Dziedzic caught all his winning bass with a black wacky worm. This worm is a straight piece of plastic without the normal curled tail on the end. The lone attendant pulls stretcher from the hearse, loads one deceased victim onto the stretcher and then into the hearse. The rescuer re turms for a victim with crushed ches injuries and carries the man to the hearse, lying him on the floor beside the stretcher.

Next, he drags a 70 year old woman with broken legs to the fron seat of the hearse. Carefully placing
her in the passenger seat the attendant her in the passenger seat, the attendan tries not to cause more injury to the
woman's legs. The attendant drive woman's legs. The attendant drives
the hearse first to a local hospital emer the hearse first to a local hospital emer-
gency department, which may or may gency department, which may or may
not have doctors on duty, and then on to the funeral home.

Emergency medical response all across Texas has improved dramatically since the day of that crash some forty years ago," said Gene Weatherall. chief of Texas Department of Health's Bureau of Emer-
gency Management.
