A Common Paper for Common People

Why Not Consolidate?

A number of residents of the Clarendon Independent School District have expressed the thought that the common school districts that send their children to the Clarendon Schools should be forced to consolidate with the Clarendon District in order to take advantage of the facilities offered in the public school system here. According to H. T. Burton, superintendent of the Clarendon School System and a member of the Donley County School Board, the state school law provides that any student living in a district that does not offer the grade of work in which the student is classified may transfer to the nearest public school offering that instruction. The public school to which the student transfers must allow the student to enroll. The per-capita apportionment must be accepted for the first four months tuition and the state will pay the tuition of the student for the last five months provided the school the student transfers from is a state-aid school; otherwise the school district from which the student transfers must pay the tuition.

The consolidation movement must come from the common school district that wishes to consolidate with the larger district. A petition from the voters of such a district must be presented to the board of the district with which they wish to consolidate, and the board petitioned must call an election concerning the consolidation issue. A majority of the voters in the common school district must vote to consolidate with the larger district and a majority of the voters in the larger district must vote to receive the smaller district.

According to the present state law, there is no means whereby any consolidation issue may be initiated unless desired by the people of the common school district, and the nearest public school that offers the grades not taught in the smaller school must accept the students in said grades transferring to it.

This district is five miles square and under the present set up in the state it is not required to furnish transportation to students in this district, but if other districts were consolidated with the Clarendon Independent School District, the local district would have to furnish transportation for them. A sliding scale is used in evaluating farms within a school district and the further the farm is from town the lower the valuation that must be placed on the property. A farm ten miles from the school, though equally productive and with equal improvements, could not carry the same valuation as a farm two miles from town. It is doubtful that if the common school districts were consolidated with the Clarendon District that we would receive as much or any more revenue than we receive at the present through per-capita apportionment and tuition.

Vote On Tax Increase In Over 250 Texas School Dists. This Year

Sister Kenny Will Make Texas Visit

AUSTIN, Nov. 26—Sister Elizabeth Kenny, famous Australian nurse, and an exponent of a new and quite successful method of treating infantile paralysis will pay Texas an official visit during the first week in December, according to advices received here by George C. Francisco, Jr., of Houston, chairman of the Texas Executive Committee of the Sister Elizabeth Kenny Infantile Paralysis Foundation. A state campaign is now underway to raise the Texas quota of \$150,000 in the annual campaign for funds to keep the Kenny method of treating polio on the upward path.

State Headquarters here at the Driskill Hotel announced that the tentative schedule for Sister Kenny in Texas would be Dallas, December 4; Houston, December 5; San Antonio, December 6, and Fort Worth, December 7.

She will confer with county chairmen, members of the Texas Executive Committee, and workers in the campaign while she is in the state, according to State Headquarters here at the Driskill Hotel.

Headquarters that more than thirty Texas counties have already passed their quota. Mr. Francisco made a statewide appeal for funds and said that contributions could be mailed to State Headquarters.

Plans of the Texas Committee are to use funds in sending graduate nurses to Minneapolis for training as Kenny Technicians and to make the Kenny treatment of polio available to every victim in Texas.

CLARENDON YOUTH INITIATED INTO LAW SOCIETY

Clothed in the traditional black hoods and robes of the Chancellors, six initiates to the law society marched roped together through classrooms and about the campus Tuesday, November 19, after being tapped by members of the organization.

One of the six initiated in the society was Jimmy Eugene Thompson, son of Mrs. Curtis E. Thompson of Clarendon, a senior law student and a member of Tejas Club and Phi Delta Phi. He is Assistant Comment Editor of The Texas Law Review and Quizzmaster in the School of Law. Thompson, president of the senior class of 1947, received his bachelor of arts degree in 1942 at the University of Texas and entered the Army and served for over three years.

Chancellors was organized in 1912 for the purpose of honoring and rewarding "by election, those students who, by a combination of consistent scholarship, and achievement, have shown themselves most likely to succeed and become a credit to their profession and their Alma Mater."

SHRINERS ACTIVE IN CRIPPLED CHILDREN WORK

The Shriners of North America are very active in their work with crippled children, said Mr. O. W. Elliott. More and more cases regardless of race, creed, or color, are being treated. While the Shriners of North America are financing this most worthwhile humane activity, they feel that others may want a part; and it is now possible for anyone outside of the organization to buy a Voluntary Contributing Life Membership in the Shriners Hospitals for Crippled Children. A beautiful certificate is issued to everyone purchasing one of these memberships, said Mr. Elliott.

According to a recent survey conducted by the public relations department of the Texas State Teachers Association, 89 independent school districts and one or more common school districts in 40 counties have already voted this year to increase their school tax rate in order to provide additional support for their public school systems. 98 independent school districts and one or more common school districts in 10 counties have already called elections to vote on a school tax increase to increase the financial support for their school system.

