



### **ALL PRODUCERS ELIGIBLE TO VOTE ON CONTROL PLAN**

CONTINUANCE OF AAA PRO-GRAM URGED BY COUNTY ASSOCIATION PRESIDENT.

Every eligible corn-hog producer in Donley County, as well as each of the 260 contract signers, is entitled to vote in the national corn-hog referendum Saturlay. October 26, according to Bert Mayfield, president of the County Corn-Hog Control Association.

According to Mr. Mayfield, all farmers have a stake in the question. It is important, the Donley County president says, to get the judgment of every eligible producer on the matter, if he favors a corn-hog adjustment program to follow the 1935 program which expires on November 30, 1935.


All operators and owners, or their officials representatives. of farms which produced corn or nogs in 1935 may vote whether they signed the corn-hog contracts in the past years or not. Community committeemen will determine the eligibility of voters. Each person is entitled only to one vote regardless of the number of farms he may own or operate, no matter where located.

The corn and hog industry, on the one hand, has a choice of continuing a production adjustment program designed to hold corn acreage down to a safe, desirable level and preventing an excessive increase in hog numbers. The alternative is to release control of both corn acreage and hog production at the risk that during the next three years the increase in hog production from the 1935-36 level will be greater than for any previous period in the country's nistory with consequent disastrous hog prices, Mr. Mayfield said.
