Armed Forces Surplus Property Limit Now Lifted For Veterans

The U. S. Army Recruiting Service today received information on changes governing sale of surplus government property to veterans. Most important of these changes is the elimination of the \$2,500 limit in purchases of government equipment by veterans. Maximum and minimum limits will be set by the Smaller War Plants Cooperation in collaboration with the disposal agencies and with the approval of the Surplus Property Administration.

The following method of disposal of surplus motor vehicles has been placed into effect by the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, Office of Surplus Property, Fort Worth, Texas.

Fixed price sales will be conducted at static intervals at various camps, the prices being dealers' wholesale ceiling (based on

original cost, less depreciation and estimated cost of repairs). The first week will be for inspection purposes. During the first day of the second week, federal agencies will file claim for such vehicles as they desire; the second two days, the state and local governments will file claim; the third two days, the veterans will file claim; and the last two days will be for dealers. Vehicles not sold during the fixed price sale will be sold by the "spot sale" method at a later date; federal agencies, state and local governments, dealers and veterans being eligible to bid on these vehicles.

Veterans must bring their copy of Veterans Preference Certificate, Form 63, issued by Smaller War Plants Corporation (pink form). Price of the vehicle will be

indicated on the vehicle, and also in a price catalog which will be available at the sales location. Payment will be accepted in the form of cash, cashier's check, certified check, or postal money order made payable to the Reconstruction Finance Corporation. All sales will be made on an "as is - f.o.b. shipping point" basis.

The first of these sales is now in progress at Camp Livingston, Louisiana for approximately 900 vehicles located at the following stations:

Camp Livingston, La., Camp Fannin, Texas, Camp Polk, La., Camp Claiborne, La., Engineer Redistribution Center, New Orleans, La.

The next sale will be held at Fort Sam Houston, Texas, 6 thru 14 January 1946. Further details will be furnished at the earliest practicable date. As a matter of information no passenger cars were offered on the sale now being conducted at Camp Livingston, La.

All veterans who wish to avail themselves of additional information of this nature are urged to contact the nearest U. S. Army Recruiting Station.

Army Recruiting Stations are located in Amarillo, Abilene, San Angelo, Big Spring, Lubbock, Lamesa, Ballinger, Wellington, Dalhart, Childress, Plainview, Odessa, Sweetwater, Borger and Pampa.

DEDUCTIONS ALLOWED

In all business operations, farming, merchandising, and professional, one is entitled to deduct from Gross Income all actual, business costs, including such items as labor, salaries, rents, insurance, interest and taxes, insofar as such items are "business" and not "personal" items. Do not include in your deductions personal taxes, as on private homes, grocery bills nor anything concerning family expenses.

Repairs as are necessary to the maintenance of income producing

properties are deductible, however, "repairs" must be distinguished from "improvements." Repairs mean just ordinary repairs, and not new buildings, new wells, or new anything. Such items are improvements and are carried on depreciation each year of lifetime.

Losses, when not reimbursed for by insurance, ordinarily are deductible, as the loss of livestock, hail damage, casualty damages, etc.

In fact, all "business expenses" are deductible from Gross Income, as your liability for payment of Income Tax is based solely on Net Income after all business deductions are allowed.

After the above allowances are made, then before calculating any taxes, each person, including husband, wife, and each legal dependent, is allowed \$500.00 personal exemption from any surtax amount, and the same amount for Normal Tax purposes, except that a Dependent does not count.

So be sure you get all the advantages coming to you from the above sources, for if you don't, it will cost you dearly at the present rate of taxation, which on the first bracket is 23%.