Schools in the immediate section that have already voted an increase in tax rate this year include Amarillo, Wichita Falls, Perryton, Stratford, Gruver, Happy, Dalhart, Sanford, Shamrock, Miami, Vernon, Tulia, Shallowater, Electra, Childress, Hereford and common school districts in Deaf Smith County, Hartley and Hutchinson County. Schools that plan to hold elections on their tax rate at an early date include Breckenridge, Littlefield, Tahoka, Post, Texline, O'Donnell, Phillips, Sunray, Brownfield, Abilene, Seymour, and Booker.

These schools found it impossible under their old setup to support their school system and either have remedied or are preparing to hold elections to do the same.

Borger voted a school tax of \$1.75 last year with only nine dissenting votes. The increased revenues have made it possible for a major part of these towns to maintain a fully accredited and classified school system.

A good brand of football was displayed by both teams throughout the entire game and those witnessing the game had the opportunity of seeing more actual outright power put into play than they had seen in a long number of years on the local gridiron. When those boys blocked and tackled, you could hear it pop clear up in the stands and those college boys really put on a display of their tackling and blocking ability, allowing the Memphis team to make very little yardage through the line at any time.

The local players were bruised and sore after the game but expressed themselves as enjoying the game very much and stated that they hoped that a regular college team could be promoted here within the near future.

Airway Communications Station De-Commissioned Here

Word was received here Tuesday morning by B. L. Hurst from the C.A.A. office in Ft. Worth that the local Airway Communication Station was on the De-Commissioned list which was brought about by the new government economy plan. The letter did not state any specific date that the local station would be closed down, but according to information regarding other places, it is probable that it will be closed around the first of the year.

The Clarendon station was one of seven listed to be de-commissioned in this region and is the only one in the Panhandle area. The local station employs six men and one woman and is supervised by Mr. Hurst. None

of the local employees were fired from their positions but will be required to move to a new location when the station closes here. In this region 73 employees were fired or let-off under the cut-down program and all the local employees were quite fortunate not to be on this list.

A meeting was held Tuesday night by leading air-minded citizens to formulate plans to look into the matter and see if there was any possible way of holding the station here as it is a valuable asset in regards to aviation and to Clarendon.

I have just finished auditing the books of the Clarendon Independent School District and find them to be in perfect order. I have audited the books of this district and a number of other school districts in this section for a number of years. The books of the Clarendon Independent School District will show the expenditures for the past few years have exceeded the receipts for those years. The district has been able to operate because of the backlog of some \$44,000 of delinquent taxes. Enough of these back taxes have been collected to pay the deficit each year. These back taxes have practically all been paid that are collectable. If the Clarendon Independent School District is to operate with no added increase in expenditures for teachers' salaries, etc., it will still be necessary for them to make other arrangements in order not to operate at a deficit.

