SCHOOL ENROLLMENT UPED OVER LAST YEAR'S TOTAL

The enrollment in the Clarendon Public Schools is up this year over the 1946 total by twenty-five students. The total enrollment this year is 724 or that was the count which was made at the close of school Tuesday afternoon. The total last year was 699 students in all departments. This shows a general increase for the past two years as the total in 1945 was 615 students, 109 less than we have enrolled this year.

There were 84 students that enrolled in the Junior College—the same as last year. 157 enrolled in Senior High; 177 in Jr. High and 306 in the Elizabeth Stevens Ward school. This shows the greatest increase of students in the ward school.

The first two days of the week were spent with the enrolling job and straightening out of schedules and Wednesday found teachers and students getting into the regular routine of their year's work.

The enrollment in the college is very encouraging in that the total has held up as good as the previous year, for in 1945 the total was 43. Dean Drennan expressed the belief that it was possible that the college enrollment would grow some yet before the school term got very far along.

Five Horse Races Scheduled Here Sept. 20th

The Fat Stock Show committee met in the county agent's office on Friday afternoon to work out plans for the horse show and races to be held the afternoon of Sept. 19th and 20th in connection with the County Fair. They decided to have an open show for two breeds of horses, Thoroughbreds and Quarter horses, with eight classes to be shown in each breed which will consist of: Stallions, foals of 1944 and prior years; Stallions or geldings foals of 1945; Stallions or geldings foals of 1946; and stud colts foals of 1947; Brood mares foals of 1944 and prior years; Fillies foals of 1945; fillies foals of 1946 and filly colts foals of 1947.

There will be a kid pony class for children under 12 years of age, open for Donley county children only and must be shown under saddle; also a running class open to the world, any age, sex or breed. Each entry allowed one minute to show his or her mount.

The race meet to be held the afternoon of Sept. 20th will feature five races consisting of Donley County horses only and they will be races of $\frac{1}{4}$, $\frac{3}{16}$ and $\frac{1}{2}$ mile race for two year olds and a kid pony race.

It was further agreed to procure starting gates so matched races for out of county as well as county horses could be matched.

A complete breakdown of specifications concerning the fair will be given in the next issue of your Leader as County Agent H. M. Breedlove was out of town the first of the week and left word that he would have everything complete by next week.


Garrison urged immediate observance of this practice. After Sept. 5 it must be done under the new Uniform Traffic Code, effective that day.

New Traffic Law Just Good Sense

There is no reason why anyone should be confused by the new traffic safety law that goes into effect Sept. 5. The law itself is long and legal sounding, but boils down to good, sound horse-sense.

We're just getting rid of the old regulations, passed back in 1917 in the Model Days, and bringing them up to date. Ninety per cent of the things required by the new law are already being done by the average good driver—and the other ten per cent are things he knows he ought to be doing but isn't.

In the fewest possible words, here are the highlights of the Uniform Traffic Code, as the law is called:

People walking are required to cross streets and highways at designated cross-walks where these are provided; to use sidewalks where they can, or to walk facing the traffic, on the left side of the road, where there is no sidewalk. A pedestrian in a cross-walk has the right-of-way over all vehicles. These are the first real pedestrian regulations we have ever had in Texas, and the observance of them will keep a lot of people from "walking themselves to death."

Drivers are required to stay on the right side of the road, with certain sensible exceptions; dangerous maneuvers in passing are outlawed; right-of-way rules are set out; teeth are put into the stop-sign law; the safe manner of making turns and stops is designated, and uniform hand-and-arm signals are required for these maneuvers.

Following radiator-to-bumper is forbidden, and so is racing trains to crossings. Parking on a highway is outlawed except when the vehicle is out of order and can't be moved. Drivers are required to dim their lights 500 feet from an approaching vehicle at night.

Driving while under the influence of drugs is about the same as driving while drunk under the new law, even if the drugs were given by a dentist or doctor.

One part of the law that will make it rough on deliberately dangerous drivers is the new reckless driving clause. As it is now, a man can drive recklessly without violating any specific law, such as speeding, and the officer can't do anything with him. But under this new clause the reckless driver has a special noose to stick his head into.

The code requires every vehicle to have good lights and brakes and a horn. Trucks and busses must also have mechanical signaling devices when they are so built that hand-and-arm signals can't readily be seen.

Anyone who has a highway accident must stop and identify himself, give any help that is needed and immediately notify the nearest Highway Patrol or Sheriff's office. The driver must also make a written report to the Department of Public Safety within 24 hours if anyone is killed or hurt or if damage amounts to \$25 or more.

These accident reports are very important. They are confidential and are not used to get evidence against a driver, but to help us figure out where and when and why accidents are happening, so that whatever is necessary can be done to prevent future accidents —whether the remedy be engineering, education, or enforcement.

