

What power has Congress over national elections? Our Constitution provides that tate legislatures may prescribe the ing elections for Senators or Repre-

sentatives "but the Congress may

alter such regulations." Without giving this power to Conress, the states could annihilate the Union by failure to provide for the election of persons to administer its affairs. It was not until 1842. however, that Congress passed a law providing that members of the House of Representatives should be elected by districts. Previously, in some cases, they were elected by the state at large. This gave undue preponderance to the dominant political party of the state, however small its majority, since it might not have a majority in some dis

To correct other abuses and pro vide uniformity, Congress in 1872 provided that such elections be held on the Tuesday after the first Mon-day in November. It also provided that presidential elections be held on the same day. Since the 17th Amendment providing for popular



election of Senators, they also are

elections.

To provide for preserving the national government, our Constitution gives Congress certain powers over national elections, and by laws passed in accordance therewith the people in all states now vote for Representatives, Senators and Presidential electors on the same day.



#### NORTH THE STATE OF BUSINESS

Austin.-The growing strength of organized labor as a political factor in Texas, particularly during the past four years of Roosevelt government, when labor has had its greatest "break" in history, is a development to which politicians are giving close attention these days. Texas in the past has been an overwhelmingly agricultural state, with little industrial development, and that confined largely to a few larger cities where the labor vote was given consideration by campaign planners. But growth of industry in the state, particularly production and processing of petroleum, has jumped the strength of labor from 15,000 to 150,000 or more members within recent years and there are now more than 400 active labor unions affiliated with the Texas federa-




