FIRST DEMOCRATIC PRIMARY DRAWS HEAVY BALLOT OVER STATE

GOVERNOR ALLRED OBTAINS MAJORITY OVER OPPONENTS

THOMPSON AND MORRIS IN RUN-OFF; LOCKHART AND SHEPPARD NOMINATED.

FIRES AND MOSS IN DIS-TRICT RUN-OFF; WORLEY COASTS TO VICTORY.

James V. Allred, youthful governor of Texas, received a majority over his four opponents in the governor's race in Saturday's primary, and will not be forced into a run-off, according to latest returns from the state election bureau. These returns, including 253 of 254 counties with 188 complete, gave a total of 983,408 votes cast. At least 20,-000 are believed to be outstand-

Governor Allred pushed his majority to 39,374. The tabula-tion showed Allred, 511,391; Hunter, 226,423; Fischer, 136,483; Sanderford, 77,673; Brooks, 31,-

In Donley County Allred car-ried a majority, as he did over the state. The unofficial tabulation gave Allred a total of 1,198. while his opponents' combined total was only 1,017.

Ernest O. Thompson will go into the run-off with Frank Morris, in the race for railroad commissioner. Morris polled a total of 153,057 to run second Thompson, whose total of 407,952 lacked a majority vote.

(Continued from Page One) The procedure that will be fol-'owed is that when a person in need makes application at the ntake office all facts necessary to determine the applicants' actual needs are developed. The information required is in detail. Following this a case worker makes a home visit to the home of the applicant obtaining such other information possible. Collateral visits to references given are also made. After completing this information an adequate budget is developed for the particular family in question. No two families, even of the same size and same apparent conditions, have the same requirements For this reason trained workers are necessary for the handling resources are considered. From this information the need is determined. Applications are then ither rejected or referred to the WPA. Whether the referral is accepted or rejected, the Texas Relief Commission has absolutely nothing to do with the actual placing of the applicant on a WIPA job.

Texas quota on WPA at present is 81,000 persons, while there ere 135,000 now certified. It is anticipated that an additional 50,-000 will be accepted under the modified ruling. This makes a total of 185,000 eligible with only 81,000 available jobs. As there is practically no possibility of applicants obtaining jobs immediately and as some little time is required between the date of application and actual referral is completed, the Relief Office are requesting that people do not rush to the Intake Offices.
