HIGHLIGHTS OF THE NEWS OF THE WEEK.

The supposedly imminent seizure by Japan of control over North China, a matter of growing administration concern, Tuesday precipitated a joint Anglo-American canvass of the crisis.

If American traders fail to heed the repeated warnings of President Roosevelt and Secretary of State Cordell Hull to refrain from endangering American neutrality by resisting the lure of war profits, the state department will make public the names of individuals and firms who are pushing trade with Italy, it was learned in Washington Saturday following Secretary Hull's latest declaration of American neutrality, in which he cited oil, copper, trucks, tractors, soap, iron and steel as "war materials."

Federal aid for the unemployed whenever it is necessary to prevent starvation was promised anew Tuesday by President Roosevelt.

Texas Tuesday night had a system of old age pensions but lacked funds to place it in operation. Gov. James V. Allred signed a bill authorizing maximum payment of \$15 monthly under certain restrictions and looked to a special session of the legislature in January to provide revenues.

Premier Mussolini declared a monopoly on all Italy's gold Tuesday night as the nation stood firm on a program of no compromise with countries applying sanctions against it because of the invasion of Ethiopia. It Duca authorized the National Institute of Foreign Exchange—with the cooperation of the Ministry of Finance and the Supreme Finance Commission—to control all gold transactions of Italians at home and abroad.

Death of an estimated 2,000 Ethiopians in a fierce and almost unprecedented battle between Fascist fliers and Ethiopian warriors was reported Tuesday by Italy. A force of more than 15,000 Ethiopians in a narrow valley in Northern Ethiopia was routed by the squadron of 20 bombing planes, the Italian command announced. Military observers called it the biggest air engagement fought since the world war.

The New York stock market again swept up to new average high since 1931 Tuesday, with turnover of close to 3,000,000 shares. Many leading issues advanced \$2 to \$3 a share, including American Can above \$146, Du Pont above \$145, Union Pacific around \$102, Schenley above \$52, Briggs close to \$54, and Westinghouse Electric above \$98. Radio was traded in large volume, rising more than \$1 to above \$11. Amalgams also traded heavily, rising about \$1 to close to \$24.

The American public last month spent \$497,316,000 for department store, mail order, chain store and variety store general merchandiser, the highest total for any October since 1930, A. W. Zelonek, economist of the International Statistical Bureau, Inc., of New York, estimated Tuesday.

Ruling that Congress had exceeded its power under the bankruptcy clause of the Constitution, the United States Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit Court Saturday held the redemption clause of the re-enacted Frazier-Lemke act unconstitutional.

Appointment of C. R. Miller of Elberta as administrator for the Texas liquor control board was announced by the board Tuesday.

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Pigeons in Belfry Tower Bring Up Old Story About Strife Over Church's Bell

CHURCH BELL FORMERLY USED BY CLARENDON METHODIST CHURCH.

Dalhart, Nov. 20.—A bunch of pigeons have revived the story of the battle two Panhandle towns almost had over a church bell.

The pigeons—125 grownups and 40 squabs—decided to habitate in the belfry tower of the First Methodist Church of North Dalhart.

Now the bell can ring again without hindrance.

Members of the church say that the bell was here from Clarendon in 1901, largely through the efforts of George Walker and Dave Robinson, railroad men who still live here.

Having a heavy silver content, the bell was a prize winner in an exposition at Philadelphia before the dawn of the century.

It was delivered to the church after having been brought by oxcart from the railroad at Dodge City, Kansas.

The original Clarendon Methodist Church later was abandoned, according to the story, and Walker and Robinson bought the bell for \$30.

But when Clarendon citizens learned the bell was being moved they rushed the train in an effort to keep it from being moved.

Dalhartans guarded the car until the train pulled out of Clarendon.

