YOUNG SCIENTIST WOUNDED IN GUN EXPERIMENT

The parents frantically rushed the wounded lad to the hospital where three shot were immediately removed. It is said that no permanent injury will result to the lad's hand.



OUR COUNTY AGRICULTURAL CONSERVATION OFFICE

A farmer behind a desk instead of in front of it is not as uncommon now as it used to be. A good example of this change is the County Agricultural Conservation office.

The Donley County office is located at Clarendon. The men in charge are the farmer-committeemen elected by farmers last fall and winter. Elections were held in all the communities in the county to name community committeemen and delegates to a county convention. The three farmers who administer the county agricultural conservation program were elected by the dele-

Those committeemen run their own farms and usually are at the county office only long enough to do their required administrative work. They are paid only for the time spent in this work and do not draw a regular salary.

Members of the committee are Roy Jewell, Chairman, W. M. Pickering, Vice chairman, and H. S. Mahaffey, member.

Since the committee is not in the office all the time, Mrs. Ritter is in charge of the office operations. She is assisted by Mrs. Carpenter and Clyde Neel in the office and by Charles Rains in the field work.

A major portion of the job of the county committee is administering the Agricultural Conservation Program. This starts with suggestions for the program a year ahead. The committee soon will be sending in recommendations for the 1949 program and farmers now are being invited to give their ideas to community committeemen or send them to the county office.

The major responsibility at this time of the year is meeting with farmers, explaining program practices and agreeing on conservation plans for the year. In this way farmers get details on how practices must be carried out and the help available. To qualify for assistance the farmers are obliged to carry out conservation practices as specified. Checks are made to see that practices are carried out to assure the desired results.

Other Programs administered by the county ACP office are crop loans and other price-support

WHAT IS YOUR T. L. Q.?

(Seventh of a Series) "Don't throw your weight

around," advises W. J. Elliott,

"Remember that when you are sitting behind the wheel, you are driving a car that weighs more than 2000 pounds, and the pedestrian crossing the street only weighs an average of 150 pounds. It isn't quite fair, is it?"

The Texas Highway Patrol is cooperating in a nationwide "Know and Obey Traffic Laws" program, and Chief Elliott said that accidents involving pedes- District Attorney for the trians are one of the biggest killers. He pointed out National Safety Council statistics to back up this assertion.

Pedestrians at intersections account for 28 per cent of all urban fatal accidents, and 35 per cent of County and District Clerk: all fatal accidents are non-intersection pedestrian mishaps. In addition, 27 per cent of all pedestrians killed in business and residential areas were crossing at intersections without signals, and 38 per cent were crossing between intersections.

Captain Polk Ivy of the Amarillo District emphasized the following things to remember for the driver in giving pedestrians right-of-way:

1. When pedestrians are crossing at unsignalized intersections, drivers must give them the rightof-way if they are walking in the crosswalk or where a crosswalk might be.

2. When pedestrians are crossing at signalized intersections they should obey the signals, but drivers turning right or left must yield the right-of-way to pedestrians crossing on the "green" or "walk" light.

3. Pedestrians do not have the right-of-way between intersections, and therefore they should cross only at corners.



13 DAYS LEFT TO BUY

The county tax office is reminding all vehicle owners that they have only 13 days left in which to purchase their new 1948 license plates before they will be violating the law. You must have your new plates on April 1st if you drive on a public highway or road, and to date only about onethird of the usual amount of tags have been purchased. WHAT IS YOUR

There are Emily Post rules of etiquette for the highway, just as there are for the drawing-room, according to W. J. Elliott, Chief of the Texas Highway Patrol.

"And traffic rules not only make for gracious living, they make for living-period!" he said. "No driver is a good driver unless he knows and obeys the traffice laws, to insure his own safety as well as the safety of other drivers and pedestrians."

Chief Elliott pointed out that nearly half of all accidents in business and residential areas involve two vehciles at an intersection, and half of these are the result of two vehicles entering at right angles intent on going straight through.

He said that statistics of the National Safety Council show 15 per cent of all drivers in fatal city accidents failed to yield the right-of-way, the most frequent violation.

The Texas Highway Patrol is cooperating in a nationwide "Know and Obey Traffic Laws" program, and Captain Polk Ivy of the Amarillo District listed the following facts to remember about right-of-way at intersec-

1. A car already in the intersection has the right-of-way over cars approaching. You must give way tto any car already there as you come up to the intersection.

2. If two cars arrive at an intersection at about the same time, the one on the right has the rightof-way, and the other driver must give way to him.

3. Slow down before you reach the intersection in order to be ready for a car on the cross street. Don't wait to slow down after you reach the corner-it may be too

4. Despite the rule, don't insist on your right-of-way at the risk of an accident. Humility is a small price to pay for safety. 5. If there are sttop signs at the




