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## Hedley UIL students head for state meet

Hedley High School has qualified 4 students for the 1997-98 University Interscholastic League Academic State Meet to be held May 8-9 at the University of Texas at Austin.

Qualifiers include James Lee Potts who won first place in the science contest with 156 points, Rachel Howard who placed third in science with 122 points, and Lowell Ellerbrook who placed 5th in science with 86 points. This group will also compete in the science team competition at Austin. Lana Wallendorff will travel with the group as the science team alternate. Howard was the top chemistry student at regional, scoring 80 points in that part of the contest, and Ellerbrook also placed 4th in the Mathematics competition and serves as the first alternate to state in that event.

The students qualified for the state meet by placing 1st, 2nd, or 3rd

in individual competition and by winning the team competition at the UIL Academic Regional Meet held April 24th at South Plains College in Levelland.

"Students who participate in UIL academics are as competitive and dedicated as any athlete or musician," said Bobby Hawthorne, State UIL Academic Director. "They devote untold hours to practice and invitational meet competitions, and for many, these hours will be among the most important they spend during their high school careers. Over the years, we've heard from hundreds of students who claim that these contests were the most fulfilling and rewarding activities of their entire high school years."

UIL academic contests range from feature writing to accounting and from computer science to poetry interpretation. Of the 2.2 million students who participated in UIL activi-

ties last year, 638,000 competed in one or more of the 22 general academic contests.

The purpose of these contests, Hawthorne said, is to teach thinking and problem-solving skills.

"In its own way each contest is intended to teach the thinking skills students will need in college and the work force. We know that employers want employees who can solve problems, speak effectively, and write

clearly. Each contest is designed to help students reach these goals."

Through participation at the State Meet, students qualify for the Texas Interscholastic League Foundation scholarships. Since its inception in 1954, the TILF has provided \$11.4 million to approximately 10,300 Texas high school students. This year the TILF expects to award an estimated 530 new and renewed grants, valued at more than \$759,000.

## 800 cast ballots to elect three to CC Regents

Clarendon College led the way in terms of numbers of candidates and numbers of voters when local elections were held last Saturday, May 2.

Voters in the college district had their choice of ten candidates for three seats on the Board of Regents, and 800 people cast ballots in the election.

Ruth Robinson, former counselor at CC, was the people's top choice to serve on the board followed by local veterinarian Charles Dehlye, Sr., and incumbent Susie Shields. They defeated challengers Nelson Christie, Bobbie Floyd (incb.), John R. Hall,

Don W. Hinton, Shauna Monroe, Don R. Smith, and Sharon Wheatley.

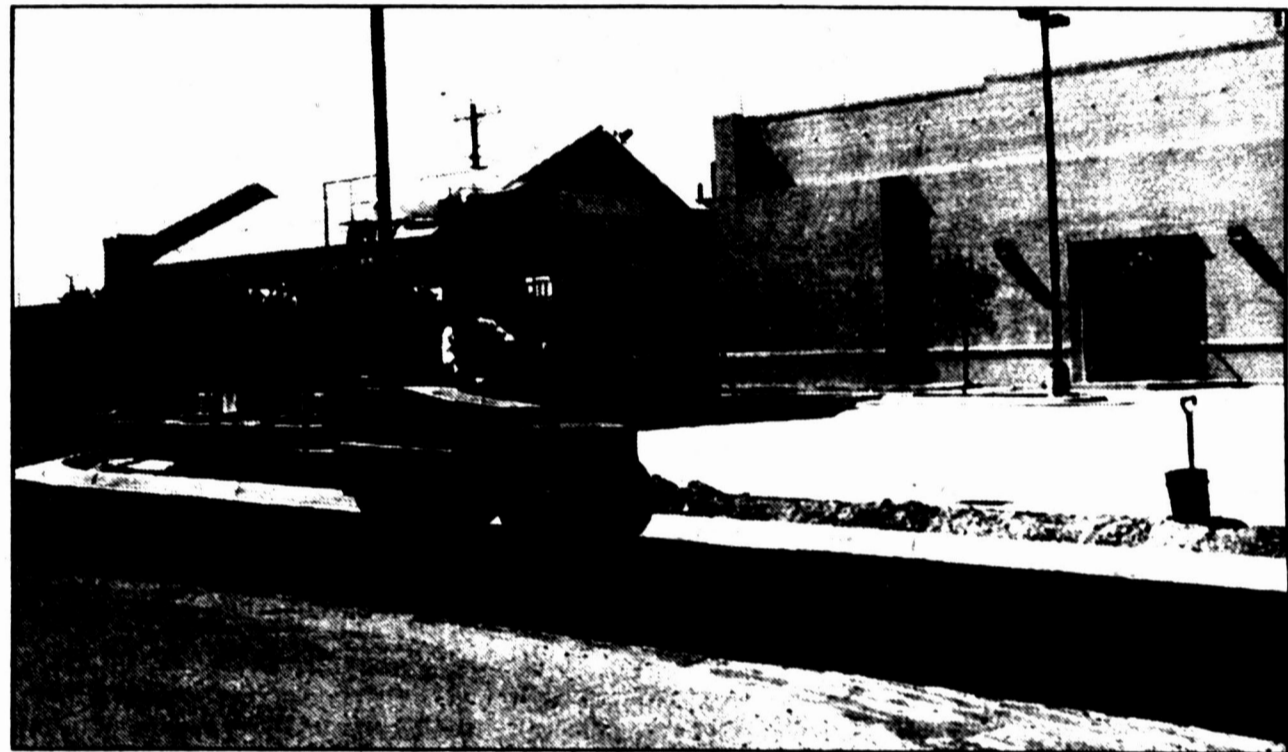
Curb and gutter work will be performed throughout the project this week. Also, pouring and working on driveways and sidewalks can be seen on the south side at different locations throughout the project.

