Two One-Act Plays To Be Presented November 20th At College Auditorium

Two one-act plays sponsored by the Band Parents Organization and presented by the Cue and Curtain club under the direction of Mrs. Jolly Johnson will be an anticipated feature entertainment on the night of Nov. 20th at the College Auditorium. A short resume of the two plays is given below so you will have an idea of the enjoyment in store for you on that night.

"His First Shave"
"His First Shave" is a one-act play centered around the first shave of a fourteen year old boy and the reactions of his family and friends in this very important event in the boy's life. The cast of nine members has been selected from students of junior high school age. Sandra Shelton, as Grandmother Judson, is a mixture of philosophy and wit, and her sage advice to sweet modern Mrs. Judson, Mary Ann Landers, is hard to take by that mother who just cannot realize that children will grow up whether mothers and grandmothers like it or not. Sammy Patterson assumes the role of Mr. Judson, equal to the big things in life but inclined to be upset over the smaller ones. The Judson children, Don, whose first shave it is, and Janie, twelve, who is a spoiled brat (according to her fourteen year old brother) are typical youngsters and Jackie Brooks as Don and Patsy Estlack as Janie are true to type. Don's friend, Harry, sixteen years old and free with the advice of his maturity and experience, is played by Wilson Lane. Hannah, the Judson's maid, has been with the family so long she feels free to express her opinion about Don, whose face is as smooth as an egg, and his shaving and falling in love. Inelle Cox and Annette Thomas who have the parts of the "Also-ran" and "The Winner," play the parts of the visiting cousins who complicate matters for everybody. The play is light comedy but is definitely not a "slap stick." The cast has spent much time and effort on this production and "His First Shave" promises to be worth-while entertainment.

"The Doctor's Affair"
"The Doctor's Affair" is another comedy in one-act; however this play is of a more mature nature than "His First Shave". Ladelle Cox, as Marcia Canover, is the woman doctor who has the affair. Ann Thompson has the role of Rhea Blackstone, the doctor's cool, unflinching secretary. Gertrude Faber, who is an excellent nurse but a very romantic girl is played by Jane Johnson. Mae Morris has the part of Miss Jackson, a humorous, neurotic patient who enjoys poor health. Marcia's childhood friend, Pauline Templeton who is now a modern light-hearted matron, is played by Shirley Brumley. Joan Ritter has the part of Marcia's rival, ruthless but sparkling Jewel Dowling.
The Doctor's affair holds strong audience appeal and has won several one-act play interscholastic league contests.
Between the two performances, Jackie Estlack and George Thompson, Jr. will present a clever Chinese musical skit.
Make your plans now to enjoy this evening's entertainment on the night of November 20th at 8 p. m. The proceeds from the plays will go to the Band Parents Organization.

The Broncs went into the game with plenty of fighting spirit to win the game but after the first half was finished with rough breaks (most of them penalties), their spirit was broken but they kept on scrapping until the final whistle blew and were in scoring distance several times.

The Cyclones scored twice in the 2nd quarter with Davis driving over from the 3 yd. line for the first tally and then Don Morrison carried over from the 10 after Memphis took over on a Clarendon fumble on a fourth down on the Clarendon 19 yard line. Their third and final score came in the third when Gardenhire went around left end for 12 yards and the counter.

Funeral Rites For Mrs. J. T. Warren Held Saturday

Last rites honoring the memory of an early Baptist missionary and teacher to China, Mrs. Cora Oxner Warren, were held Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the First Baptist church with Rev. S. R. McClung of Grand Prairie, Texas officiating.

Mrs. Warren died Thursday evening in St. Anthony's Hospital at Amarillo. She had been ill for several months. For the past 7 years she had made her home with her daughter, Mrs. L. E. Van Doran at Amarillo.

