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County gives boost to local charities

Eight local organizations are deciding what to do with some big checks after receiving a share of almost \$82,000 distributed by the Donley County Commissioners' Court last month.
The 100th Judicial District Adult Probation Department presented the money to the county on February 8. It was one-fifth of the donations collected from participants in lieu of performing community service hours for about 15 years prior to March 2008.
County Judge Jack Hall said the

donations were one-time gifts.
"It was a good thing and helped a lot of worthy causes," Hall said. "The commissioners had several applicants for the money, and they reviewed all of them before making their decisions.
The organization receiving the highest donation of \$22,000 was the Hedley Senior Citizens Center.
"We're putting the money in our fund for our new building," said Kathy Spier, bookkeeper of the Center. "We're currently working in a 105-year-old building, and we need a new one that can also be used as a

community building. But if we need it to feed the elderly, we will definitely use it for that."
The Donley County Junior Livestock Association also received a large donation of \$20,000 and will use it to finish the new Donley County Activity Center located north of Clarendon.
"We are going to use the money to complete office areas in the building and get it more functional for the public," said Larry Gray, Chairman of the Junior Livestock Association Board. "We appreciate all donations."

Don Stone said that the county's donation of \$20,000 came at the right time for the Donley County Senior Citizens' Center.
"We will use the money to help feed about 200 people a day," Stone said. "It is going to be very good to have money to buy groceries because we are losing money every day. We hope to have some left to go towards a sinking system. PRPC wants us to accrue \$100,000 in a sinking system to keep the center open in the future. So we lack a whole lot more."
The Saints' Roost Museum received a donation of \$12,958.

"We are getting some new storm windows for the museum," Vice President of Finance Genella Eads said. "The donation won't be enough for all of it, but we are in dire need of them."
Other non-profit organizations receiving donations from the Commissioners' Court included the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department Dive Team, \$1,000; the Texas Panhandle Chapter of the American Red Cross, \$3,000; the Citizen's Cemetery Association, \$1,000; and the Donley County Child Welfare Board, \$2,000.

CAN program offers opportunity for an education

One in four adults over the age of 25 in the Texas Panhandle has no high school diploma. Addressing that alarming statistic from the US Census Bureau has become a priority at Clarendon College, which has launched the Cooperative Access Network (CAN) to coordinate resources and help people to help themselves.
"Our goal is for an individual seeking a GED to use the network to help them from start to finish," Tex Buckhaults, Dean of Students, said.
"We will work to provide them with materials to prepare for the exam, find transportation to and from the exam, find a mentor

for support, find child care during the exam, and then help them after with the next step," Buckhaults said.
Without a GED or high school diploma, residents have no access to the higher education and skills training necessary to maintain a quality workforce.
"Clarendon College is partnering with the communities in our service area to share and provide resources and reinforce the common

goal of increasing educational attainment," Buckhaults said.
This network is a pooling of resources between Clarendon College, Region 16 ESC, community churches, city governments, county governments, businesses, libraries, and other civic organizations.
"We have received funding from Clarendon Lions Club that we used to purchase training textbooks for the people of Clarendon and

Donley County," Buckhaults said.
"We have also found resources already in place in our community to provide transportation and child care for individuals in order to enable them to better attain their GED," he said.
The training textbooks and information packets on how to attain a GED are now available for those interested at the Burton Memorial Library and at Clarendon College.

Climate bill will harm US jobs, economy

Recently, in what the National Academy of Sciences declared “the most comprehensive report ever on climate change,” three studies requested by Congress were unfurled, providing sweeping proposals for an aggressive federally based strategy to deal with climate change.

Bold actions are necessary because “climate change is occurring, the Earth is warming ... concentrations of carbon dioxide are increasing, and there are very clear fingerprints that link [those effects] to humans,” said Pamela A. Matson of Stanford University, co-chair of the studies and the subsequent report to Congress.

The report was ordered by congressional Democrats who want climate change legislation passed and signed into law this year. Both the House climate bill (passed last year) and the pending Senate version call for the trading of carbon credits, as well as heavy taxes on businesses that emit greenhouse gases in order to supposedly cool the planet. The Senate is expected to renew debate on the issue later this summer.

