Donley-Hall County Highway Ordered

AUSTIN, Jan. 23—Initial bids were opened and tabulated today in what is expected to be the largest post war letting of Texas Highway construction projects.

Included in the low bids that were opened by counties was the completion of the road between Clarendon and Brie which will begin at the end of the present pavement extending south of town to intersect with the pavement extending out from Memphis. The official statement is given below:

Donley and Hall—State Highway 18, 9.04 miles grading, structures, flexible base and double asphalt surface treatment (4.6 miles Donley County) and grading and structures (4.44 miles Hall County), Stone and Falls, Ada, Okla., contractors, \$160,449.13.

County Show Board Elects Officers for '47

The Donley county show board met in the office of county agent H. M. Breedlove and elected officers for the year of 1947. Carroll Lewis of Lelia Lake was elected president of the board; H. M. Breedlove was elected general manager and secretary; Bill Weatherly, treasurer; superintendents of the different shows under the board as follows: Fat stock show in February, D. E. Leathers, assisted by E. S. Ballew; Dairy shows, John Gillham and fall fair and horse show, Joe McMurry.

Committees were appointed to make arrangements for the premium money for the shows throughout the year.

The first show of the year will be the Donley county fat stock show held in Clarendon on the twenty-eighth of February. Eighteen club caives, 45 hogs and 15 sheep will make up this show for 4-H club boys and FFA members.

The board will meet in the county agent's office on Saturday the eighth to complete the premium list for the February show and finish plans for the three shows for the year. Anyone wishing to attend any meetings of the show board are invited to attend at any time the board is in session.

Judges for all the shows thru the year will be from the Extension service of the A&M College. The board discussed judges at the meeting this week and authorized the secretary to make arrangements at once for the judges for all shows.

Veterans Meeting Tonite at Hedley

A meeting of all veterans of World War II who are actively engaged in farming or who are employed by firms selling goods or services has been called for tonight at 7:30 p. m. at the Legion Hall at Hedley. Local and State officials of the Vocational school program for veterans will be at the meeting and explain the terms of the program.

One unit of the agricultural division of the program is already in operation in the county, and indications are that two new units in agriculture and at least one in distributive education will be started in the near future.

Each of the schools require an attendance of 42 hours per month on the part of the veteran and he receives subsistence pay of \$65 per month if single and \$90 if married.

PEOPLE ARE ASKING THESE QUESTIONS ABOUT ARMY ENLISTMENT



Q. What educational benefits do I get under the GI Bill of Rights?

A. If you serve honorably on active duty for a period of 90 days, one day of which is served between September 16, 1940, and the date of termination of the present war, or you are discharged because of an actual service-injured injury or disability incurred within that first 90-day period of service, you are, upon discharge, entitled to one year of education in the college, trade or business school of your choice for which you can qualify. In addition, each month of active duty, including the first three, prior to the termination of the war, entitles you to another month of post-service education, up to 48 months.

Your tuition, laboratory fees, etc., up to \$500 per ordinary school year will be paid by the government. Also, you will receive \$65 a month living allowance; \$90 a month if you have dependents.

Q. What about family allowances?

A. For men enlisting or reenlisting now, family allowances will continue until six months after the war is officially ended.

Q. What are my chances of going overseas?

A. If you enlist for 3 years, you may select to serve in any overseas theater which has openings, especially Japan or Korea.

Q. Can I still choose the branch of service I want to serve in?

A. Yes. You can pick any branch which has quotas to be filled, if you enlist for 3 years.

Q. Is there any way I can reenlist in my old grade?

A. Yes, you can, if you reenlist for a 3-year term within 20 days after your honorable discharge.

Q. Is there any other way I can reenlist in grade?

A. Yes

Veterans' News

Steps to cut the time taken for disposal of surplus airports to interested municipalities have been outlined by WAA. Time-saving steps include the abolition of the surplus airport disposal committee, a 14-day date line for the army to review CAA reports on the airport to be declared and receipt by WAA of personal and real property inventories on the airport before disposal proceedings are begun. Actual disposal operations for airports will be decentralized from Washington to the field agencies of WAA, another major step in speeding disposals. A target date of April 30 has been set for offering the available airports on WAA records. Airports declared to WAA in the future will be liquidated in 90 days.

Bids will be received by WAA for the purchase of 300 surplus aircraft, including 217 Vultee basic trainers, 39 twin-engine Cessna, 22 Stinson single engine AT-198 and 22 planes of nine other types which have been approved for certification by the CAA and may be licensed when they have been repaired or modified to meet CAA regulations. Thirty twin-engine Cessnas are at Hicks Field, Fort Worth, and the largest group offered is located at the WAA sales-storage depot, Victory Field, Vernon, Texas. Bids for these planes must be sent to the WAA, Box 6030, Dallas.

A bargain sale of paints, varnishes and shellac is being held by the WAA. Purchasers are limited to holders of HII priority certificates, buying for use in the veterans' housing program. The items are in lots ranging from one to 3,290 gallons mostly in small lots. They include pure gum shellac, enamels and varicolored paints. All merchandise is located at the WAA warehouse, 123 E. Exchange, Ft. Worth. Further information may be had at the WAA office, T&P Bldg., Fort Worth.