In 1904, two years after her marriage at Pilot Point to Dr. N. Oxner, the couple left for China to begin their work as medical missionaries. Settling in Pingtee Province, Dr. Oxner founded a hospital there which still bears his name. Dr. Oxner died in China in 1907, but his wife remained in the foreign country 7 more years on her own personal initiative to educate a Chinese scholar, D. K. Yang.

Because of failing health, Mrs. Warren returned to this country and made her home in Clarendon. There she met and married Gus Johnson who died shortly after the couple had moved into their new home.
Following Mr. Johnson's death, Mrs. Warren became the wife of the late J. T. Warren, Clarendon, and resided here until his death in 1929.

Mrs. Warren was born in Brooksville, Winston County, Miss., Sept. 17, 1877.

Surviving relatives include the daughter, Mrs. Van Doran; two step-sons, W. D. Rumble, Denver, and J. Marvial Warren, Pasadena, Calif.; two granddaughters. Pallbearers were Scott Reneau, R. T. Brown, Joe Goldston, A. W. Simpson, W. W. Taylor and J. D. Swift.

Burial was in Citizens Cemetery with the Murphy-Spicer-Buntin Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

SAVE YOUR HOG FEED BY USING PHENOTHIAZINE

Much feed can be saved in the feeding of hogs by the use of phenothiazine. This can either be given in the form of tablets or as a powder in the feed. H. M. Breedlove, county agent, recommends that it be given as powder in the feed because this is the easiest way for the owner of the hogs. Worn hogs will not respond to feed and are never healthy and put on a lot of weight.

"We need to get the most out of our feed at this time," Breedlove stated, "and a little money spent for the worming of pigs is money well spent. The price of grain makes all of us want to get the most out of the feed fed to livestock. Practically all pigs are wormy at some time or another and the best protection is to worm pigs right after weaning and the pigs are beginning to fatten."

Proportions for giving worming medicine can be obtained by calling at the office of the county agent.

Local Wreck Victims Are Improving

According to latest reports Wednesday afternoon Mr. and Mrs. L. O. Morris and Jerry Don (Pecos) Phillips are getting along nicely considering their condition following the head-on collision in which they were involved last Saturday night.

Officers report that the accident occurred about 10:30 Saturday evening between Martin and Ashtola as the Morris car was going west and collided head-on with a vehicle headed east and occupied by O. E. Mahafee and Bob Gasaway of Amarillo.

Gasaway was the most seriously injured and died in a Dallas hospital Monday after being flown to Baylor hospital Sunday in Dr. Lowell's plane. Mr. Morris received a deep head cut and other minor injuries. Mrs. Morris is reported to have received several broken ribs and severe shock, and Jerry Phillips received a fractured skull. Royce Morris and Mahafee were not seriously injured.

In order for shipment over seas they are requesting wheat, flour and cases of canned goods. All food must be in 100 pound lots or fifty pounds and canned goods in cases. People who do not feel that they can give this much can give a donation to the attendant in charge of the collection point mentioned and this money will go into the flour fund to buy flour to put on the Friendship train. The food collected in Clarendon will be sent to Amarillo on Saturday, November 15th to be loaded on the Friendship train leaving from that point. The food will all arrive in New York on Nov. 18th and be loaded on boats for Europe. Friendship trains will run in Europe over Italy, France and Germany to distribute the food. In those countries American charity organizations will distribute the food to see that it goes direct to the people.

Let's all get behind this move and give money or food to help out starving Europe and try to prevent another war. You will only have one day to attend to this when you receive your copy of the Leader. Contact your neighbors right now and see that he has given to this worthy cause.

Fire Damages Local Firm & Building

Fire which broke out at the noon hour Saturday caused several thousands of dollars damage to the Pastime Theatre building and stock in the H-B Electric which is located in the north portion of the building.

The fire was said to have started in the rear of the H-B Electric and the fire was confined to that portion of the building although considerable damage was done to the whole structure through smoke damage. Firemen fought the blaze several minutes before bringing it under control, but were able to keep it from spreading and causing a very disastrous blaze which could have very easily included that entire half block of business firms.