However, a just-released report assembled by the nonpartisan Peterson Institute for International Economics confirms my long-held contention: The pending climate change bill will be an economic bust for America by killing jobs and raising prices for virtually everything.

Besides believing that humans are altering the climate, the Peterson report recommends that a single federal entity or program be given the authority and resources to coordinate a national, multidisciplinary research effort aimed at improving both understanding and responding to climate change.

In other words, the nonpartisan report contends that government is the solution to the problem.

Nonetheless – and surprisingly – the report states that if the Kerry-Lieberman bill should become law, there will be net job losses and higher energy and product prices.

The Peterson analysis neatly buries those findings after stating that 203,000 new green jobs will be created each year for a decade. Specifically, the report states the net employment losses will be due to “the jobs lost in fossil fuel production and as a result of higher energy prices between 2011 and 2020. In the second decade of the program [2020-2030], higher energy and product prices offset the employment gains from new investment.”

To review: Both the House and Senate climate change bills plan on scaling back CO₂ emissions 17 percent by 2020 and 83 percent by 2050. According to United States Census figures, the population of the U.S. will increase by thirty million by 2020 and by 100 million by 2050. So where will the cuts come from? From America’s coal industry, which will be shuttered; from our manufacturing sector, which will be moved offshore; and from our livestock industry, which will also be sent abroad.

Do you see what’s about to occur? Good jobs will be lost. That’s why in the House version of the bill, a provision ensures that if your job is shipped overseas, you are eligible for three years of unemployment compensation at 70% of your pay, plus retraining and relocation expenses.

The intent is to pacify your anger with a three-year paid vacation. In the Senate version of the bill, the unemployment benefits are cleverly tied into an Internal Revenue Code entitled the “empowerment zone employment credit.”

The Peterson reports also notes that by forcing the price of energy upward (which is what both the House and Senate bills will do), Americans will be forced to use less energy:

By placing a price on carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gas emissions, providing incentives for low-carbon sources of energy supply and improving the efficiency of energy use through a range of mechanisms, the American Power Act would substantially alter the way energy is produced and consumed in the United States.

By pricing carbon, the American Power Act raises the cost of fossil fuels, prompting firms and consumers to improve the efficiency with which they use energy or switch to low-carbon sources of energy supply.

Households will also face higher prices for non-energy goods as the firms producing them face higher energy costs.

To compensate for this additional cost of living, both the House and Senate versions of the bill present consumer handouts in the form of direct deposits from Uncle Sam into the bank account of lower wage-earners. In the case of the Senate bill, a family of four making \$55,000 a year will receive a monthly cash deposit into their bank account to offset their increased cost of living.

Sounds like socialism to me, but then again, I’ve never believed this bill was about the environment. It’s an attempt to spread the wealth around, allow a few investors to make huge amounts off of money off cap-and-trade, and – more importantly – take away the liberty of the American people. When the government is able to control how much energy we consume, they have an additional tool with which to control our lives.

What ‘social justice’ really represents

I’ll begin candidly, with a statement that might sound uncharitable: The modern Religious Left has perverted “social justice,” if not hijacked the term altogether. It has so misappropriated and mangled the term that many Americans – including commentators like Glenn Beck – now reflexively think “socialism” when they hear “social justice.”

Indeed, the most enthusiastic practitioners of social justice tend to advocate Big Government collectivism, pursued via a single, seemingly ever-expanding federal government. And although “social justice,” in its origins, does not mean socialism, many liberal Christians have veered to that extreme.

Speaking of extremes, the radical left long ago took notice, employing the language of “social justice” to appeal to liberal Christians, especially in education. Sixties Marxists Bill Ayers and Michael Klonsky now write books like Handbook of Social Justice in Education, Teaching for Social Justice, and A Simple Justice: The Challenge of Small Schools – the latter two published, naturally, by Columbia Teachers College – and not because of any allegiance to Christ. These militant secularists know which buttons to push to dupe liberal Christians.

