Funeral Services Held Saturday For Jim Heckman

Funeral services for Jim Heckman, who died suddenly from a heart attack last Wednesday, were held Saturday afternoon at the Murphy-Spicer-Buntin Funeral Chapel with Rev. James McLeod officiating.

James (Jim) Heckman was born May 1, 1880 in Montague County, Texas. He and his family moved from Montague County to Clarendon in the fall of 1882, and lived on Spring Creek while his father, John Heckman, worked for the Goodnight and Adair ranch until the spring of 1883. They then moved down on Red River near Brice and Antelope Flat where he grew to manhood. He attended Heckman school and worked on the JA ranch, helping his father and other men put up hay and build fence. He later attended Goodnight College 1901-1902 and lived in the Goodnight home. He lived and worked on the JA ranch most of his life, retiring in 1919.

On May 21, 1911, Mr. Heckman was married to Miss Welthe Jane McCracken. To this union were born four children, but only a son, Lawrence Heckman, is now living.

Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Welthe Jane Heckman; a son, Lawrence Heckman of Clarendon; one sister, Mrs. Mary Cross of Silverton; five brothers, Will Heckman of Amarillo; Al and George Heckman of Clarendon; Dan Heckman of Happy and Henry Heckman of Silverton.

\$2,000 Wrist Watch Found At Scene Of Recent Wreck

Some mighty queer things happen along life's way, and some of them along with the tragic events that are an every day occurrence.

Two weeks ago tonight three people were critically injured and died as a result of a car wreck near Goodnight. Mrs. H. C. Minton Jr., one of the fatally injured, was wearing a \$2,000 dollar wrist watch at the time of the accident, and the watch was never accounted for by relatives. Since the watch was insured, a representative of the insurance company journeyed to Clarendon where he went through the demolished Lincoln thoroughly. After finding no trace of the watch there, he called Sheriff Moore at Claude and asked him to visit the scene of the accident and see if it could possibly still be there. Only a short time later the Armstrong county sheriff reported finding the watch with only a small portion of the band sticking up out of the hardened mud where it had been trampled in by the hundreds that stopped to look over the tragic scene. The finding of the valuable watch was 12 days after the accident happened, and is a very unusual incident particularly since so many people had visited the scene where the accident occurred.

AUSTRIAN WINTER PEAS SHOWING GOOD RESULTS IN SEED PRODUCTION

Farmers and ranchers who planted Austrian Winter peas this past fall are reporting good results with the harvesting of the seed. All persons are reporting from three hundred to four hundred pounds of seed per acre. Breedlove, local county agent, says that plenty of seed will be available in the county for every one wishing to plant the peas.

The peas are a wonderful soil building crop and should be planted at the rate of thirty pounds per acre and should be planted after the first of September when the moisture is good.

Seed can be purchased at this time from C. J. Minnick of Clarendon and Elmer Dishman of Hedley.

The Austrian winter pea has proved it will do well in Donley County and Breedlove is urging that everyone plant some this fall and turn them under in the spring as a green manure crop. Anyone wishing additional information can call by the county agent's office.

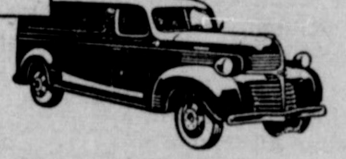
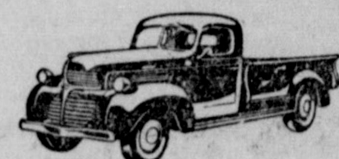

The railroads have received 44 "rules" demands from the leaders of the operating unions... representing engineers, firemen, conductors, trainmen and switchmen. They say they are seeking only changes in working conditions—NOT a wage increase.

More Money For Less Work

But what kind of rules are being asked for? Twenty-eight of them would compel railroads to pay more money for the same, or less work; 7 would require additional and unnecessary men to do the same work; the rest would bring about changes in operating practices at increased cost.

For Instance:

The Union leaders demand additional train and engine crews on Diesel-powered trains—one full crew for every power unit in the locomotive. A freight train hauled by a 4-unit Diesel would have to carry 4 engineers, 4 firemen, 4 conductors, and at least 8 brakemen, or a total of 20 men instead of 5.

"Made Work"—Sheer Waste

The Union leaders demand that full-length freight trains be cut to about half their length, even though such trains are most efficient for low-cost service to you. This rule would call for twice as many locomotives, would double the number of trains, and make accidents more likely.

Additional equipment, yards, and other facilities required to take care of these short trains would cost hundreds of millions. What the Union leaders really want is to make more jobs.

The Union leaders demand that when a crew in one class of service perform incidental service of another class, they will be paid not less than a day's pay for each class, even though all service is performed as a part of the same day's



work. The crew would get at least two days' pay for one day's work. The Union leaders demand that the present basic day for passenger con-

ductors and trainmen be reduced from 150 to 100 miles, which would have the effect of increasing their pay 50%. Such a run often takes only two or three hours!

You Can't Afford This Waste

Demands like these are against the interests of the whole American people, who depend on railroad service for nearly everything they eat, wear and use.

