CIVIL SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENT

The Southern Regional Research Laboratory of the Department of Agriculture located in New Orleans, Louisiana needs Chemists, Physicists, Engineers, and Mathematicians to fill new positions created by expansion of the research facilities of the Laboratory.

In order to fill these positions by probational appointment, the Tenth U. S. Civil Service Region, New Orleans, Louisiana has announced examinations for Chemist (Organic and Physical), Physicist (Electricity and Magnetism, Optics, Mechanics, and Instrument Design) with salaries ranging from \$3397 to \$5905 per annum, Mechanical and Chemical Engineer, \$3397 to \$4149 per annum, and Mathematician at \$3397 per annum.

No written test will be required. Applicants' ratings will be based on applicable training and experience shown in their applications.

Age limits of 18 to 62 years are waived for veterans.

STAFF SGT. JAMES E. GUY WITH EIGHTH ARMY IN KYOTO, JAPAN

Staff Sergeant James E. Guy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter A. Guy, of Clarendon, Texas, is now serving with the Saga Military Government Team, in Saga, Kyushu, as a Clerk.

The Saga Military Government Team has the vital role of acting as a mediator between the occupation forces and the Japanese people in Saga, Prefecture. Such items as safety, sanitation, public works, law, local government, personal and public health, and various other administrative tasks all come under the jurisdiction of the numerous military government.

Staff Sgt. Guy enlisted in the army on 28 August 1940 at Lubbock, Texas, and after completing the basic training at Fort Bliss, Texas he served at 91 Infantry in Camp White Oregon, then he was transferred to the 1913rd Station Hospital in Oregon. On 8 November 1946 he was shipped overseas to Japan, and was assigned to the present unit. Prior to entering the service he worked for Railroad, as a Switchman.

SOCIAL SECURITY ANNOUNCEMENT

It has come to the attention of the Social Security Administration that some employers are reporting wages for themselves as well as their employees, according to J. R. Sanderson, Manager of the Amarillo Office of the Social Security Administration. "Employers in unincorporated businesses who have reported wages for themselves should file for a refund of the tax which they have paid on their own wages. The application for refund should be filed with the Collector of Internal Revenue before the expiration of four years after the payment to the Collector of the tax," he continued.

"At present, old-age and survivors insurance benefits under the Social Security Act are limited to wage earners. Excluded, therefore, are many persons who work for their living. They are the self-employed — owners of small stores, farmers, insurance agents, and others. The Social Security Administration has recommended that the old-age and survivors insurance system be extended to all self-employed persons," Mr. Sanderson said.

MARINE CORPS HYMN NOW CENTURY OLD

December marks the 100th birthday of the Marine Corps Hymn, Earl G. Hopkins, Marine Corps recruiter of the Amarillo station announced.

Mystery shrouds the origin of the official marching song of the Leathernecks, but extensive research indicates that it was first sung in 1847. An unknown Marine is believed to have written the lines "From the Halls of Montezuma To the Shores of Tripoli" shortly after the Marines had stormed the palace of Chapultepec in Mexico City — The Halls of Montezuma, Sgt. Hopkins said.

Even the origin of the music is doubtful. It is believed to have been adapted from an old Spanish Folk tune, although the melody also occurs in the French opera "Genevieve De Brabant" by Jules Offenbach.