That said, here’s a word in semi-defense of some “social justice” Christians; that is, those not duped by the likes of Ayers:

I don’t think we can say the Bible explicitly prohibits all public welfare. Nor would I argue that government has no role addressing the needy. While I’d avoid defining healthcare as a “right” – widening the umbrella of “rights” is precarious, especially amid secular progressives – I believe a moral society/state has a duty to ensure its people aren’t denied health coverage if they

show up uninsured in an emergency room. Of course, that’s the law of the land anyway.

Besides, I’d be surprised if even 10 percent of Christians give 10 percent of their income in tithing. (Generous tithing becomes difficult when Uncle Sam takes so much of your income.) A people that don’t give, of their own accord, fuel the collectivists.

Personally, I subscribe to the teaching of subsidiarity, which encourages localism as much as possible. Localities, public or private, are closer to the problem, offering a more efficient, human touch than a distant federal bureaucracy that subsumes the traditional role of counties, states, churches, and non-profits.

I’m convinced, from study after study, and years of observing public policy, from the New Deal to the Great Society, to (on the plus side) the successful decentralization / block-granting of welfare done by President Clinton and the Republican Congress in the 1990s, that addressing poverty in the federal way preached by modern progressives – secular or non-secular – is counter-productive, fostering dependency.

Really, the debate is over means, not ends. Liberals must realize that conservatives are hardly lacking in compassion when they oppose transferring poverty solutions to a single authority in Washington. Conservatives simply have a different prescription they feel works better.

In fact, the long experience of economies shows that those disproportionately tilted toward collectivism become so unproductive and lacking in prosperity that they can’t produce the very wealth the Religious Left wants to redistribute. That’s the self-defeating danger that social-justice engineers face as they shift private voluntarism to fed-

eral fiat. That brings me to a fundamental point regarding Scripture: As my colleague Mark Hendrickson notes, the core Biblical parables where Jesus engaged the needy favor individual action. The Good Samaritan himself helped the wounded traveler, giving his time and resources. He didn’t round up authorities to demand 20 percent from everyone, threatening penalties if they didn’t forcibly chip in.

Consider another parable: the rich man and the eye of the needle. Here’s another New Testament passage the Religious Left horribly misunderstands, conveying it into class warfare (read: envy) against the wealthy. Here, Jesus calls on the rich man to give his own wealth – all of it. It’s a very high standard. The obligation, however, falls to the rich man – not government. Christ didn’t demand that authorities intervene, confiscate, and redistribute the man’s earnings.

God is impressed when His creatures do good freely, out of genuine charity. If the rich man is coerced to give his wealth, then no pleasing human act is performed.

In sum, my take on the “social justice” debate echoes that of some of my colleagues: Yes, Christians are exhorted to help the needy. The question is one of means, not ends. As for those means, the Religious Left couldn’t be more misguided in appropriating Christ’s exhortations as excessive demands for self-destructive welfare-statism.

Should we care about Greece's troubles?

The intertwined worlds of government and finance are swirling with drama not seen since the fall of Lehman Brothers in 2008. The epicenter of the current crisis is Greece. The Aegean nation’s sovereign debt has been downgraded to “junk” status while talk of outright default by the Greek government has arisen. The very survival of the euro – the 11-year-old currency used by Greeks and over 300 million other Europeans – has been brought into question.

Yields on the Greek government’s two-year notes have soared from 2.1 percent to 18.9 percent in the last few months, producing what one analyst termed “bond market Armageddon.” The Secretary General of the Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) has likened the bond market panic to the Ebola virus; the head of the International Monetary Fund (IMF) has warned of “contagion” – the potential for Greece’s sovereign debt crisis to spread to other heavily indebted European states.

How did Greece get into this mess? The primary cause has been fiscal irresponsibility. Sovereign governments that join the European Union pledge to keep their budget deficits below 3 percent of GDP. Greece’s most recent deficit is estimated to be almost 14 percent. It didn’t get there in one year. It turns out they have been lying about their deficits for years, employing those financial bad boys at Goldman Sachs to devise devious schemes for disguising the extent of their deficits.

Greece’s total indebtedness approximates 120 percent of GDP. Combined with this year’s 14 percent deficit, such

massive quantities of red ink suggest that Greece is essentially broke and its currency is due to take a tumble.

