

When a veteran interrupts his education or training he is no longer entitled to subsistence pay from the VA. Any amount recived after termination of training must be returned, Sisson emphazied.

It is the veteran's resposibility to advise the Veterans administration regional office at Lubbock when he stops his training. It is unlawful for him to retain subsistence funds when he is no longer in training.

When a veteran interrupts his training in the middle of the month -failing to notify VA that he is no longer in training—and receives a full check at the end of the month, he must return that check to the Treasury Department, notify VA of the date he stopped training-and a check for the exact amount due him

will be issued, it was explained. In some instances the veterantrainee cannot avoid receiving overpayments since it is impossiblenear the end of the month-for him to notify VA that he is no longer in training in sufficient time to adjust his check. Nevertheless, the excess check must be returned for adjust-

veteran are promptly returning funds to the VA to which they are not rightfully entitled is evidence of aheir honesty and integrity, Sisson asserted. Re-payments to VA range all the

way from \$2.17 to a cach refund of \$630.00. Re-payments may be made in three different ways — First, by return of the government check together with a notation on the date training ended. Another check will be issued for the exact amount due up to the end of training. Second, by cash, personal check or money order. Checks and money orders should be made payable to the Treasurer of the United States. Third, by mutual agreement between the veteran and VA, he may continue or re-enter training in an approved course, in which case subsistance will be deducted untill over-payment is liqui-

A veteran who fails to return to the VA which he received after his training ended, or fais to make arrangements to lipuidate the over payment jeopardizes his GI rights and makes himself liable to punishment under Federal laws. inasmuch as such action may constitute frand against he Government.

Over-payments cannot be charged off against veterans' eligibility. All veterans are notified in writing of the "over-payment" to which they are not entitled.


