Mr. M. M. McCully, Donley County Veterans Service Officer, has been named a volunteer Veterans Reemployment Rights Committeeman for Donley Counment Rights Division of the U.S. Department of Labor.

Mr. McCully, the newly named VRR committeeman, will act as a volunteer arbitrator between veterans seeking reemployment and Congress extended the reemployment rights provision of the Selaw a veteran who re-applies for his old job within 90 days after he leaves the armed services may regain it and may not be discharged from the position without cause for the period of one year.




This contribution was certainly a good deed on the part of the people who gave, and we hope this food collected here, combined with all others, will go a long ways toward preventing another war.





Fact is, if we got to know each other we'd probably find we're not much different, underneath. City folks work hard; like to come home at night to their families; and relax with a moderate glass of beer,