Business Professionals of America is a student organization endorsed by the Texas Education Agency for business education students much like FFA is for agricultural science students.

Rachel was involved with a competitive event while Megan took in other various conference activities. Hedley High School BPA Advisors Colynn Harrison and Shauna Monroe accompanied Rachel and Megan. Rachel and Megan have also been active on the local level during this school year. Chapter activities have included sponsoring Santa Claus at the elementary school Christmas party and involvement in Special Olympics.

Rachel received first place in the nation in her contest, Verbal Communications Prepared I. Rachel began competing with her speech, Mary Kay Ash: Doing Well by Doing Good, in

January at the Region I, Area IV, BPA conference at Tascosa High School in Amarillo where she won first place. At the state level in April, Rachel placed third at Houston earning her the privilege of attending and competing at the national level.

The Hedley High School Chapter of BPA was chartered in 1994 and has produced regional winners and state qualifiers every year, but this was the first year for HHS to produce a state winner, national qualifier, and a national winner.

The Verbal Communications Prepared I contest consists of a 3-5 minute speech about a topic relating to business, entrepreneurship, or Business Professionals of America. Rachel's speech was about cosmetic entrepreneur Mary Kay Ash, founder of Mary Kay Cosmetics of Dallas, Texas. Proper documentation is also part of the competition.

Before Rachel was allowed to give her speech to 3 judges chosen from the business community, she had to produce typewritten copies of her bibliography, a statement of the purpose of her speech, an outline of her speech, and an affidavit signed by

herself and her advisor stating that the speech is an original composition.

Approximately 3,000 secondary and 1,000 post-secondary students from throughout the United States participated in Business Professionals of America's 32nd National Leadership Conference. Activities included general sessions with keynote speakers, business meetings, leadership workshops, occupational and specialized competitive events, election of national officers, and tours of San Antonio area sites! The highlight of the conference was the presentation of the awards to the winners in the national competitive events on Saturday evening in the historic San Antonio Municipal Auditorium where conference attendees were greeting with an authentic Mariachi band.

Hedley High School, along with the community of Hedley, is very excited and proud of Rachel and the accomplishments she and her chapter have made. She received a lot of support from many people the last few months and was proud to represent HHS, Region I, and the state of Texas at the National Leadership Conference.

**Welfare reform keeping benefits out of criminals' hands**

Issue Update with Mac Thornberry



With all the scandals and all the partisan politics that seem to be coming out of Washington these days, it's sometimes good to hear about something that's gone right and something that actually seems to be working.

Take the welfare reform plan that was passed by Congress and signed into law by the President two years ago this coming summer. In addition to helping to reduce welfare rolls to their lowest level

over 25 years, it's also helped save the country millions of dollars by cutting some of the waste, fraud, and abuse that had built up in the system over the years.

For example, prior to 1996, thousands of convicted criminals were applying for welfare benefits and then collecting a government check while serving time in prison. For some unknown reason, Washington had set up a system that left it up to the prisoners themselves to notify the government that they were no longer eligible for welfare. Only a federal bureaucrat would set up an honor system with a criminal and then trust them to do the right thing. The welfare reform law changed that by

cracking down on this system and put an end to this abuse.

