Clarendon sees increased rebate

AUSTIN — State Comptroller John Sharp recently delivered a total of \$185.5 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,093 Texas cities and 118 counties, a 14.7 percent increase over the \$161.6 million allocated in June 1997.

The month's sales tax rebates include local sales taxes collected in April and reported by businesses filing monthly tax returns in May. "The long and steady increase in

consumer spending in Texas continues as jobs and new businesses remain plentiful," Sharp said. Sharp delivered monthly sales tax

rebates totaling \$170.1 million to Texas cities, 15.1 percent higher than June's payments.

Locally, Clarendon saw a 4.48 percent increase in its rebate for a total of \$15,535.87. Howardwick's rebate was \$1,476.52, up 1.72 percent from last year. Hedley, however, was down 3.45 percent for a \$506.51 rebate.

TSCRA new Horse Inspection Program to begin June 15

FT. WORTH — Texas and Southwestern Cattle tification database at TSCRA's Fort Worth Raisers Association's new Horse Identification (HIP) program will be up and running by June 15 says association President C. Coney Burgess.

"Our members identified this program as a priority during TSCRA's April convention, and we have focused all of our resources into getting it operational at the earliest possible date," says Burgess. "TSCRA is committed to providing the same exceptional theft prevention and investigation services for our members' horses as we have for their cattle for more than 120 years," Burgess promises.

"The value of a rancher's horse is measured by dollars and sense," says Burgess. "A horse is an essential working partner who develops a lot of cow sense and responds intuitively to act as one with the rider." That same bond exists with horses used for recreation—a \$1.7 billion industry in Texas.

Cornerstone of HIP will be the horse iden-

headquarters. A special form has been developed to describe the identifying characteristics of each horse. Included are the type-horse. burro, mule or donkey; sex-mare, stallion or gelding; breed; color; age; weight; height; markings on face and legs; brands, tattoos or electronic identification. Members may also send a quality 3" x 5" color photo of the horse to be digitally scanned into the database for reference.

If the horse is reported as stolen, this information will be faxed to slaughter facilities, listed in the TSCRA Theft Bulletin and made available to TSCRA's inspector force and other law enforcement agencies.

Critical to the recovery process are TSCRA's Brand Inspectors who are stationed at the two horse slaughter plants in Texas. These inspectors record information on each animal that passes through the plants and transfer the information to the headquarters database.

"Prompt reporting of a missing animal is crucial," declares Burgess, "to ensure that the descriptive information is in these inspectors' hands before the thief gets the horse to mar-

Members will receive wallet-sized cards with information on how to report theft of a horse which has been entered into TSCRA's Horse Identification Program database. Contact your local TSCRA inspector as listed in The Cattleman magazine as soon as possible. If you are unable to reach the inspector immediately, contact TSCRA headquarters and have the following information available to give to the person taking the report:

- TSCRA membership number (this number is the reference number for horses entered into the database).
- Police report number from your local law
- enforcement agency. Date of theft.

- · Location of theft. · Details of theft.
- · List of any physical evidence left at the
- Possible suspects or suspect vehicles.
- Any available witnesses.
- Others items taken in addition to horses. Burgess emphasizes that TSCRA may in-

vestigate only if the horses reported stolen meet the criteria of theft as defined in Section 31.03 of the Texas Penal Code or Title 21, Sec. 0.5. 1716 of the Oklahoma Penal Code. Horses on which there is a question of ownership due to civil dispute or civil litigation will not be considered stolen by TSCRA and will be held only pursuant to a court order which must be in the possession of a TSCRA inspector or other law enforcement agency having jurisdiction.

A TSCRA horse industry membership will cost \$80 per year — the same as a minimum

Texas highway system still the best, Sharp says

AUSTIN — In the latest edition of Fiscal Notes. state Comptroller John Sharp says that Texas has a time-honored tradition of superior roadways.

"Anyone who's taken a long driving trip knows first-hand how well our highway system compares to highways in other states," Sharp said. "And the maintenance of our state thorough fares is absolutely pivotal for this state to continue to advance economically."

The Texas Department of Transportation has calculated that the average cost of maintaining interstate highways is \$5,600 a year per lane mile. The average cost of new projects ranges from \$10,000 to apply one lane mile of a simple sealcoat to almost \$1.4 million to build one lane mile of a

"Texas has more interstate highway than any other state — about 3,200 miles of it, and it's hard to imagine life without it," Sharp said. "Without our interstate highway system, for example, the drive from San Antonio to El Paso would skirt the Rio Grande and likely take all day," Sharp said in the May issue of his award-winning monthly publication, Fiscal Notes.

