More than 60 per cent of Texas' scheduled WPA funds will be spent on highways, streets and farm-to-market roads.

Harry L. Hopkins, WPA administrator, announced recently that on December 1 this type of work had been allocated \$22,234,427, or 60.4 per cent of the total of \$36,-802,886 worth of projects in operation.

His survey showed that the rest of the state's funds had been earmarked in this manner:

Public buildings, incliding schoolhouses and governmental build-ings, \$1,605,451, or 4.4 per cent; housing, \$178,626, or .5 per cent; parks and playgrounds, \$2,096.184, or 5.7 per cent; flood control and other conservation measures, \$2,-106,375, or 5.7 per cent; water supply and sewer systems, \$2,129,-067 or 5.8 per cent; transporta-tion, \$14,570, less than .05 per cent. The rest of the money was placed on projects to provide white collar jobs, work for women and employment for professional and technical persons. Sanitation and health work was given \$2,-

941,189, or 8 per cent. The WPA announced this breakdown of the highway total: Farmto-market and other secondary roads, \$16,884,402; streets and alleys, \$3,097,610; bridges and viaducts, \$736,462; grade crossing elimination, \$3,687; miscellaneous, \$1,512,266.

Cotton consumption i the United States was the highest for this November than for any Novem ber since 1932. This increase in consumption reflects an increasing indus trial and retail demand, Government purchases, and the existence of a large volume of reserve orders.

The chart in the lower right corner shows that excessive world supplies of American cotton depress prices and that prices recover with r duced supplies. The supply in 1932-33 was 25,961,000. With that large supply on the market, cotton prices could not recover. As contrasted with such excessive supplies, the World supply of American cotton in 1934-36 was 20,270,000 bales, and prices improved.



## Surplus Acreage Used to Improve Soil, Grow Feeds

More than 95 per cent of the land taken out of production by AAA programs in 1934 and 1935 was used for soil-improving and erosion-preventing crops, emergency forage crops in 1934 drought regions, crops for home

food and feed, fallowing to conserve moisture and for farm woodlot, post and windbreak purposes A very small percentage of the contracted acreage was out of productive use, say AAA officials. Under adjustment contract about 36,000,000 acres could not be planted to corn, cotton, wheat and tobacco in 1934 and in 1935 total land taken out of these crops was 31,000,000 acres.


Recent 1935 census reports show that the nation's total pasture acreage in 1934 increased 15 per cent, or 19,000,000 acres
