will be to collect the taxes before the "deadline" date or assess the penalty and interest as prescribed by law. All people are created equal and as public citizens, they should receive fairness and justice from their officials. Is it fair to collect taxes from one person when they are due and then remit prescribed penalties and interest charges to another who pays his taxes days and months after they are past due? In the future all will receive the same treatment, so take heed and don't let your taxes go delinquent for there will be no penalty and interest remissions as in the past.

Only 50,000 Texans are eligible for old-age pensions according to an estimate made by State Auditor Orville Carpenter who becomes director of the Old-Age Assistance Commission February 14, when the law becomes affective.

Carpenter said there are 360,000 who are 65 years of age and more and he expected that 150,000 would apply for pensions but that only 50,000 would be eligible. Each case must be investigated separately.
