Parents are urged to ascertain that their children are transferred to the schools which they are supposed to attend next fall in case they have moved or if the Chamberlain and daughters of Stock show next spring before necessary grades are not taught Claude, Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Riley in their home district, county Supt. Ruth Richerson said this

Applications for transfer of students must be filed with the county supt. before August 1, Miss Richerson emphasized.

If the school is classified by the County School Board as a sevengrade school, all children in the 8th grade and above must be transferred to the receiving high school, she explained.

A most important point for parents to remember, the county superintendent said, is that parents must pay transportation and tuition on children who attend a school outside the home district when the required grades are taught in the home school.



## District Attorney

I do not feel a stranger to Donley County, since my wife and I spent some two years in Donley County while we were students in Clarendon College. My life has been spent among the people of this Judicial District, except when temporarily away while serving as assistant Attorney General of Texas, and the more than two years I served in the Army, most of which was spent in the South