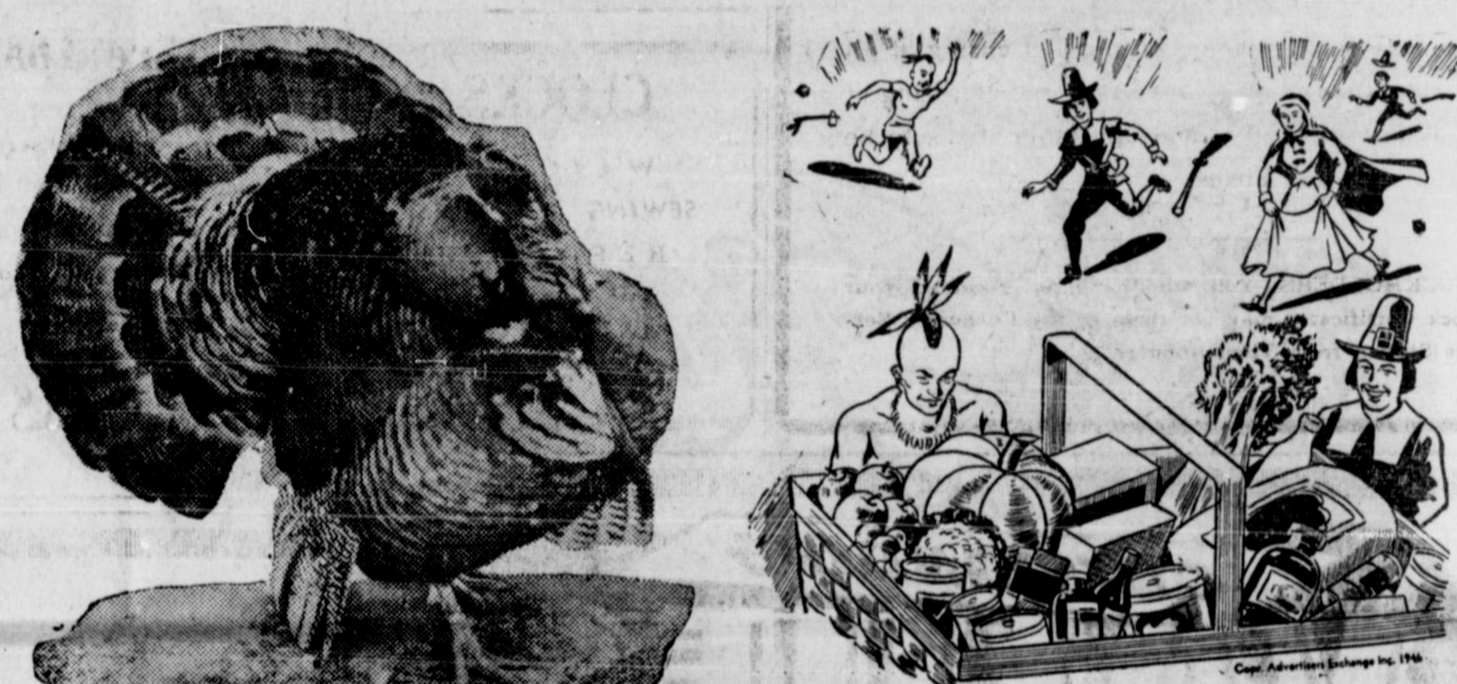

LIBRARY NOTES

By Mrs. C. A. Burton

Types of books change as rapidly as do types of clothes. Just now books of travel are being much in demand, especially books about America. Look Magazine is bringing out a volume called "Look at America." It is to be followed by eight volumes describing every section of the U. S.

Besides books of travel, there are being many books on Biblical characters. "The Robe" continues to be a best seller after all these months and Sholem Asch's "The Apostle," a story of St. Paul, and "Three Novels," are being followed by his "East River." This great Jewish writer, in this new book, has shifted from the Holy Land to New York's East Side. It is described as "long, solid, un-hurried"—not a novel of the Jews, but of all the peoples who make up New York's East Side.

Sholem Asch was born at Koutno, near Warsaw in 1880, was trained for a Rabbi, but gave it up, and began earning his living at 16, though he had already decided to become a writer. His writing was a success, but in 1910 he came to the U. S. where he obtained American citizenship, remaining till 1925. Here he wrote Yiddish for the Jewish Daily Forward. "The Mother" is conceded to be the great immigrant novel of the Jews, and has been translated into many languages. Next came "The Nazarene," then "The Apostle." In 1925 he return-

ed to Europe, lived in Paris and Berlin. Here he witnessed the things he described in "The War Goes On"—the rising hostility to the Jews, the conflict between Socialism and Communism.

Sholem Asch has returned to the U. S. because he feels it has become the center of world literature, and those who are familiar with his books will agree that his return helps to make it so.

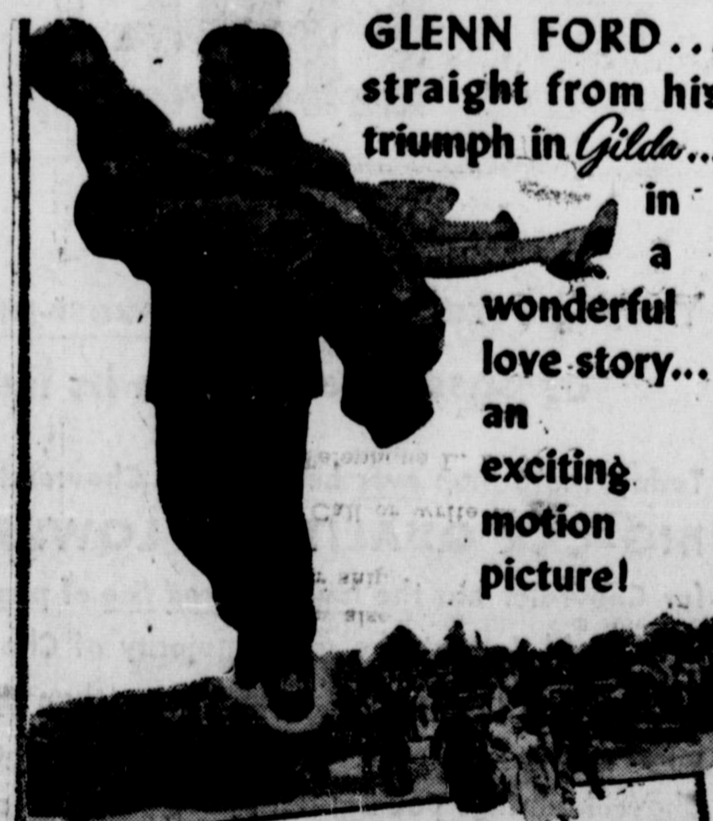