Here is where it gets complicated: Greece shares the euro with 15 (officially) or 20 (unofficially) other European countries. A devaluation of the euro makes no sense for European Union members with sounder fiscal policies. The inherent, perhaps fatal, flaw of the euro currency is that each member country pursues its own fiscal policies, some of which inevitably must be incompatible with the European Central Bank’s monetary policies.

Greece clearly needs to get its fiscal house in order if it is to regain financial credibility and stability. It lacks the political will to do so. Proposals to reduce government spending have caused Greek Air Force pilots to go on strike, anarchists and students to throw Molotov cocktails, and unions to call for a nationwide strike beginning May 5.

One raging debate has been whether Germany, the economically dominant European state, would bail out Greece. On the one hand, many Germans still resent the immense costs of re-integrating East Germans into the German economy after the dissolution of the Soviet bloc. If hard-working, industrious, fiscally disciplined Germans are fuming about helping their fellow Germans, who developed an entitlement mentality during their decades under socialism, they surely won’t want to bail out profligate Greeks.

Ah, but again there is a complicating factor: German banks, it turns out, own nearly half of Greece’s debts. Thus, German politicians are wrestling with the vexing question of whether they

will incur greater voter wrath by bailing out undeserving Greek deadbeats or by doing nothing and possibly precipitating a major crisis in the German financial system.

Should Americans care about all this? Not long ago, the euro was being touted as a possible competitor with the dollar for global foreign currency reserves. Not today. But if you are tempted to gloat, here are two reasons why you shouldn’t:

1) We Americans have become a significant player in the stop-gap Greek bailout. That is because the IMF has been like the cavalry riding to the rescue, promising big bucks to the Greek government. Since the largest contributions to the IMF come from the American taxpayer, we find ourselves once again picking up the tab for a bailout – this time, not for rich American financiers, but for corrupt and profligate foreign governments and special interest groups.

2) Our own debt and deficit figures are not too far from being as parlous as Greece’s.

These are historic times. We may be at the beginning stages of a great unraveling of several widely believed political myths – that democratic governments can exercise sufficient fiscal restraint to preserve their ongoing financial viability; that unbacked paper currencies imposed by governments and central banks can provide a long-lasting, sound medium of exchange; that countries can’t go broke; and that government debt is a relatively safe investment.

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DPS reminds travelers not to drink and drive

All available DPS troopers will be on patrol during the Memorial Day weekend in an effort to keep the traveling public safer.

"Most crashes are needless tragedies that easily could have been avoided; you don't want your holiday to end with the death of a loved one," said David Baker, assistant director in charge of the Texas Highway Patrol. "This weekend kicks off the summer season, and we are especially concerned about people who recklessly choose to drive drunk."

Troopers, and many law enforcement agencies across the state, will focus on drunk drivers, speeders and seat belt violators during the long holiday weekend.

During the Memorial Day holiday last year, DPS troopers arrested

622 drunk drivers and wrote nearly 8,511 speeding tickets. In addition, 1,937 seat belt and 521 child restraint citations were issued.

"Statistically, your chances of getting a ticket or getting arrested for DWI go up dramatically during holiday periods," said Baker.

DPS troopers are among the many officers across Texas participating in Click It or Ticket, a national campaign aimed at increasing the number of people who use their seat belts correctly. A seat belt dramatically increases the chance of survival in a serious crash.

DPS also is a participant in Operation CARE—Combined Accident Reduction Effort—a nationwide effort by police agencies to reduce fatalities during holidays.

Law mandates seatbelts in backseat

From May 24 to June 6, the Texas Highway Patrol and law enforcement officers across the state are participating in the ninth "Click It or Ticket" mobilization.

"This year's Click It or Ticket campaign reminds drivers and passengers that no matter how old you are or where in the vehicle you are sitting, you must buckle up," said Texas Highway Patrol Assistant Director David Baker. "Backseat passengers no longer have an excuse for not wearing a safety belt, and we will be issuing tickets to those who

are not complying with the law."

As of Sept. 1, 2009, state law has required everyone in a vehicle to be secured by a safety belt. Also, children younger than 8 years old must be in a child safety seat or booster seat unless they are taller than 4 feet, 9 inches tall.

