APPROXIMATELY 1,000,000 VOTES EXPECTED TO BE CAST IN TEXAS.

Approximately 1,000,000 voters in the 254 counties of Texas will march to the polls Saturday, July 25, to cast their ballots for state, district, county and precinct officers, in the first Democratic primary.

The polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m.

Local interest, which has been unusually dormant during the past several months, has risen to a high pitch during the past two weeks. The total voting strength of

the Panhandle country is estimated to be approximately 57, 472, and it is believed that this section will be the determining factor in many of the state races. Donley County will cast approximately 2,300 ballots, it is believed.
