Handicapped **Veterans Being Employed**

In connection with "National Employ the Physically Handicapped Week," October 7-13, 1945, as proclaimed by the President, the Tenth U. S. Civil Service Region (comprising the States of Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi) announced that 3,232 placements of physically handicapped persons were made in the Tenth Region during the period October 1, 1942, to July 1, 1945, 570 of this number being handicapped veterans. During the month of July, 1945, 104 physically handicapped veterans were placed in Federal po-

The Tenth Region further announced that more than 10,000 physically impaired veterans had been placed in Federal field establishments throughout the United States since July 1, 1945.

The Civil Service Commission has, for the past three years, been engaged in a positive program designed to bring about the maximum use of persons with physical handicaps