When you buckle up in the back seat, you are 44 percent more likely to survive a crash than if you do not. If you're riding in the back of a passenger van or SUV, you are 73 percent more likely to survive if you're wearing a safety belt.

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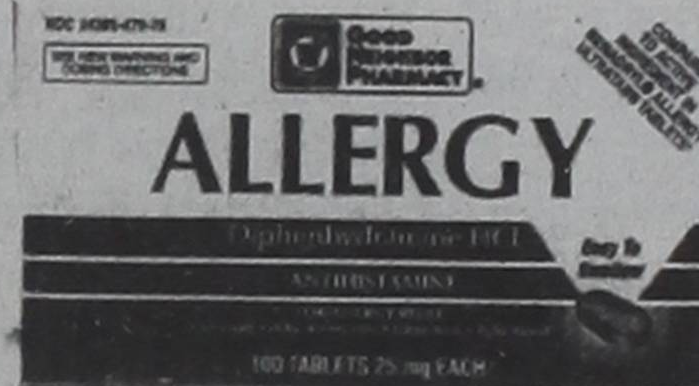

Remember the reason for Memorial Day

Memorial Day is next week-end, and to most Americans that means the end of the school year and the beginning of summer. Yes, it is a three day weekend with trips and backyard barbecues with friends and family while the true meaning of Memorial Day is lost to most.

Memorial Day was originally known as Decoration Day, a day of remembrance for those who have died in our nation's service. The first Memorial or Decoration Day is unknown, but there is evidence of organized women's groups in the south decorating graves before the end of the Civil War.

Waterloo, New York, was officially declared the birthplace by President Lyndon Johnson in 1966; and although it is difficult to prove exactly the origins of the day because

the idea of honoring the dead is a human response, it is important Memorial Day was established.

Memorial Day was first observed on May 30, 1868, following General Order #11 by Gen John Logan, national commander of the Grand Army of the Republic when flowers were placed on the graves of both Union and Confederate graves at Arlington National Cemetery.

After World War I, the holiday changed from honoring only Civil War casualties to include those from any war. It is now a federal holiday, but is observed the last Monday in May.

At Citizens Cemetery flags are placed on graves of those marked as a veteran, and a program is held on the courthouse lawn, but in many towns the meaning of Memorial Day

is forgotten.

Would moving the day back to May 30, the traditional day, bring more meaning to the day? It had that effect on Veterans Day, formally known as Armistice Day. As a three day weekend all meaning was lost so the people spoke, and it now is celebrated on 11-11 as it should be.

Appraisal district sends notices to property owners

Appraisal Notices for Tax Year 2010 are in the mail to area property owners.

If your property value increased in the last year by at least \$1,000, you should have received a notice of your 2010 appraised value from the Donley County Appraisal District. The appraisal district mailed about 1,042 notices on May 21. The notice also contains important information about the property's location, its

ownership and property tax exemptions that have been applied to the property. It also includes an estimate of 2010 taxes by local taxing units.

Your city, county, school district and other local taxing units will use the appraisal district's value to set your 2010 property taxes.

If you did not receive a notice you can contact the appraisal district office to verify your appraised value for 2010. The district's phone

New Flu Vaccine Approved for Seniors

The US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recently approved a seasonal influenza vaccine specifically for persons greater than 65 years of age. Clinical studies have shown that the new vaccine, called Fluzone High-Dose, produces a greater immune response compared to the normal Fluzone vaccine in persons 65 and older. This is thought to be important because the immune system gets weaker as people age, and this may affect how vaccines work in this age group. Following approval, the manufacturer is required to conduct more studies showing that the vaccine will be effective in decreasing seasonal influenza. Because Fluzone High-Dose is more potent, it has been shown to have higher rates of mild side effects compared to Fluzone. These side effects may include injection site pain, fever, muscle pain, and malaise. The vaccine is given as a single preservative free injection in the upper arm. People 65 and older may be at a higher risk for complications due to seasonal influenza. These complications can lead to hospitalization. Experts agree that the best way to prevent seasonal influenza is annual influenza vaccination.

