

Donley County Vocational School Opens Office At City Hall

Office for the Donley County Vocational School for Veterans has been opened at the City Hall this week. J. R. Gillham will serve as coordinator of the county vocational school program and Mrs. Dona Lane will serve as office secretary for the program.

Three courses in agriculture are being offered at Hedley and Clarendon at this time and according to Gillham at least one other agricultural class will probably be organized by September. Any veteran actively engaged in farming for himself may enroll in the program whether he owns or leases a place or lives with his parents and farms. Each veteran attends the class 42 hours per month and draws subsistence from \$65 per month upward depending on whether or not he is single, married, or disabled, and how many are dependent upon his income.

Claude Moore, Frank Cannon, O. D. Lowry, and Gillham are serving as instructors in the agriculture classes.

Starting July 1st, a course in distributive education will be offered. This course deals with the business fields of retailing, wholesaling, service selling, and finance. Any veteran actively en-
