One hundred and fifty dollars was paid in premium money to the following boys in the various parts of the show.

In the fat steer division of the show, steers weighing over 850 pounds, first place went to Don Thornberry of Clarendon and also second place in this class; third place, Jack Clifford of Clarendon and fourth place to Ronald Thomas of Clarendon.

In the division of steers weighing under 850 pounds, first place went to Ronald Thomas of Clarendon; second to George Bulman of Clarendon; third to Bob Clifford of Clarendon and fourth place to Harold McDonald of Clarendon.

Don Thornberry's first place heavy steer was judged grand champion of the Show and his second place heavy steer reserve champion of the show. Don also won first place on his group of three steers fed by one boy.

In the fat barrow division of Hampshire hogs weighing under 225 pounds, first place went to Bobby Whitaker of Clarendon; second to Glenn Reid of Clarendon and fourth place to Wayburn Wilson of Clarendon. The breed champion of this class went to Aubrey Rampy.

### THREE CANDIDATES ANNOUNCE THIS WEEK FOR CITY COMMISSIONER

City politics are beginning to warm up a bit with an election date within the near future in view. The election of two commissioners will take place the first Tuesday in April and at the present time three men have filed for a place on the ballot. Pete Kunz has filed his name for reelection and two new-comers, Bob Head and Chas. Speed have filed for a place on the ballot.

At the present time, Pete Kunz and Homer Bones are the two city commissioners, and Cap Morris is the Mayor, forming the city judiciary. The set up alternates every other year with the Mayor being elected one year and two commissioners being elected on the alternate year. The election date this year falls on April 6th.

## Weather Is Still Main Topic

It seems that in this section of the country as well as most of the United States, the weather is still in the spotlight, and the wheat farmers are not fussing a bit. The moisture up to the present time is above normal and more is in the making this morning with ice all over everything and sleet falling. Highway officials report all roads hazardous and dangerous to travel, and advise motorists not to travel unless absolutely necessary.

Several inches of snow has fallen on the north plains area, and a few of the schools in the same area have shut down until Monday. The weatherman reported that the present spell should end some time tonight with continued cold weather.

The annual Red Cross membership drive will be conducted in Donley County throughout the month of March, just as it will be in all counties throughout the nation, Rev. Warrin Fry, chairman of the drive, announced this week.

The county's quota this year is \$1,000.

Emmett O. Simmons, chapter chairman, will head the drive here in Clarendon. Mrs. Harold Bugbee is chairman of special and advanced gifts; Mrs. Joe Ritter is chairman of the rural area, and Miss Ruth Richerson is the school chairman.

One of the main purposes set out in the drive this year is to increase the membership in the organization. If a worker does not call on you within the next few days, you are asked to leave your donation at any of the banks in the county, Rev. Fry stated.

He pointed out that since its founding in 1881 the Red Cross has assisted in 3,651 disasters in the United States alone. Close at home was the Crowell cyclone, the Texas City explosion, and Higgins, Texas, and Woodward, Oklahoma tornado.

A new National Blood Program is on its way as organized by the Red Cross. It will make whole blood and its derivatives available to all who need them and at no cost whatever to the individual. It is the plan of Red Cross to develop the program to a point where the estimated 3,700,000 pints of blood needed annually can be produced.

Rev. Fry stated that more workers were needed to cover the residential section of Clarendon and other points and he would appreciate anyone volunteering to help, contacting him or Emmett Simmons right soon.

Ollie McCrary, star halfback for the New Mexico State Teachers college Mustangs last season, has signed a contract with the Baltimore Colts of the professional All-America conference.

The tall, hefty back says he plans to report to the Baltimore club sometime after his scheduled graduation this spring.

Planning eventually to coach, McCrary said the pro experience will come before he begins graduate work in physical education.

"I think it will give me a chance to learn as much football as I could learn anywhere," McCrary said, "and I'd like to give it a try."

McCrary, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. L. McCrary, who hails from Clarendon, Texas, is an honor student at the college. But he has managed to sandwich in a variety of sports. He is a pitcher and first baseman when he plays baseball; he bowls around 170; he plays some tennis and has run the 100 in 10.6.

Going to Silver City, N. Mex. after graduation from high school in Clarendon, McCrary has been in college for three years. He was married in 1943 to the former Margaret Fox of Silver City.

Mustang Coach Ray Brancheau said he will work with McCrary until time for the big halfback to report for training.

McCrary was a regular starter with the Mustangs during the past two seasons and toward the end of the 1947 campaign had developed into a power runner, a good kicker, and was developing a better-than-average passing arm.

CITY-COUNTY LIBRARY NOTES

By Mrs. C. A. Burton (Librarian Emerita)

Are you finding yourself tip-toe with eagerness about "The Freedom Train"? I had the happy privilege of seeing the large part of the items of interest shown in it when I made my one trip to the East many years ago. Over and over I said to my husband,

"How I wish all my people at Clarendon could enjoy these things"—because all the people of Clarendon were "my" people, either through the school or the library. Some of you have seen them, and many more will have that privilege when the Freedom Train stops in Amarillo. But everybody may enjoy them through our copy of the new book, "Heritage of Freedom."

sultant of the American Heritage Foundation which has sponsored the Freedom Train.

