(28-4c) wells with connecting lines to reservoir and 4 pumps at a cost of \$17,316.00. About 300 new water meters have been bought and installed and most all old meters have been taken out and repaired. As a result of this investment, through these hot summer days Clarendon has had water, for which we are thankful, while some of our neighbor cities have had a water shortage.

Your bonded indebtedness has been reduced from \$166,000.00 to \$152,000.00, and we have \$29,500 in Sinking Fund to be applied when Bonds are payable.

Several hundred feet on new sewer lines has been added and new sewer maintenance equipment has been bought.

The City needs to extend sewer lines in two or three localities, also a new sewer disposal plant is needed. All of the streets of Clarendon need paving, some of them could be helped with more repairing. Our equipment for repairing is worn out and we could not buy new equipment if we had the money, but we are going to do our best with what we have.

Whatever has been accomplished is due, to a large part, because the people of Clarendon have paid their taxes and we sincerely trust that you will continue to cooperate by paying your taxes currently.
