The subject of the City of Clarendon purchasing the Clarendon Airfield was brought before the local Lions Club Tuesday and it was voted by the club to sponsor the movement.

It was explained at the meeting that the C.A.A. Radio and weather station had been re-activated here but that its life and future operation depended entirely on the ownership of the land which comprises the airfield and it was pointed out that the only thing to with other Lodges having charge
Adams pulled his first string the C.A.A. payroll here was for the City to buy the airfield which takes in approximately 140 acres.

A payroll of approximately \$30,000 a year is spent here in Clarendon by the C.A.A. employees and other employees employed at the other airport installations, the spokesman before the club stated, and added further that all this would be lost unless something was done in the near future by the City of Clarendon.

At the present time the field is being leased by the City for \$1,000 a year. The City is being paid rentals amounting between three and four hundred dollars a year for installations on the field and the spokesman stated that this would be more than enough to pay the interest on the money that it would take to purchase the field and in the long run the city would not be out any more money purchasing the field and would come out ahead after the land was paid out.

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




