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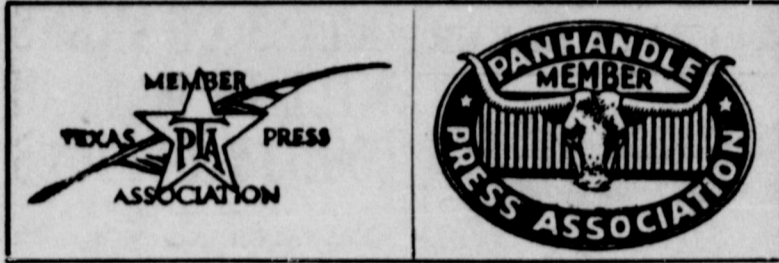

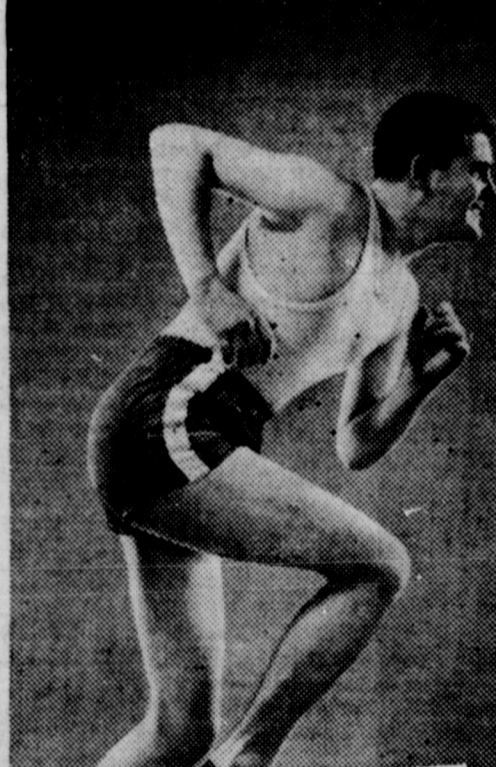

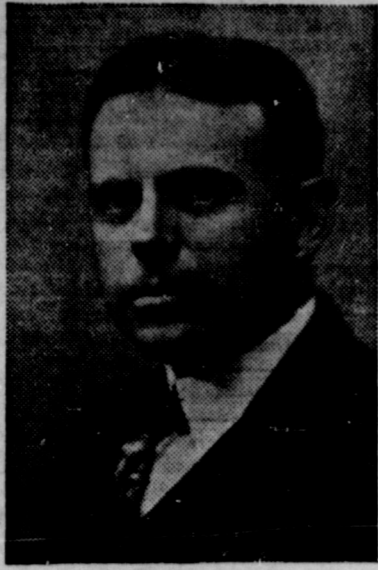

'GARNER DAY' TO BE OBSERVED AT TEXAS CENTENNIAL

VICE PRESIDENT WILL BE HONORED IN DALLAS ON AUGUST 5.

Dallas, Texas, July 29—Motor caravans and special trains from all sections of Texas will converge upon Dallas August 5. The occasion will be a statewide celebration at the Cotton Bowl on the grounds of the Texas Centennial Exposition, honoring John Nance Garner, vice president of the United States, Texas' most distinguished citizen.

the largest crowds Dallas has entertained since the Exposition began on June 6th will be here. Advance information from strategic population centers indicates the crowd will equal and perhaps exceed that of opening day, and also that on the occasion of the visit of President Roosevelt.

Under the direction of the State Commission of Control letters have gone forward to officials and civic leaders in all the larger cities and towns asking that motor caravans be formed, timed to reach Dallas during the morning or early afternoon of August 5. Every town within a close radius of Dallas is receiving a similar invitation.

Within the next few days a proclamation will be issued by Governor James V. Allred setting apart August 5 as "John Nance Garner Day" at the Exposition. The proclamation will recite that the sage of Uvalde is the state's most distinguished son, prominent in the councils of his government and of his party, and that this will mark the first opportunity of residents of his native state to pay him homage en masse.

In the meantime a tentative reception committee has been named to meet the vice president at the Adolphus at noon of August 5. It is composed of Governor James V. Allred, Nathan Adams, Fred F. Florence, R. L. Thornton, Cullen F. Thomas, Lieutenant Governor Walter Woodul, Myron G. Blalock of Marshall, chairman of the State Democratic Executive Committee, Mayor George Sergeant of Dallas, and W. B. Yeager, of the United States Centennial Commission of Control.

The program as developed to date is that the Vice-President will be luncheon guest in the Century Room of the Adolphus. At 6:15 p. m. he will be dinner guest at the Baker Crystal Ballroom.

Immediately following the dinner, he will be escorted to the Cotton Bowl on the Exposition grounds, where the most elaborate program yet staged at the Texas World's Fair will be offered without charge to the public. The cotton Bowl seats approximately 50,000 persons. The program, including the address of the vice president, will be broadcast.

A review of the colorful history of Texas, dating from the time of the early explorers to the present, will be presented. In it will be the cast of the Cavalcade of Texas. This spectacle will be followed by the Army Band, the Police Band and probably others. Other sections of the parade will depict the evolution of livestock, from the Longhorn to the present thoroughbred. It will terminate with a combined review of the Army, Navy and Marine corps units stationed at Camp Stephen F. Austin, within the grounds.

The speech of the vice president will follow.
