The most disastrous blaze in the history of Hedley occurred in the Woolridge lumber company yard there Friday. The blaze, said to have started from a trash fire near the yard, swept into action

about 2 p. m. The excellent fire department was handicapped by the failure of the fire truck to respond to duty, the truck being a Dodge recently purchased from the federal government supply.

Autoists responded by dragging the fire hose to the scene of the blaze, and a truck pulled the fire truck to position.

Water superintendent Pat Devine had the water tower tank full as is his custom. He had a reserve of thousands of gallons in the ground reservoir out at the well supply source. He estimates that more than twenty thousand gallons of water was used on the blaze by the Hedley fire boys, and the fire truck from Memphis manned by eight men that arrived toward the close of the fire con-

As the water was taken from the tower tank, Mr. Devine manned the pumps at the reservoir in a manner that had the city tower tank at the same level at the conclusion of the fight against a blaze that had threatened the main portion of the town for some three hours.

The damage to the stock and buildings remaining is estimated at \$1500. The loss to the buildings destroyed and the windmill stock, roofing, lumber and other material destroyed is estimated at

some \$10,000.00. This lumber yard, one of the Cicero-Smith chain, was established in Hedley in 1907 when the town was moved from Rowe to the property of the Woolridge lumber company by purchase in