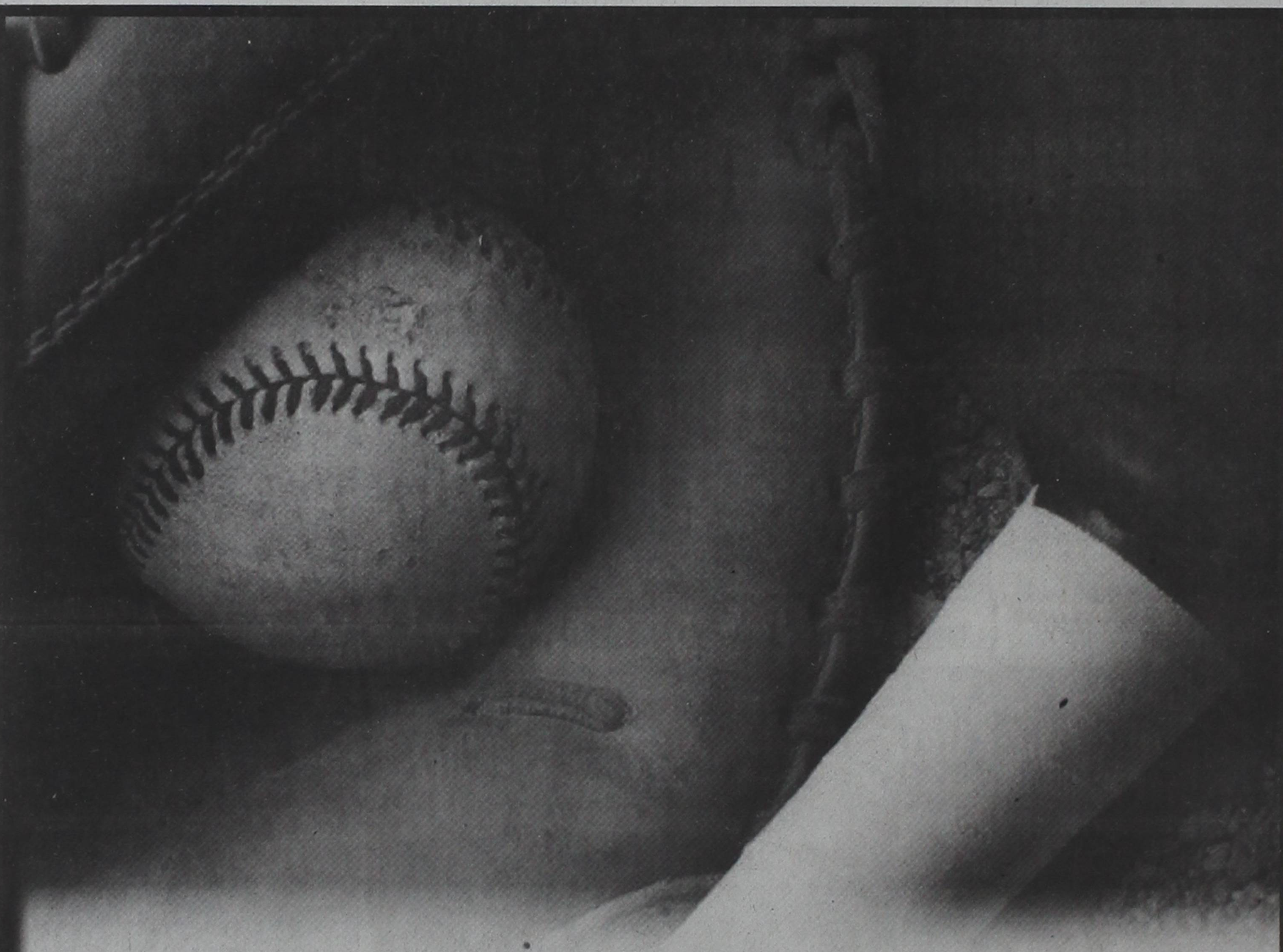

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Notice of Application Requesting an Adjustment to Energy Efficiency Cost Recovery Factor and Related Relief

On April 30, 2010, Southwestern Electric Power Company (SWEPCO) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) to approve an adjustment to SWEPCO's Energy Efficiency Cost Recovery Factor (EECRF). Section 39.905 of the Public Utility Regulatory Act and Section 25.181 of the Commission's Substantive Rules provide for the Commission to authorize a utility to implement an EECRF and annually adjust it to ensure the timely and reasonable recovery of the utility's costs incurred in connection with satisfying energy efficiency goals established by the Texas Legislature. In December 2009, the Commission authorized SWEPCO to place into effect during 2010 an EECRF designed to recover \$4,809,207 in energy efficiency costs, based on SWEPCO's projected energy efficiency costs to meet its energy efficiency objectives for 2010.