In addition to federal money, Sharp noted that Texans contribute their share of funding for Texas' vast network of state and local roadways with the payment of motor fuels taxes, certain fees such as car registration, and property taxes.

"Federal studies show that Texas has had the highest volume of truck traffic in the nation since the passage of NAFTA in 1994," Sharp said. "In the last three years, truck mileage has increased by 19 percent, compared to a 12 percent growth in

"Most of I-35 within Texas now operates at or beyond its capacity, other major NAFTA arteries such as I-10 and U.S. 59 are feeling the brunt of burgeoning commercial traffic, and the full effects of NAFTA are yet to be realized," Sharp said.

Texans also rely on a network of wellmaintained farm-to-market roads, originally

envisioned as a means of connection between farflung farms and rural marketplaces.

While they are still a vital link for the state's agricultural producers, farm-to-market roads now account for more than half of the state's highway system-40,800 miles of it, and some are lined with retail businesses and upscale subdivisions. Supreme Court has turned religious freedom upside down

No one agrees with every decision the U.S. Su-But over the



past 30 years, the Supreme Court has taken a fundamental principle of our democracy and turned it upside down.

The principle is freedom of religion. Through a series of misguided rulings and questionable opinions, the Supreme Court has essentially determined

that the First Amendment of the Constitution doesn't so much provide for freedom of religion as it does for freedom from religion.

In 1992, for instance, the Supreme Court ruled that a rabbi broke the law by offering a prayer at a public school graduation. In 1985, the Court determined that a moment of silence in schools was forbidden because students might use that moment to - of all things - silently pray.

And in 1980, the Supreme Court ruled that the Ten Commandments couldn't be displayed at a public school because students might "read ... and obey" what they had to say. It's enough to boggle

Last week, the House of Representatives tried to reverse these rulings when it voted on the Religious Freedom Amendment.

While this amendment didn't receive the required two-thirds vote needed to pass, it did represent the first time in 27 years that a majority of the House voted to restore voluntary prayer to public schools. It also represents a first step toward restoring the First Amendment to what it was intended to be, which is why I believe we'll be debating this issue again at some point in the very near future.

How about a good biography for a change? I do not know of a more entertaining one than that which I randomly came across a couple of weeks ago in Burton Memorial Library.

Pioneer Preacher from the Texas Collection is a humorous, heartwarming biographical narrative of an early minister, George Carroll Berryman, written by his daughter, Opal Leigh Berryman. One of her purposes in writing the book was to recognize her father and all preachers who contributed rather quietly, but greatly, to the development of the West during the early part of the century, a time when gun slingers, lawlessness, and notorious outlaws dominated the scene.

George Berryman conducted pastorates in West Texas. Big Springs, Amarillo, Lobo Creek, La Mesa, Llano Estacado, Seminole, and Hobbs, New Mexico, no doubt, sound familiar.

The story begins on an October day as Preacher Berryman, in buggy with team, moves his wife and daughter to his new pastorate in Coke County. The book is flavored with western humor during travels as well as events during his preaching assignments.

The author adored her father. His sense of humor and positive attitude encouraged her willing assistance with any task he allowed. Even though gathering cow chips for fuel was not her favorite "chore," she told him she really didn't

mind. His reply? "We both mind. Where wood is so scarce, we are fortunate in having at hand the means of cooking and staying warm. But we don't have to retend we enjoy tidying up after a herd of cattle.

Berryman possessed a warm. fearless, friendly personality, and never turned anyone away. He was instrumental in eliminating saloons, cattle rustling, and Ku Klux Klan agitation against one of La Mesa's leading citizens. He was greatly concerned with personal successes and tragedies of his contacts.

Just after settlement in their new home, an embarrassment for Mrs. Berryman occurred when the light behind red curtains in the front window lured unexpected visitors. They were shocked to find the minister's wife as she was equally shocked to learn the purpose of their visit

Interaction between characters easily and colorfully portrays attitudes and happenings during this period of time. Intertwined is a murder mystery, cattle rustling, light romance in the life of a young girl, unexpectedly brought by her father to stay with the Berrymans in order to make a "lady" of her. Results are clever and surprising. Readers will chuckle at amusing events as well as become suspensefully involved in a dramatic climax in the life of this frontier preacher. Why not check it out?




