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LIBRARY NOTES

The American Library Association is meeting in its annual conference in Buffalo, N. Y. this week. This is the first meeting for three years and this session was almost canceled at the last minute because of the limited hotel facilities. A large attendance had been expected and Buffalo had promised to take care of 4,000 visitors, but it is found that not more than 1800 can be definitely promised. A very fine program has been planned.

Projected Books, Inc., which produces projectors for throwing on the ceiling books to read by bedridden people has issued a list of books which have been micro-filmed for the purpose, books in a wide range of subjects. The

copyright owners have given permission with no expense.

A scholarship for a Japanese student has been established at Lafayette College, Easton, Pa. in memory of a private killed last May by the Japanese. The parents feel that education and understanding would have prevented their son's death—hence the effort to pass on education.

The latest Houghton Mifflin Life in America prize goes to James Flexner for a volume to be entitled "First Flowers of Our Wilderness," described as "A Social history of Colonial America in terms of its painting."

Douglas Southall Freeman is reported to be writing a life of George Washington. You remember he won special acclaim for his life of Lee.

"Last Chapter" completes Ernie Pyle's story of what he saw in the Pacific theater of opera-

tions from the time he left California until a Japanese bullet ended his career.

"This Side of Innocence" by Taylor Caldwell is leading the best sellers now. 740,000 copies have already been printed.

Tons of captured German and Japanese films are being imported by the Library of Congress so as to have a record of fascist thinking for the use of scholars and others who may wish to probe into the Axis mind.

When the National Institute of Arts and Letters held its annual joint ceremonial with the American Academy in May, the Institute's Gold Medal, given once in ten years in the field of non-fiction went to Van Wyck Brooks for his work in the essay and criticism. The Institute's annual award of \$1,000 for distinguished achievement by a foreign artist, composer, or writer living in this country was presented by William Rose Benet to Ralph Hodgson, English poet, now resident in Minerva, Ohio.

Helen Mears, winner of the eleventh annual non-fiction Houghton Mifflin Literary fellowship of \$2,400 for her "Year of the Wild Boar," has returned to Japan to write a book on the defeated Nipponese.

The first beneficiary of the Academy of American Poets' newly established fellowship which carries a stipend of 5,000 was Edgar Lee Masters of "Spoon River Anthology" fame.

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10th Annual XIT Reunion To Feature Pageantry of Old West, June 22-24th

DALHART, Texas—Pageantry of the Old West—in all its pre-war brilliance—will return to Dalhart Saturday, Sunday and Monday, June 22-24, when the Tenth Annual XIT Reunion is held. Amarillo has already announced it will run a special train to Dalhart Monday.

This biggest celebration in the West, based on the history of a ranch, will open Saturday night with Western regalia dances and wind up with another brace of dances Monday night.

Two professional rodeos will be given, one at 2 p. m. Sunday and the other at 7:30 p. m. Monday. The salty Buettler Bros. stock from Elk City, Okla., will be used, and some of the top hands of the professional rodeo circuits will be in the arena.

There will be free boat races on Dalhart's Rita Bianca lake Monday afternoon at 2:00. At least three events are assured, one of them a free-for-all, and entries from Pampa, Borger, Amarillo and Plainview are believed certain.

The Annual XIT parade—planned as one of the most colorful

pageants the Panhandle has ever seen—will loop through the downtown section at 5:00 p. m. Monday.

Special preparations are being made to welcome and entertain Southwestern pioneers. They will have special headquarters where they can get together, swap yarns, listen to old-time fiddlers, square dance if they wish and

otherwise do just as they please. All XIT'ers—those men and women who once worked for the famed million acre Panhandle spread which Texas traded for its state capitol in the 1880s—will be served a free dinner Monday noon. Also W. O. (Bill) Culbertson, Sr.—himself an old XIT'er and for years a member of the renowned Coon & Culbertson ranch firm—has announced he will have a steak fry for all former XIT hands at his home, beginning Sunday afternoon at 2:00.

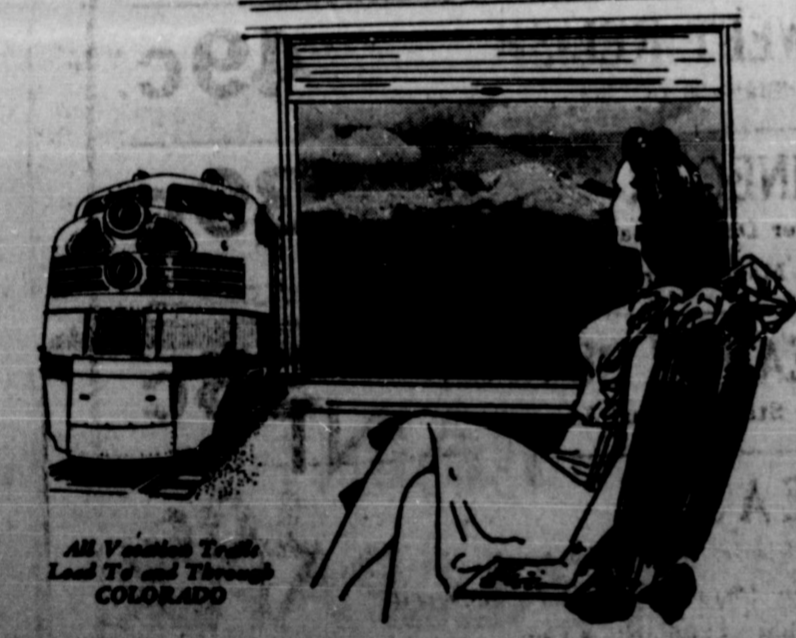