As a result, over half a million prisoners are no longer collecting a government check while sitting in jail. In terms of dollars, the House Ways and Means Committee recently estimated that this crackdown will save the nation over \$3 billion by the year 2002.

In terms of common sense, it might also go a long way towards helping people remember that Washington can do some good things for the country when it forgets about partisan politics and gets down to work.

**TxDOT seeks applicants to provide transportation for the elderly/disabled**

The Texas Department of Transportation is seeking qualified applicants to receive a Federal Grant to provide transportation for elderly and/or disabled persons.

The program, known as Section 5310, provides funds to private, non-profit organizations, public entities, and associations.

The program provides up to 80 percent of the cost for capital equipment such as buses, vans, and other paratransit vehicles used to transport elderly and/or disabled persons. Also included are the purchases of vehicles for service expansions, radio and com-

munication equipment, wheel chair lifts and restraints, and vehicle rehabilitation. The funding is appropriated by the Federal Government under the Federal Transit Act.

Qualified projects will be selected for funding by TxDOT using quantitative measures such as coordination efforts, ability to meet service needs of elderly and/or disabled persons based on passenger trips per month, local match ability, hours of operation, ability to maintain equipment, average fleet mileage where applicable and average fleet age where applicable. Private or non-profit organiza-

tions and public entities within the Childress District interested in receiving an application and located in Briscoe, Childress, Collingsworth, Cottle, Dickens, Donley, Foard, Hall, Hardeman, King, Knox, Motley, and Wheeler counties should contact

### Dziedzic wins Fun Fishing Tournament

After last Saturday's Fun Fishing Tournament at Lake Greenbelt, the local anglers still talking about how All our local lakes seem poised for a great year of bass, walleye, and crappie fishing. My earlier reports have discussed the excellent bass fishing at Lake Baylor and Lake Meredith, and after the great fishing at Lake Greenbelt, I am pleased to report that 1998 appears to be one of our best fishing years in decades. Now is the time to go fishing.

Sixty-four anglers met in the early pre-dawn hours at the Lakeside Marina for registration, and by 6:30 a.m., all contestants were on the water in search of keeper bass. At Lake Greenbelt largemouth bass must be at least 14 inches long, while smallmouth bass must measure at least 18 inches.

At the noon weigh in, the results proved that the additional six feet of water have worked wonders for the game fish at Greenbelt. The difference between first place and tenth place was less than three pounds, and 36 anglers out of the 64 contestants brought keeper bass to the scales.

First place prize money of \$640 went to Gary Dziedzic of Clarendon with a three-bass limit that weighed 9.06 lbs. Dziedzic fished out of his classic 1964 Skeeter bass boat. This rig is best remembered for its revolutionary stick steering and low profile design that marked the beginning of the modern bass boat industry in America. And while many of the other contestants are now driving their 200 hp speed machines, it was Dziedzic puttin around with his 40 horse Skeeter who proved that a bass tournament is still a fishing contest and not a boat race.

Dziedzic caught all his winning bass with a black wacky worm. This worm is a straight piece of plastic without the normal curled tail on the end. He used just a tiny split shot to get the worm on the bottom in shallow water between two and four feet deep. He caught six keepers, and it was the last bass of the day that provided the winning margin.

Carlton Turvaville of Lelia Lake finished in the Top Ten with 8.05 lbs.

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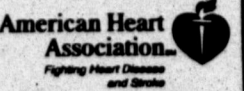

