Leroy Leathers Accepts Position With Civil Service In Germany

Leroy B. Leathers, son of Mr. and Mrs. B. J. Leathers, has accepted a position with the Civil Service which will keep him in Germany to work as Technical adviser on airplanes. He will travel from unit to unit through out the 3rd army zone in Germany.

Leroy received his A&E license from Swallow Air Plane school in Wichita, Kansas where he made an excellent record for efficiency. He was employed at Beech Aircraft Corp. for two years and was chosen with a group of nine men from 3 corporations to improve the B-29 super fortress. He worked on the bomber there for 3 months attached to the Army Air Corps before entering the army. He served better than two years in the service and has been in Europe since Dec. 15, 1944 at which time he was sent across on a secret mission. He held the rating of Sergeant.

Leroy received his B. A. degree at Tech at Lubbock in 1937 and has made a mighty fine record for himself since that time.

For the first time since the contests were started in 1926, Clarendon won sweepstakes award at the annual Texas Tech F.F.A. judging contests for schools in Texas, New Mexico, and Oklahoma. Fifty-four schools participated in the four contests this year. The sweepstakes award is based on the ranking of three teams in the contest and is given to the school with the highest combined rating in the three contests. A large banner was awarded the teams and a gold medal was given J. R. Gillham, coach of the teams.

The Clarendon milk judging team composed of Bob Clifford, Buster Bain, and Vernon Goldston was first in their contest, with Bain ranking as high point man in the contest, and Goldston and Clifford ranking sixth and eighth, respectively. Duane Littlefield, Jack Stone, Gilbert Stewart, and Mike Smith were alternates on the milk team. The Clarendon poultry team composed of Walter Warner, Garth Carter, and Bill Davis ranked seventh in their contest, with Warner winning fourth high individual honors in the entire contest. Lyvon McBrayer, Kenneth Jackson, Charles Bogard and Billy Waddell, were alternates on the poultry team.

The livestock team composed of Bob Brown, Douglas Shelton, and Lynn Leathers was eighth in the contest and Brown was fourth high point man in the entire event. Gene Bulman and Jerry Morgan were alternates on the livestock team. The crops team composed of Kenneth Stone, Kenneth Morrow, and Nelson Christie ranked seventh in their contest.

On April 8, the Clarendon Bronchos started Spring training which was to consist of 30 days of hard practice. The training has been composed mostly of learning how to block, tackle, and run plays. All the boys are learning to condition themselves for games and everything about the position they wish to play.

LIBRARY NOTES

An interesting change is taking place in our library—a change which will add to its usefulness, we hope. From the beginning of the library we have served the people of the entire county when they came to us. The first of this year the County Commissioners decided to assume some of the responsibility of the library with the city. This necessitated some adjustments which have been made, certain requirements which have been met, and the library now becomes the County-City Library. As said above, it is hoped that this enlargement of plans may add to the library's usefulness by causing a larger number to feel free to use it.

The Mother's Club gave us nine dollars recently with which we hope to get several books for our very young readers, and no books are enjoyed more than these. The author, Carl Coke Rister, is a native of West Texas, the son of a pioneer, and is now Research Professor of History in Oklahoma University. He is the author of several books dealing with the development of the Southwest. A year ago this month Simon and Schuster announced that for the next three years they would set aside a fund of \$50,000 to enable promising young novelists to finish books on which they were working. Awards made from this fund are known as Participation awards. To date close to 500 application blanks have been filled out, 128 partially completed manuscripts have been submitted, and four awards

made. The first Atlantic Novel contest to make eligible manuscripts written in foreign languages as well as in English, and which has no restrictions whatever as to subject or author, will close Jan. 15, 1947. Author of the prize-winning novel will receive \$10,000. Previous winners have included "Jalna" by Mazo de la Roche; "Peking Picnic" by Ann Dridge, and "The Family" by Nina Federova.

This quotation will please many readers—"Reading for pleasure is the only rational object of reading anyhow." The author does not preclude the idea that pleasure may have a different meaning for different people. In a review of the "Life of Charles Dickens" by Una Pop-Hennessy, the following comment was interesting: "Strange gift the little man had of creating and populating an imaginary world which passed into reality as the mental furniture of succeeding generations."

A smart light colored plastic trim around the cockpit inside is the final touch for cabin smartness. It has a wheel control column. Selling for \$3,545.00 delivered at Clarendon. It has an 85 horsepower engine, cruising range 700 miles, has a fixed pitch prop. Controllable prop, radio, and flight instruments are extra. Globe also advertises the same plane with a 125 Hp. engine capable of cruising 140 mph. The Swift will be on display at the local airport within a few days.

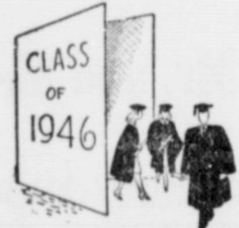
