Ruling Enables State To Keep Palo Duro Park

AUSTIN - Atty. Gen. Grover Sellers recently approved a compromise agreement under which the state may retain beautiful and unique Palo Duro State Park near Canyon,

Under the agreement an indebtedness against the park, which had mounted to approximately \$600,000, will be reduced to \$300,000 and the interest rate from 6 to 3 per cent.

The Commerce Trust Company of Kansas City, which holds mortgages and a vendor's lien on the park, had planned foreclosure proceedings July 2, but withheld them until the Attorney General could rule on the legality of the agreement reached with the State Park Board.

The state board acquired the park in 1933. First-mortgage notes became due and went unpaid last November.

The only funds available to make payments on the property come from one half of the income from a charge for admission to the park.

In ruling on the opinion sought by Raymond Dillard, Mexia, chairman of the parks board, Sellers said the board has the legal right to accept a reduction in the principal and interest on the property and extension of the due date.

He designated the park board as the proper authority to make such an agreement and to be liable to pay such indebtedness out of rents, revenues and other income received from the park.

Pale Duro Park is one of the most unique and popular parks in Texas. In May 7,068 persons visited the park, the third largest number in any state park recreation ground. The park includes acreage on both sides of Palo Duro Canyon.



its control on the supplies of 27 materials and parts which manufacturers may keep in inventory. This is to prevent firms from buying them up and holding them as a hedge against rising raw materials prices.

"What we are after is to see that scarce materials go to the manufacturer whose finished products go immediately to the consumer, rather than to those who plan to withhold manufactured products awaiting possible price increases," said CPA Administrator John D. Small in a statement.

The order specifies that a manufacturer may not hold an inventory more than 30 days' output of second year's mowing the brush his goods, or not more than a is cut in a direction opposite to "practicable minimum working that of the first cutting. inventory," whichever is less.

"This means that if a manufacturer now has an excess inventory of any of the listed manufactured products, he has the choice of either increasing his sales or curtailing production, Small explained.

Sickness

Now is the time to vaccinate for "sleeping sickness" or as the scientists call it encephalomyelitis which occurs in horses during the hot months of July, August and September. Early vaccination is recommended and too often ranchers and farmers wait until the disease starts before vaccinating. We can never tell when it will occur and last year over seven hundred thousand head of horses were vaccinated against the disease. Last year was one of the lightest years in eleven

H. M. Breedlove, county agent says that Texas has both types of the disease, both eastern and western types and in this section it is the Western type.

Vaccination is good insurance against this disease and Breedlove advises that anyone wishing this service to call by his office.