Lee Bell, manager of the Theatre, stated the approximate estimated damage to the building would run around \$3,000. The damage to the stock in the H-B Electric was estimated between two and four thousand and the personal effects and furnishings of Mr. and Mrs. H. B. Parsons, one of the partners of the firm, were a total loss.

The Electric firm is holding a fire sale this week to dispose of their present stock which is still useable and plan to re-stock the firm with all new merchandise just as soon as the building is repaired.

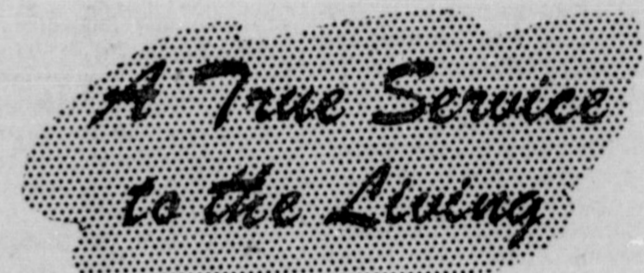

NATIONAL FARM LOAN ASSOCIATION MEETING HELD IN AMARILLO

A greater volume of Land Bank loans was closed in Texas during 1946 than in any year since 1935, according to C. B. Morris of Clarendon, president of the Donley County National Farm Loan Association, and Secretary-Treasurer Rayburn L. Smith who attended a conference of NFLA leaders held in Amarillo this week.

"This increase in loans indicates a desire of landowners to put their financing on a long-term basis and tie down today's low interest rates," Mr. Morris said.

At the meeting in Amarillo, reports showed that the Land Bank has practically completed its program of decentralizing loan servicing functions begun 5 years ago. The result is that today most of the business farmers and ranchers have with the Land Bank can

be transacted with their own home association. Operations of the local associations and plans for the annual stockholder's meeting of the Federal Land Bank of Houston in February were discussed.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston is completely owned by Texas farmers and ranchers through the 143 local national farm loan association, Mr. Morris said. The Land Bank, with no government funds of any kind invested in it, now has combined capital, surplus, and reserves amounting to more than \$43,000,000. This is in addition to approximately \$6,000,000 in reserves and surplus of the associations in their own local accounts.

FOURTH CLASS POSTMASTER EXAMINATION

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination to fill the position of fourth class postmaster at Lelia Lake, Texas. The examination will be held at Clarendon, Texas. Receipt of applications will close on November 25, 1947. Salary \$1584.

The examination is open to all citizens of, or nationals who owe allegiance to, the United States who reside within the territory supplied by the post office for which this examination is announced and who are at least 21 years of age, but not yet 65, on the date of the close of receipt of applications for this examination.

Application blanks and full information about the requirements of the examination may be secured from the post office for which this examination is announced, or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C. Applications must be on file with the Commission at Washington, D. C., on the date specified above.

The date of examination will be stated on admission cards mailed to applicants after the close of receipt of applications, and will be about 15 days after that date.

Veterans' News

Nearly 65,000 World War II Veterans in Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi reinstated lapsed National Service Life Insurance policies worth \$450,000,000 during the past eight months under the liberal provisions still in effect, the Veterans Administration announced.

Reinstatements in the tri-state area administered by VA's Dallas Branch Office were part of 900,000 reinstatements worth five and a half billion dollars for the entire nation during this period.

Holder of lapsed term policies who have not yet reinstated have only a little more than two months in which to do so under the plan now available, VA said.

Until January 1, 1948, such veterans need only fill out a three question application form and pay two monthly premiums, one for the 31 day grace period during which the insurance was continued without payment, and the other for the current month.

Beginning next January 1, veterans with policies which have been lapsed for more than three months will be required to take a physical examination and qualify as insurable risks.