It begins with Christopher Columbus' letter describing his first voyage, translated from the Latin, dated 1493. Next is the Magna Carta. You remember that was sent to us for safe-keeping when the bombs were destroying London. There is Nathaniel Bacon's Manifesto against Gov. Berkeley during Bacon's Rebellion in 1676; a rough draft of the Declaration of Independence, in Thomas Jefferson's own hand, showing corrections; George Washington's letter describing conditions at the winter headquarters in 1780, and answering critics who felt that the ragged Continentals should be waging more active warfare. I felt that I was standing on holy ground when I stood on the steps of the little building which had been Washington's headquarters. Washington's first draft of his Farewell Address; the Emancipation Proclamation; the copy of the Gettysburg Address from which Lincoln spoke; letters from Theodore Roosevelt, John Paul Jones, Benjamin Franklin's epitaph in his own hand—I saw this in the little Presbyterian church yard where he is buried in Philadelphia; there is the Declaration of the United Nations, and the instruments of the Japanese and German surrenders. Whether it is Francis Scott Key's original manuscript of The Star-Spangled Banner, the penciled note signed by President Franklin Roosevelt appointing Gen. Eisenhower as Supreme Commander for the Allied invasion of Western Europe, or Gen. Wainwright's last message from Corregidor—all of them thrill us. Frank Monaghan was formerly on the faculty of Yale University, a lifelong col-

lector and student of Americana. We hope the teachers here will plan that every child may visit the Freedom Train when it gets to Amarillo. A leading best seller for some time has been Kenneth Roberts' "Lydia Bailey." The St. Louis Globe Democrat says "Scott created the historical novel; Thackeray improved it, but Kenneth Roberts has exceeded both." He has written quite a number of historical novels, but we have only one other, "Northwest Passage."

"Lydia Bailey" is called his most superb woman character—and she is magnificent. In my mind, I have challenged many of his statements in regard to the great men of our early history, to none of whom does he accede greatness, not even to Washington. I still believe that the men who helped to lay the foundations of our greatness were men of integrity, Kenneth Roberts to the contrary notwithstanding. But he did write an extremely interesting story of the French domination of Haiti, and of our war with

Tripoli, and he gives a long list of sources at the close of the book. The Overseas Press Club of America presents "As We See Russia" which claims to be best balanced and most realistic picture of Russia as is Russia today that is extant.

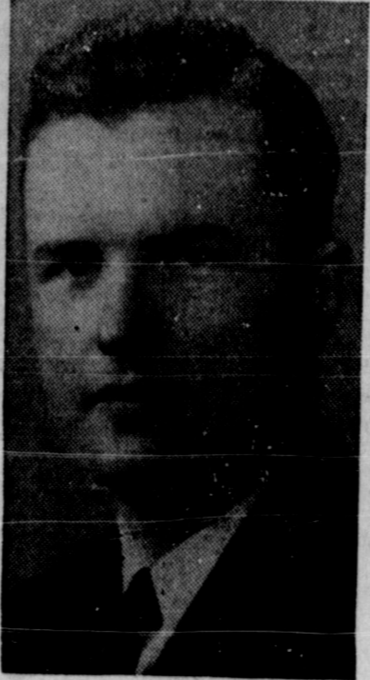

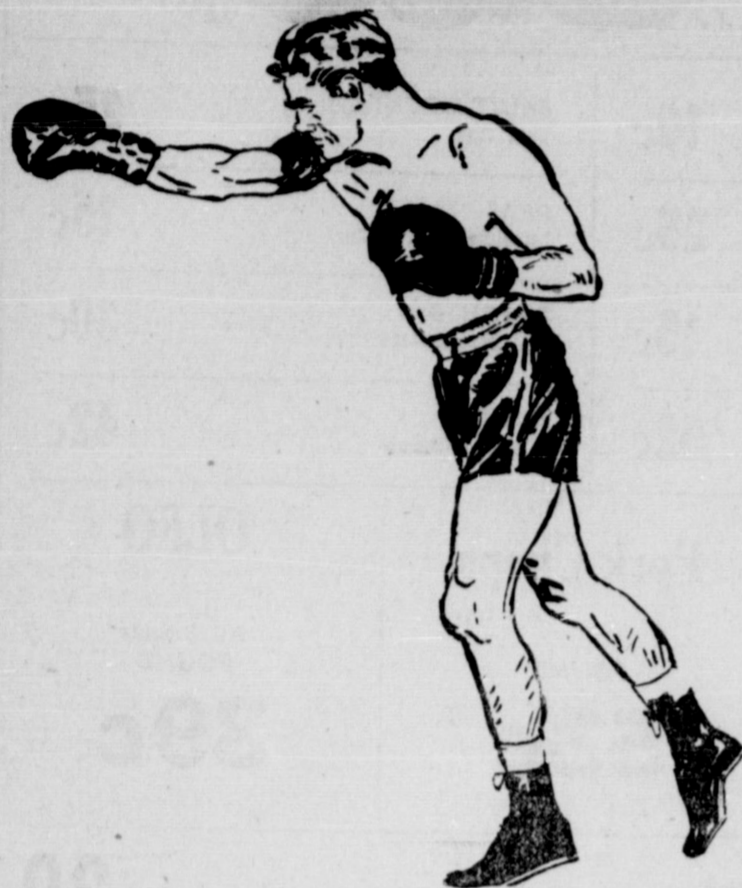

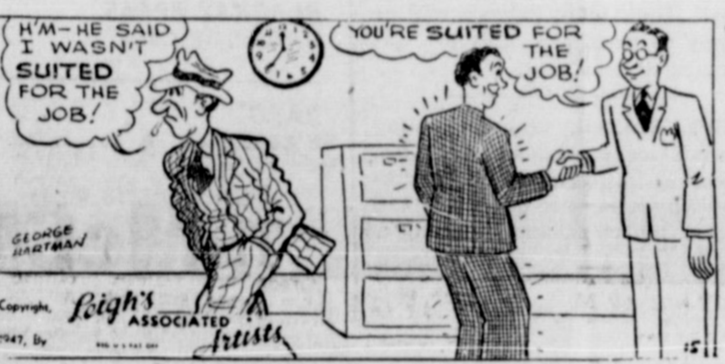
