The Pyracontha Coccinea (Firethorne to most of us) has been chosen as Donley County's shrub and every citizen of the County is being asked to help perfect the program. The Firethorne is an evergreen with small glossy leaves and is very spectacular in the autumn when covered with orange-colored berries. Late February or early March has been recommended as the best planting time for the Firethorne but it is hoped that residents will not wait until that time to start their personal share of the roadside development program. County Agent H. M. Breedlove stated today that communications from Mr. B. F. Vance, State Food Manager, advised that mayors of principal Texas cities and towns have been asked to help in setting up local Famine Emergency Committees. The request came from Chester C. Davis, national chairman, in letter form.

Mr. Davis, in his letter to the mayors, pointed out that the full urgency of the world famine crisis in this first postwar year now confronts us. More people are hungry, more are threatened with death, more are unable to do physical work because of lack of food than ever before in the memory of living people.

Famine emergency committees already exist in all Texas counties, and farm people are well acquainted with what is needed from them in food preservation and production. Town and city committees, working in cooperation with the county groups, are needed to bring similar information to town people. It is in this Dwight Blair and Bill Marshall connection that the help of Texas l mayors has been sought.




