AUSTRIAN WINTER PEAS SHOWING GOOD RESULTS IN SEED PRODUCTION

Farmers and ranchers who planted Austrian Winter peas this past fall are reporting good results with the harvesting of the seed. All persons are reporting from three hundred to four hundred pounds of seed per acre. says that plenty of seed will be one wishing to plant the peas.

The peas are a wonderful soil building crop and should be planted at the rate of thirty pounds per acre and should be planted after the first of September when the moisture is good.

Seed can be purchased at this time from C. J. Minnick of Clarendon and Elmer Dishman of Hedley.

The Austrian winter pea has proved it will do well in Donley County and Breedlove is urging that everyone plant some this fall and turn them under in the spring as a green manure crop. Anyone wishing additional information can call by the county