Term policies issued prior to Jan. 1, 1946, may be continued on that basis up to eight years from date of issuance. For policies taken out after that date, the term period is five years.

These policies may be converted to an of the six permanent plans available at any time before expiration of the term. They are ordinary life, 20 payment life, 30 payment life, 20 year endowment, endowment at age 60, and endowment at age 65.

Veterans with souvenir firearms and explosives such as grenades, live shells and he like have been urged by the Commissioners of Internal Revenue to have them made un-serviceable, in order to protect both their own lives and the lives of their families.

Full information on how and where weapons and explosives may be deactivated can be obtained from the Alcohol Tax Unit, Bureau of Internal Revenue, New Orleans, Louisiana.

The Veterans Administration now is the custodian of more than 53,000 World War II veterans, which it will use in its long-range anti-tuberculosis program.

VA records show that about 23,000 veterans of World War II are drawing compensation for tuberculosis contracted in the service.

Well, if Prissy has finally got a man, more power to her. And more tolerance to both of them ... because that's what my column was

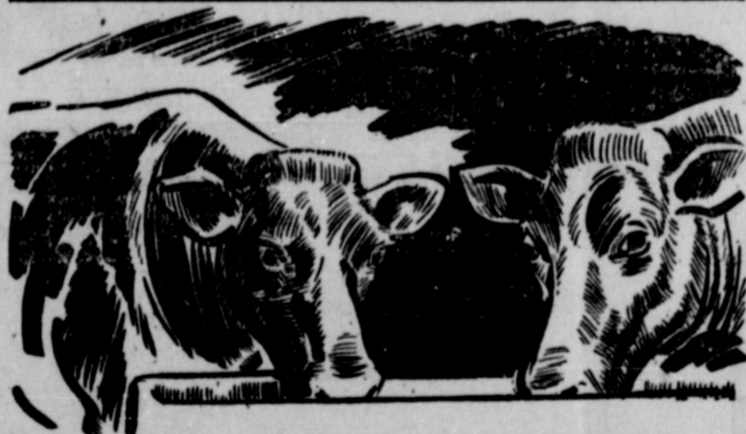
about: Tolerance of a husband's taste for old hats, old pipes, old friends, and mellow beer. And tolerance on the husband's part of a wife's tastes and habits.

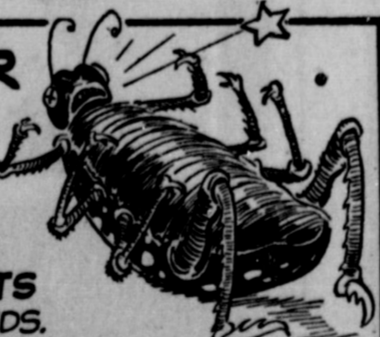

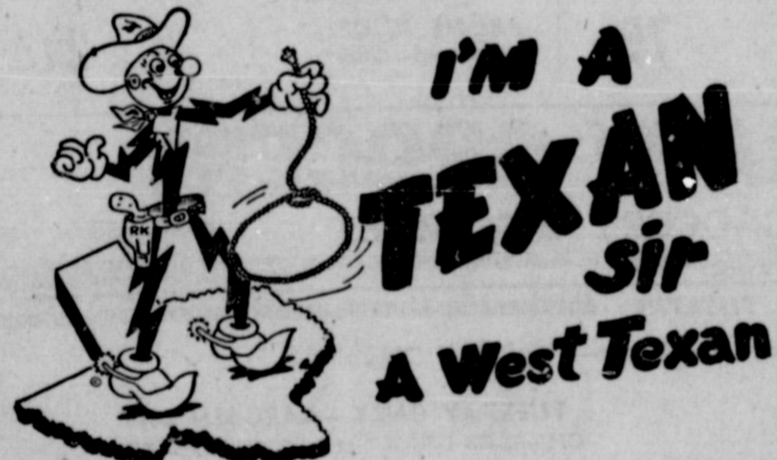