These rules would cost A BILLION DOLLARS annually—a gigantic waste which neither the railroads nor the country can afford.

Railroad workers are good citizens and good employees, with pride in their calling. Their record during the war was outstanding. We do not believe they fully understand the "featherbed" rules which the Union leaders are demanding. We do not believe they understand the harmful results which these rules would have to the railroad industry, to the millions of men and women dependent on railroads for their livelihood, and to the shipping and consuming public.

The great strength of America is in production—an honest day's work for an honest day's pay.

For only through greater production can we hope to stop the steady upward surge of living costs.

Surely, if ever there was a time in our history when we needed to work, not waste, this is it.

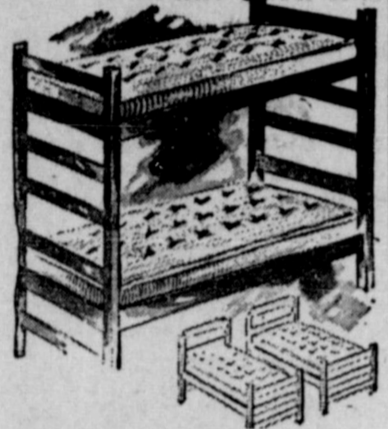

"Any high school graduate is eligible to apply for technical courses of his choosing prior to enlistment and without obligation to himself," the Sgt. said. Training in such courses as airplane woodwork, aircraft welder, airplane and engine mechanic, parachute rigging, bombight mechanic, radio, radar, telephone and telegraph, weather observer, photographer, draftsman, electrician, plumber, refrigeration mechanic, diesel mechanic, mechanic, sheet metal worker, clerk typist and many more too numerous to mention here, are waiting for young high school graduates to step right in and begin training and getting the "know how."

Sgt. Parrott stated that the procedure for this new program is as follows: Each applicant should write directly to the commanding general Air Training Command, Barksdale Field, La., and give his full name, address, age, race, civilian occupation, summary of previous military service (if any) a transcript of his high school grades and three letters of recommendation. Then should list three courses of training in order of preference selected from the above or, complete list available at the local recruiting office, City Hall, Shamrock, Texas.

The Air training Command will review each application and notify each individual of his selection. Accepted applicants will be required to take 13 weeks of basic training at the air training command, San Antonio, Texas, selected applicants will immediately be entered into the course for which selected. Personnel with prior service who are otherwise qualified for enlistment will be entered into their courses of training as soon as possible following their enlistment, Sgt. Parrott stated. "And I wish to add," said Sgt. Parrott, "that during the high school graduates expect training of handling the most modern and scientific devices for safe guarding world peace, he is at the same time building college time-up to a maximum of 48 months. An applicant is entitled to 1 month of college education who has served between 16 September 1940 and the official declaration of the termination of the war.

"In addition, he is eligible for one month of education for every month he served prior to the official declaration. This training may be taken at any college or university, trade or business school for which he can qualify. The government will pay tuition up to \$500 per ordinary school year plus \$65 monthly allowance

for living expenses—\$90 if married. The Government stands ready to pay up to \$5,120 for your education alone—an opportunity that Uncle Sam has laid before the young men of our nation.

A breakdown of the classification shows 2.1 percent of the cattle classified purple ribbon; 30 percent, blue ribbon; 42.8 percent, red ribbon; 21.1 percent, white; and 4 percent, yellow. Six different breeds of dairy cows were entered in the 33 shows—Ayrshire, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein and Milking Shorthorn.

COUNTY AGENT OFFERS PICKLED PEACH RECIPE

Pickled peaches are one of America's favorite sweet spicy relishes, and H. M. Breedlove, County Agent, has received a recipe from the Extension Service for making them. Here it is:

8 lbs. of small or medium sized peaches. After they are washed and pared, two cloves are stuck in each peach or two-inch sticks of cinnamon and 2 tablespoons of whole cloves may be tied loosely in a clean, thin, white cloth and placed to cook with 2 lbs. of sugar, 1 quart vinegar and 1 cup water for 10 minutes. The peaches are added to the liquid and cooked slowly until tender but not broken. After standing overnight, syrup is drained from the peaches and spices removed. The syrup is boiled rapidly until thickened, and poured over peaches already packed in clean, hot, sterile jars, and sealed tightly.

To give time for the flavor to be blended, the jars of peaches should be kept in a cool place for several weeks before serving.

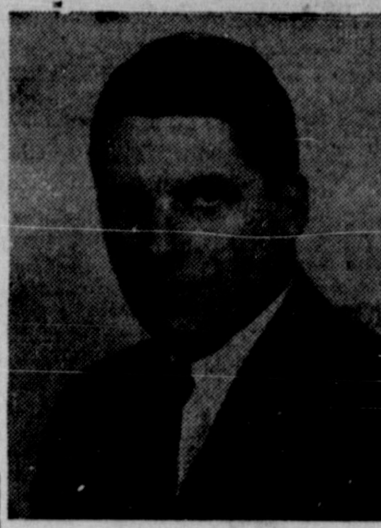
NANCY BELL IS QUEEN OF XIT REUNION AT DALHART
