# Heavy Loss Sustained In Dormitory Fire

The Clarendon Public School system suffered a great loss early yesterday morning when a fire of undetermined origin broke out in the vicinity of the band room and swept through the entire north wing of the old Girls dormitory which houses the Home Economics Department, Agriculture Department and various other departments of the school. An electric clock in the band room stopped shortly after midnight but Merle Rattan, school janitor, who has living First Irrigation quarters in the south wing of the building, did not discover the fire until after 3 a. m.


# Commended



Maybe you read that recent a.ticle in a national magazine, claiming that American men don't really like the company of women. They just put them up on a pedestal and leave them there.





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
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
