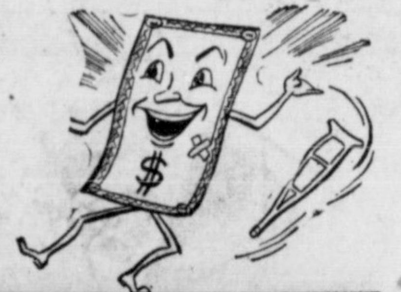

**Cross Country Flying**

Cross country flying, like all other flying, is the hardest thing to learn but the easiest thing to do. It is so easy that green pilots become overconfident about it. As a flying instructor I have heard several students remark, "I don't see how anyone could get lost."

Almost every pilot who has done very much cross country flying has been lost at some time or other in his career. Some pilots

"luck it through" to their destinations without ever knowing how far off course they were. If you learn to fly inland where the visibility is always better than twenty miles, then you will be hopelessly lost around sea coast where the visibility is often down to one mile, you have to fly low, and can see only the check points which are directly underneath you. How many times pilots have followed wrong roads and railroad tracks, no one knows. If you are a would-be pilot, you'll find out, unless you learn to fly cross country efficiently NOW.

Pilots flying light planes have to depend largely on pilotage, with some dead reckoning. To do this well means learning to read every minute detail on your map. Know where you are every INCH of the way. Putting your map in the corner for just 15 or 20 minutes may allow you to get far enough off course that you will become confused and get lost. Even though you may know the country, practice learning the

use of your map so that you can make the best use of it in unfamiliar territory.
