



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

A general closing date for reporting practices carried out under the 1946 Program is August 15th. The practices that should be reported to the county AAA Office are those for which Prior Approvals have been granted and mailed to all Producers.

Contour Farming, Strip Cropping on the contour, strip cropping on the straight row, summer fallow, contour listing, and any other practice for which an approval has been granted should be reported to the office before the closing date. At any time between now and August 15 these reports may be mailed or brought in. The extent of practices reported in acres must be based on measurements in all cases. Offical acreages determined under prior programs, as shown on performance reports or farm maps should be used, if available. Otherwise, the acreage should be determined by other methods-such as scaling principal dimensions from a farm map, field measurements of average length and width, or subtracting a relatively small known acreage from the total acreage for the field-assuring accuracy ac ceptable to the county committee ------

Dairy Production Payments are now being made at the county AAA Office for sales of cream or whole milk made during the months of April, May and June. All evidence should be brought to the office before August 31, if payment is received. All receipts of sales made after July 1 should be retained by Producers so that, in case subsidies are continued,





Every feed contains digestible nutrients. The job of feeding dairy cows is to supply the right kind and amount as well as low cost nutrients.

Analysis of the pounds of digestible nutrients that can be furnished for one dollar at average prices from 'dairy feed, hay, silage and pasture shows that pasture is by far the cheapest with 150 pounds total digestible nutrients for one dollar. Silage is the second less expensive with 60 pounds digestible nutrients per dollar and hay follows closely with 50. Dairy feed brings only 21 pounds total digestible nutrients per dollar.

The feeds that the cow was built to handle furnish the nutrients at lowest cost. The successful dairyman does just as much as possible of the job of feeding with cheap nutrients keeping in mind that each of the above mentioned feeds has an important place in any feeding program.