SWEPCO's April 2010 filing asks the Commission to adjust the EECRF for 2010 to increase it by \$699,335. The adjusted EECRF is requested to recover \$5,508,542 in energy efficiency costs in 2011, consisting of: (1) \$5,200,076 in projected energy efficiency costs for SWEPCO to meet its energy efficiency objectives for 2011; (2) return to customers of \$368,068 for over-recovery of energy efficiency revenues for its 2009 programs that were collected from SWEPCO's EECRF in 2009 in excess of its energy efficiency costs; and (3) a performance bonus of \$676,534 for SWEPCO's having exceeded its demand reduction goals for 2009.

All retail customers who take service from SWEPCO at below 69,000 volts are affected by the requested adjusted EECRF. The adjusted EECRF includes the following proposed charges on bills rendered to SWEPCO's retail customers during 2011:

Customer Category	EECRF
Residential	\$0.001260 per kWh
Commercial	\$0.000573 per kWh
Industrial	\$0.000964 per kWh
Lighting	\$0.000855 per kWh

The monthly amount billed in 2010 for service to a residential customer using 1000 kilowatt hours (kWh) per month will increase by approximately 11 cents under the adjusted EECRF. The effect of the adjusted EECRF on the amounts billed to other retail customers will vary depending on the rate schedules under which the customer takes service and on the customer's consumption of electricity.

Persons who wish to intervene in or comment upon these proceedings, Docket No. 38210, Application of Southwestern Electric Power Company to Adjust Energy Efficiency Cost Recovery Factor and Related Relief, should notify the Commission as soon as possible, as an intervention deadline will be imposed. the Best Western Red River Inn in Clarendon. After graduation Brittney plans to attend Frank Phillips College in Borger majoring in Agriculture.

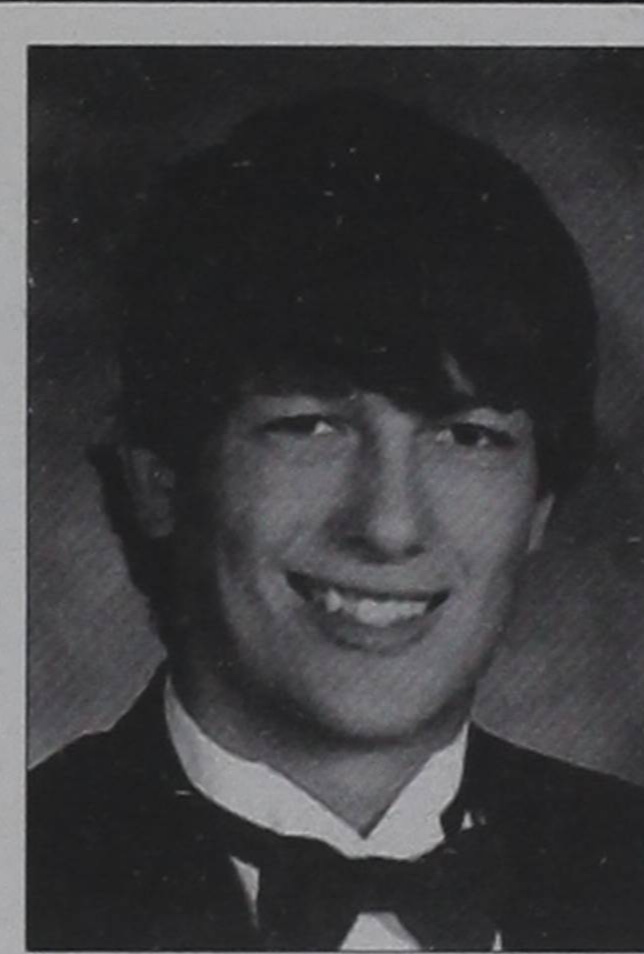
