

#### Decline Shown In **Commercial Failures**

Austin, Aug. 26—A sharp drop occurred in the number of commercial failures in Texas during responding month last year, but there was a substantial increase in failures over the preceding month, it was reported by the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. Liabilities were down sharply from both comparable periods.

Reports from Dun and Bradstreet, Inc., show a 54 per cent decline in the number of failares and 93 per cent in their liabilities compared with July last year; and an increase of 33 per cent in number but a decline of 32.5 per cent in liabilities compared with the preceding month. the bureau stated. 

# **DECLINE OF TEXAS COTTON CROP IS**

OKLAHOMA PLANTS WILT AND BURN UP; NEW MEX-ICO SHOWS PROGRESS.

With another week of hot winds, high temperatures, rang-ing from the high 90's to the 100-degree mark and over, and drought of more than a month, Texas cotton in the upper third of the State is deteriorating rapidly and crop prospects are shrinking, the summary of The Dallas News, ended Friday, shows. Abundant rains soon and weather more favorable for cotton development are needed if an average yield is made in some of the important producing counties in this

In some fields, blooming has about stopped and plants are shedding practically all squares Potter home from Friday until and small fruit. Heaviest damage occurred on light, upland soils where cotton withered and burned Harlin, and Miss Marjorie Harlin and many half-grown bolls popped open under a blistering hot sun. About 10 per cent is open but very little picked.

Although moisture is mostly sufficient in the central third of the State, rank, sappy cotton, resulting from heavy rains and frequent showers in July, unable withstand the extreme heat and hot winds, declined sharply. in this territory and in South and Southeast Texas suffered heavy damage from leaf worms, bollworms and weevils, the latter now taking all new fruit and practically ruining chances for Saturday night in Borger. The South Texas crop is about made and 30 per cent picked, except in the extreme southern counties, where 75 to 90 per cent is harvested.

Continued high temperatures and severe drought is causing rapid deterioration of Oklahoma cotton. Plants are drying up and wilting, shedding leaves and squares and blooming on top. Some eastern and southern coun-

ties report picking has started. Progress of cotton in New Mexico is average to good, with weather about right for nounci blooming and fruiting.


