Eight Cars of Wheat Shipped From Donley

According to J. F. Blocker at the Clarendon Grain Co., eight carloads of Donley County wheat have been shipped up to the present time, and there is still quite a bit of acreage to be cut.

Harvesting came to a standstill on account of the rain, but it was believed that hands would return to the fields this afternoon if the sun dries the fields out enough. Damage to the wheat was termed light. The moisture might cause some bleaching and occasion a small drop in the test weight of the grain which has been running on an average of around 63. The acreage average is still holding up