All traffic control signs and signals put up hereafter by any city or county or the State Highway Department will have to be like those used in most other states. This is to make it so that a person driving from one city to another or from one state to another, can find his way around without being confused.

Plenty Hot Here; 104 Wednesday

What is believed to be the hottest stretch of weather ever to be experienced here all in a row has supposedly taken place this week, or at least up through yesterday afternoon with the steaming mercury climbing up to the 104 degree mark, according to the official weather station at the Depot. We had some clouds Wednesday but they didn't seem to help any as the hot wind pushed the mercury up to the highest point for the summer. The reading Monday was 102½; Tuesday it dropped a degree to a fraction over 101 and then did the real climbing yesterday.

We have had several days in past years that went over the 104 reading but from all data available, we have never had so many days of 100 degree temperature in a row and especially in the month of September. You can expect most anything to happen during June, July or August but when September comes, we start looking forward to cool, autumn weather.

The weather man at Amarillo predicts another hot one for us today and possibly some relief by Friday. Someone mentioned that a good rain might help the situation, but something like that seems as far fetched as seeing a dozen ears of corn on one stalk.

Both feed and cotton are beginning to show the effects of the heat each day and especially the feed won't be able to stand it much longer. Let's all hope for the best -- and real soon.



VETERAN BOND CASHING REASONABLY SLOW HERE

According to reports from other sections of the country, veterans in Donley County were not making a very big rush to cash their terminal leave bonds, in comparison to the other places. Up through Wednesday afternoon approximately \$21,000 worth of bonds had been cashed by local banks.

Many of the veterans cashed their bonds but left the money in their checking accounts; others are using the money to pay past due accounts, notes and several have a better car, appliances and other merchandise in mind.

In general, the cashing of bonds here will speed up business a small degree but no great influx will be felt. Many of the veterans are going to hold their bonds in case the Legislature passes a bill during their next session raising the interest rate to 6 percent on these particular bonds. This would make them more money in the long run and the money will probably come in mighty handy later on down the line.

ALL VA ITINERATE CONTACT SERVICES TERMINATED

All Veterans Administration itinerate contact services, as provided through the Childress office, will be stopped effective September 15th, Robert W. Sisson, VA regional manager announced today.

Towns effected by the termination of VA contact services in the Childress area include Wellington, Clarendon, Spur, Memphis, Quanah, Paducah, Crowell, Matador and Knox City.

The Childress VA office will not be closed, Sisson said.

Final visit to Clarendon by Luther T. Nance, VA contact representative, was made Sept. 3.

"It is deeply regretted that itinerate VA contact service to veterans and their dependents in the Childress area must be eliminated, but such action is necessary in order to stay within the 1947-48 budget. No finer cooperation could be expected than has been extended by all the towns in this area," Sisson stated.

Veterans Administration services will continue to be rendered by direct contact at the Childress VA office or by correspondence with the regional office at Lubbock.

Veterans News

Military personnel being separated from the armed forces may use their terminal leave orders as a basis for obtaining a temporary six month certificate of eligibility for education or training under the GI Bill, the Veterans Administration has announced.

Under the new plan, if the applicant's orders reflect at least eight days of terminal leave, it will not be necessary for VA to check his service records to determine eligibility before authorizing matriculation in an educational institution or training establishment. However, these applicants are not eligible for subsistence allowance until they have been discharged formally, VA said.

The growing practice of installing new and rebuilt motors, some bearing no identification number, demands a strict accounting of both motor and serial numbers on vehicles to assure valid titles in the name of rightful owners.

New laws outline a procedure giving maximum protection to legal owners of all motor vehicles. When motors are exchanged, the vehicle owner must apply promptly to the Texas Highway Department for a correction of his certificate of title. Otherwise the title to his vehicle is clouded because its motor number does not correspond to his title, an awkward situation to handle when he tries to sell his car.

If the new or reconditioned motor bears a manufacturer's number, it should be used. If it is blank, as many are nowadays, the purchaser must apply direct to the Texas Highway Department at Austin for an assigned number. Forms for this application may be obtained from any County Tax Collector's office. It is illegal to stamp any number on a motor other than a number assigned by the Highway Department.

A new service has been provided for Texans who wish to take delivery on a new vehicle at the factory or from a dealer in another State. Temporary license plates for the exclusive use of buyers while driving their new car back home are now issued under another of the Fiftieth Session's new laws.

Suggested by Highway Department officials for the convenience of purchasers wishing to drive their new car back from the factory, the new law eliminates many thorny legal technicalities formerly incident to the practice. Temporary plates, good for thirty days, can now be secured without delay at the County Tax Collector's office, and carried to the factory or other out-of-state Morris.

delivery point. The owner may secure certificate of title to his new car and regular registration plates after returning to Texas.