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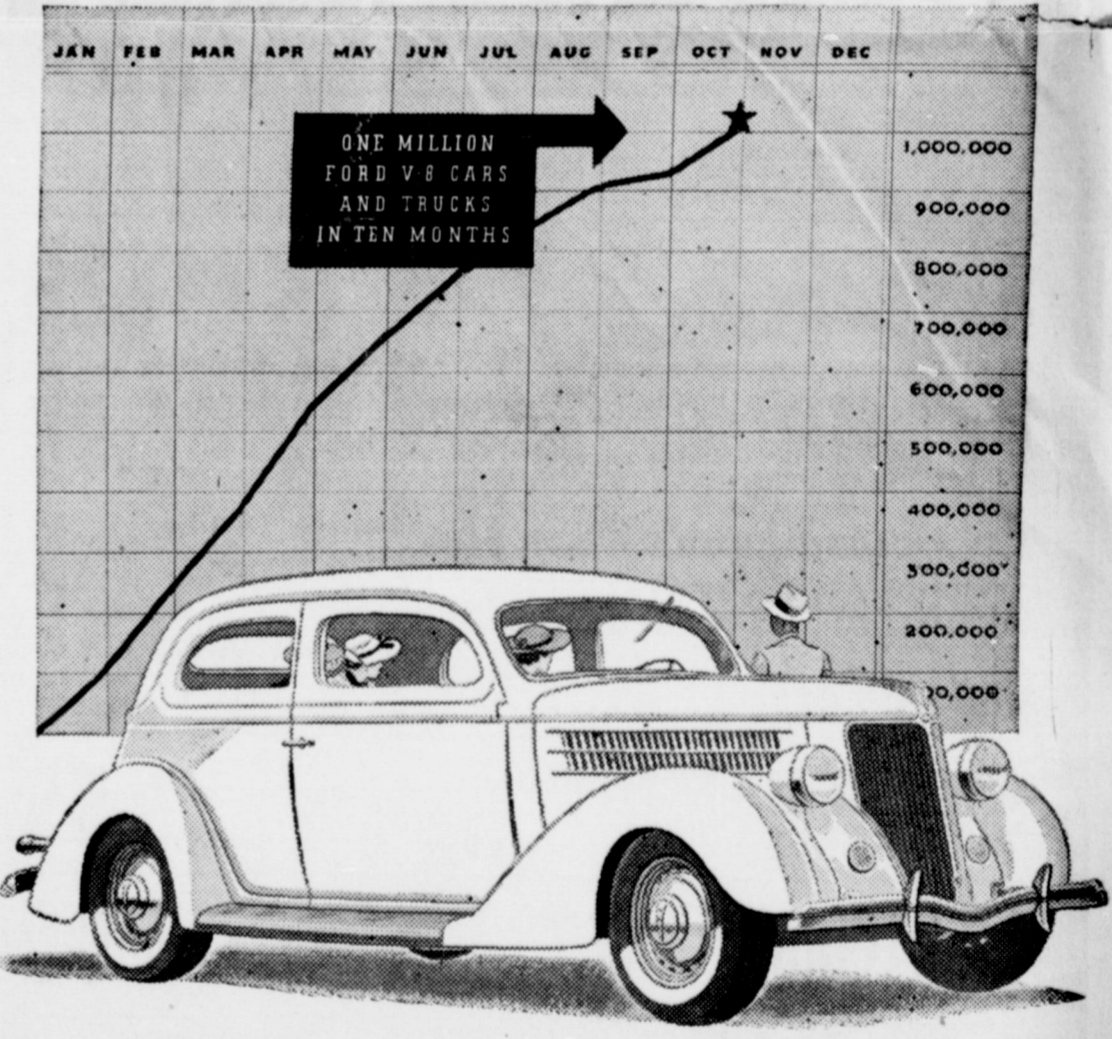

## Pyorrhea Warning Issued By Doctor

Austin, Texas.—Pyorrhea is a chronic disease involving the gums and also that part of the jaw bone surrounding the roots of the teeth. It also affects the membrane which fastens the teeth to that bone and helps to hold it firmly in place, stated Dr. John W. Brown, state health officer. Being an adult's malady it is seldom seen in children. It is most common after middle life. It begins at the gum margin. Early symptoms include swelling and redness. Moreover, the gums are prone to bleed when brushed. Usually there is no pain, even in advanced cases. If the progress of this disease is not arrested, the bone and ligament become involved, pockets are formed between the teeth and gum, and pus collects.

Uncleanliness, undue stress on a few teeth, malnutrition, and irritation produced by the accumulation of food, tartar, and bacteria around and between the teeth are outstanding factors in the development of pyorrhea. Badly fitted crowns and bridges, and over hanging edges of fillings, which are direct contributors to mouth uncleanliness, also lead to irritation. Incidentally, pyorrhea is not contagious.

It is a curable disease if it is not too far advanced when recognized. Treatment is not by the use of drugs but in educating the patient in the proper use and care of the teeth and the removal of the remnants of dead membrane adhering to the root surfaces, as well as any existing tartar.

Proper daily attention to mouth hygiene is the one great bulwark against pyorrhea.
