People owning orchards should remember that now is the time for pruning orchards and shaping up the trees and taking out the dead limbs. Breedlove advises that pruning an orchard is the life of an orchard and gives less places for borers to start in trees. It is also time to treat trees for borers by using ethylene dichlo-

ride emulsion. The chemical can be bought at the local drug stores and should be applied to the trees






Christmas Day comes 12 days later than ours, or on January 6. Christmas Eve is celebrated with much traditional ceremony and festivity.

in Congressman Herter \reveals how embattled bureaucracy won its fight for continued padded appropriations. It is an intriguing story. It is a disturbing story also, for it reveals the completeness with which the American people are dominated by the pay roll perchers of entrenched and ruthless bureaucracy.

It is notorious that, a party clothed with a popular mandate to eliminate extravagance and reduce expenditures and taxes was thwarted in its efforts to validate the expressed popular will. There is nothing new in the mere declaration that the people who elected an economy congress were betrayed by the congress they elected. But the congressman's comments upon the methods employed by the bureaucrats in their battle for the boodle are quite informatory. They explain with definite clarity how the pay roll army resorted to exaggeration, deception and downright falsehood to throttle the economy drive.

The Ukrainian Christmas festival lasts three days. In the villages sing-ers known as Kolyadniky go from house to house singing the Kolyadky folksongs relating the birth of Christ and the events of his life. They usually carry a manger with them, and in some cases they perform miracle plays. They are reward-ed by gifts of food or money.

Danger From Tree Fire Ever Present

Although the Christmas tree is one of the most picturesque Yule-tide ornaments, it is also one of the most dangerous, with the threat of fire an ever present possibility.

Replacement of the candle by the electric light has removed some of the hazards formerly experienced, but danger still lurks from faulty ns or careless handling bulbs and strings.

To minimize the fire hazard, t epartment of agriculture offers wo pertinent suggestions: First, two pertinent suggestions: First, keep the tree well watered and, d, fireproof it with amm lphate or calcium chloride.

credulous public dismayed by the prospect of losing the service of the men who guard our frontiers and seaports from the smugglers of contraband, frantically appealed to congress to give the service the money it was asking for.

When a committee voted to give the postal service more money than it was receiving but less than it was asking for, the country was flooded with announcements that mail deliveries would have to be curtailed sharply. Again a credulous public began to plead with congress to throw away the economy axe and surrender to the forces of plunder. When a committee voted to give the Indian service less money than it asked for but more than it had been receiving until recently, the country was flooded with notices that the Indian schools would have to close and that countless Indian offices throughout the country would have to be abolished. Straightway disturbed idealists and distracted chambers of commerce began to bombard congress with demands that the schools and the agencies be saved.

These illustrations reveal the pattern. It was a pattern of deception, of exaggeration, and of unvarnished falsehood. The country was conquered by lies and congress was conquered by its own cupidity and cowardice. The faithless servants of a betrayed people now trumpet gleefully that the reductions made in government expenses were inconsequental-that really there was almost no reduction at all. So a people burdened with the vastest national debt in all history must also pay a current maintenance bill that is 300 per cent greater than the total cost of govern in 1939. The costlicst fal in our annals have been written indelibly in the records of the government. - The Daily Oklaman (Okla. City)

Abbreviation, Xmas Of Greek Origin

There has been much unfavorable comment on the abbreviated form for Christmas that is commonly used. Many think it inappropriate and undignified to use the shortened form, Xmas.

The explanation of its origin is that the initial letter of the Greek name for Christ is X and the coincidence of its cruiciform shape led to an early adoption of this letter as the figure and symbol of Christ. X is frequently found on walls of the catacombs. When the early Christians wished to make a representation of the Trinity, they would place either a cross or an X beside the names of the Father and the Holy Ghost. Passengers boarding there can reach all cities on the Pioneer system easily, and through connecting carriers, will be but a few hours from all sections of the country, it was pointed out.

The addition of Plainview brings to seventeen the number of Texas cities connected by Ploneer Air Lines.







Hardly have the children recovered from their oversupply of candy and wild duck when Santa returns in time for "Old Christmas," which for hundreds of years Rodantheans have celebrated on January 5. This time, however, Santa is accompanied by a menacing ogre, known as "Old Buck,"



who takes care of the bad children while Santa administers to the good. The historical background of "Old Christmas" is uncertain. It may be a throwback to the Gregorian calendar or it may have started as a celebration of the Twelfth Nightwhen the wise men came to Bethlehem bearing gifts for the Christ child-that somehow got off schedule a' day. Elsewhere the Twelfth Night is celebrated on January 6. But those celebrations are far different from Rodanthe's "Old Christmas," which only in recent years has been supplemented by the ob-servance of December 25.

Christmas Brought Jesters Medieval kings used to have fools and jesters to amuse them. Later, however, the wearers of the cap and bells were not the exclusive possession of kings and queens, princes, counts, barons and bishops, for the fashion of keeping buffoons passed from sovereigns to corporations and private individuals. These jesters were then brought into requisition during the Christmas season, and retained to brighten up the hall and kitchen with their witty sayings and mactical jokes

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