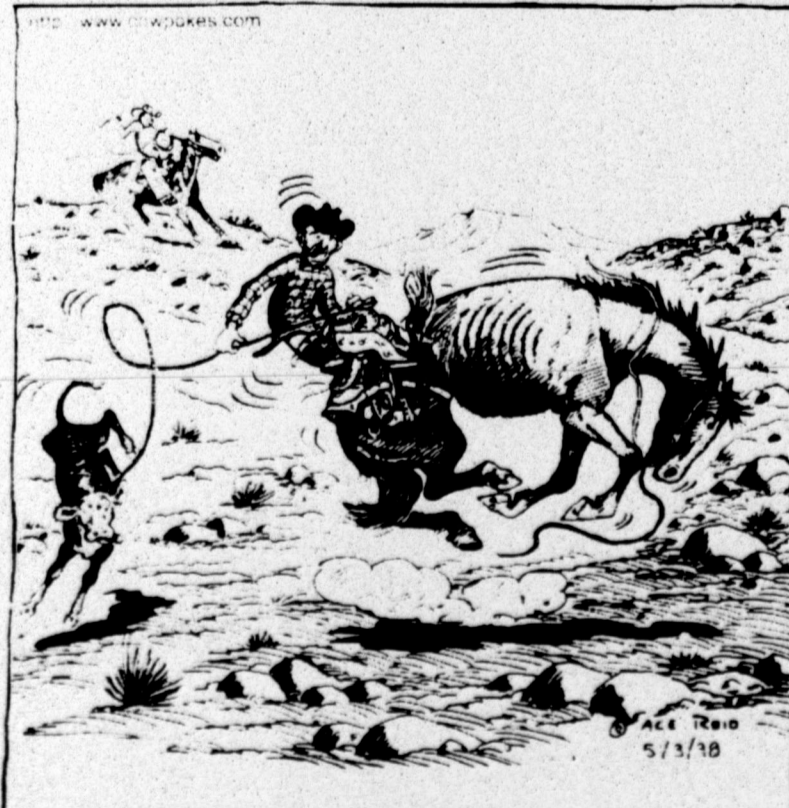

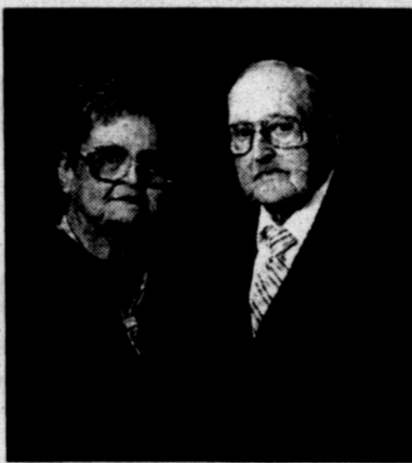

## Smith to make fourth trip to Austin for Lady Broncos

Senior Clarissa Smith will make her fourth trip to Austin in track and field as part of the Region 1-2A second-place sprint relay team that competed Friday and Saturday in Abilene.

The 400M relay team of Kathy Byrley, Kim Alexander, Stephanie Smith and Clarissa Smith earned one of two spots to compete in Austin May 15-16 for a state medal. The top two finishers advance to Austin.

The time of 50.74 was good enough for second place. The four-some ran a 50.90 for a fourth place time in the Friday prelims.

"We're very excited about the sprint relay getting an opportunity to go down to Austin - most likely the last state track meet to be held in Austin, as they've announced it will be moved next year," head girls track coach Steve Schmidt said.

"This will be (Clarissa's) fourth straight trip to the state meet. Not too many get to do this. The entire relay

ran very well, but she really made a great surge on the last leg to move us into the second position. She and her teammates really deserved it."

After one lap, the 800M relay team looked as if they also would make the trip to Austin, Schmidt said. "But a horrible exchange slowed us down just too much to make up. We finished a very respectable third (1:49.04), but it was obvious to the girls they should have been going to Austin in two relays, not just one."

The 800M relay team of Bryley, Alexander, Butler and Clarissa Smith ran a 1:48 in the Friday prelims.

The Lady Broncos ran a 4:19.0 in the prelims on the mile relay but couldn't repeat in the finals, finishing eighth with a time of 4:15.7.

"The mile relay had some of the best Class 2A girls teams I've seen from first through eighth," Schmidt said. "We were very pleased that this relay came up with its best time of the

year in the prelims on Friday; and that was during a brief storm where wind gusts blew down some tents and the awards stand."

"I think the girls were just too exhausted to match that performance Saturday. But they really competed hard, and we were actually in the top three to four after three laps." The strong presence of the relays gave Clarendon 28 points and a seventh place finish in Class 2A in Region I.

Clarendon struggled in the field events, Schmidt said. "They didn't go real well for us; you've got to come up with your best at a meet so competitive, and I don't think we handled the pressure too well."

"Kasi (Ashcraft) and (Alexander) both made the finals in the shot put, which is a great accomplishment to be in the top seven or eight in the whole region." Alexander finished seventh in the shot put with a throw of 34-5 1/2, and Ashcraft was eighth with an

attempt of 33-7 1/2. The senior Ashcraft was ninth in the discus with a heave of 95-2.

Clarissa Smith jumped 32-7 in the triple jump but did not qualify for the finals. "She tried hard in the triple jump, but we've really rested her the entire two weeks between district and regionals because of a foot injury. She was disappointed, but we wanted her to be ready to run her best and she certainly did."

This is Abdullah's third trip to Austin. He lost in the semifinals to a Columbian foreign exchange student in 1996 and won the tournament in 1997.

