DUE TO INCREASING costs in newsprint and in production. publishers of the Donley County Leader this week announced an increase in subscription prices. The new rates will go into a resounding 27-0 triumph. The effect after Saturday, October 26th.

The new rates are as follows: One years subscription in Donley County \$2.50 per year. One year's subscription to all Knight's team was a constant other points in the United States \$3.00 per year.