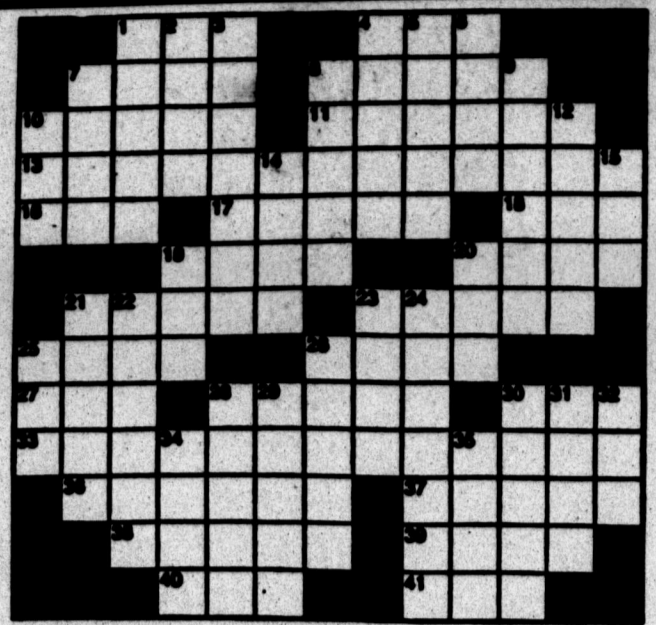

### Panhandle Beef Conference set for May 12

by Leon J. Church, County Agent

This year's Panhandle Beef Conference will be held on May 12 at the Amarillo Civic Center. The program will highlight forage management, performance evaluation of cattle, and outlooks for weather and markets.

Cool-season perennial forage production for cattle grazing is a topic of great interest in the High Plains. Dr. Vivian Allen, Texas Tech University, will recap her research and experiences with cool-season forages

in the South Plains area. Dr. Larry Redmon, Oklahoma State University, has planted and observed various cool-season forages in western Oklahoma. The combined observations of these experts will provide some insight for cool-season forage selection and management in the south and north plains areas of the Panhandle.

Dr. Ted McCollum, Extension Beef Cattle Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will report on the 1997-98 Ranch to Rail North program. Cattle from over 100 ranches in 6 states are enrolled in this year's program. Selecting breeding stock to sustain cow productivity but improve growth and carcass traits will be discussed by Mr. David Lust of West Texas A&M University. Trait selection and EPDs are among the tools that will be discussed.

Feedyard performance, carcass traits, cattle value and closeouts can be affected by implant programs. Dr. John Hutcheson, Hoechst-Roussel Vet, will address the economics of implants strategies in pasture and feedlot cattle.

Will El Nino continue for a while or subside? Mr. Ed Andrade, lead forecaster for the National Weather Service in Amarillo, will discuss trend in the weather for the Plains region. The program will close with Mr. Jim Sartwell of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service Giving the outlook for grain and cattle markets in 1998.

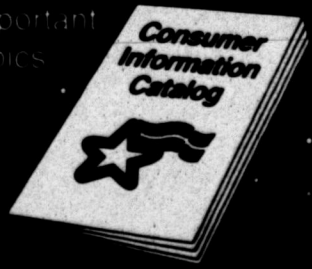

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### Texas EMS week is May 17-23

Imagine this: One morning on the way to work, you get caught in a traffic jam caused by a two-vehicle crash.

A hearse pulls up to the crash scene, one person jumps out and runs to check the injuries of the three victims. The lone attendant pulls a stretcher from the hearse, loads one deceased victim onto the stretcher and then into the hearse. The rescuer returns for a victim with crushed chest injuries and carries the man to the hearse, lying him on the floor beside the stretcher.

Next, he drags a 70 year old woman with broken legs to the front seat of the hearse. Carefully placing her in the passenger seat, the attendant tries not to cause more injury to the woman's legs. The attendant drives the hearse first to a local hospital emergency department, which may or may not have doctors on duty, and then on to the funeral home.

"Emergency medical response all across Texas has improved dramatically since the day of that crash some forty years ago," said Gene Weatherall, chief of Texas Department of Health's Bureau of Emergency Management.

Today, ambulances staffed with at least two trained and certified medics respond to medical assistance calls and at least one medic provides care to the patients during transport. Some ambulances are as well-equipped as hospital intensive care units. And 9-1-1 emergency calls can be made in every county in Texas.

Associated Ambulance Authority and TDH remind you and your family that emergency response teams provide a lifesaving link between ill or injured individuals and medical care.

"Nearly 50,000 trained and certified emergency personnel are part of Texas EMS," Weatherall said. "They respond to people in need and give the best emergency medical care possible. 
