FIRST CHRISTIAN CHURCH

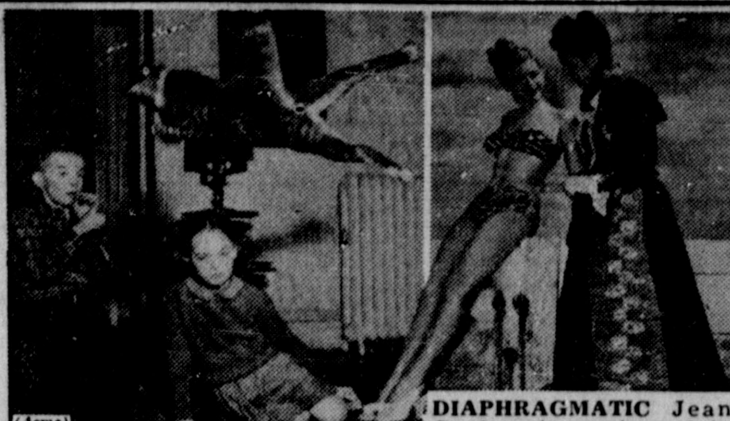

Flu Epidemic Over State

Reports coming in to the State Health Department from various sections of the State indicate that the number of influenza cases has

increased to epidemic proportions in many areas. The reported incidence this week is 11,624 cases, however, this represents only a fraction of the actual number of cases in the State since many cases are not receiving medical care, and therefore remain unreported. There were perhaps an estimated 200,000 cases of influenza this week in Texas.

Commenting on this situation today, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, said that most of these cases are mild and lend themselves to treatment readily. He pointed out that two cooperative factors are essential to victims of this disease; first, to call the family physician promptly when suspicious symptoms appear; and second, to take it easy for a reasonable length of time after the acute stage has subsided.

"It is essential to realize that influenza, no matter how mild

the attack, calls for a period of convalescence, because serious complications can occur if this important fact is ignored," Dr. Cox said. "Influenza is not mass-controllable. However, those persons who maintain the highest possible health level at all times, increasing their resistance to communicable disease germs, will have a protective advantage over those more careless persons who continually abuse their health."

The State Health Officer declared that living by the laws of nature, getting plenty of sleep, daily exercise in the open, nourishing foods and good personal hygiene offers the best known bulwark against all respiratory diseases and added that avoiding habits of any and all kinds detrimental to maximum well being is a wise course to take in the pursuit of good health.

HERE'S WHY PROFESSORS SEE TRIPLE

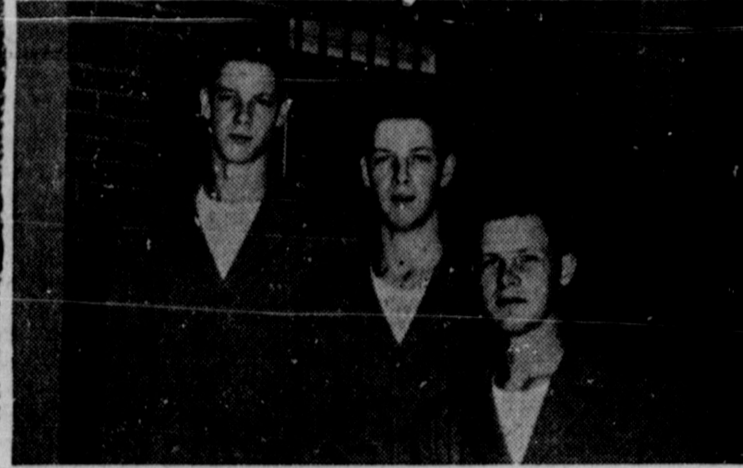

Devious Soviet Spy System Exposed By Former Red Aide

Devious methods of the Soviet espionage system are exposed in the March issue of Cosmopolitan magazine by Igor Gouzenko, former cipher clerk in the Soviet Embassy in Ottawa, Canada, whose disclosures of Russian attempts to obtain the secret of the atom bomb galvanized the western democracies into action and smashed some of the many Soviet spy rings active in Great Britain, Canada and the United States.

Nine persons have been arrested and imprisoned, and emergency conferences were held between Prime Minister Mackenzie King of Canada, President Truman and Prime Minister Attlee of Great Britain as a result of Gouzenko's electrifying exposure.

How Moscow induced high-ranking scientists in the western democracies to become members of the Soviet espionage ring and furnish information on atomic research is told in detail by Gouzenko, who states in part in the article:

"Each dossier (on prospective spies) was constantly kept up to date. It recorded the scientist's present assignment, his personal attitude toward Russia and toward his own government, his feelings about his superiors in the laboratory, his financial condition, and whether or not he needed, and would take, money.

"It described his friends, his family, his home life, his taste in clothes and recreation and his relations with other scientists. The dossiers on the atomic scientists, like the dossiers of all foreigners being considered for Soviet espionage work, paid particular attention to reputation.

"Anyone who was widely known among his friends or business associates as a 'Red,' or even as a Soviet sympathizer, made a poor spy, in Moscow's opinion. When an American or a Canadian agreed to work as a Soviet agent, he was instructed to keep away from Communists' meetings in the future and not to participate in left wing political movements."

Rigid control over the network of spy rings was maintained at all times by Moscow, according to Gouzenko, who tells of the head of one of the Canadian spy rings having to wire 4,500 miles to Moscow for permission to convey vital information to the head of another Russian spy ring who was seated right in the Ottawa office with him at the time.

The Leader received an announcement this week by Mr. Rayburn L. Smith that members of the Donley County National Farm Loan Association have been mailed checks representing a 5% dividend on their stock. He states that the aim of the Federal Land Banks, operating through locally managed associations, is to bring dependable loan

service to farmers and ranchers at the lowest possible interest rate. In 1946 borrowers in Donley County received a total of 10% in dividends, which brought the average cost of their money to only 3 34/100%.

Federal Land Bank loans may be secured to purchase land, pay certain agricultural indebtedness or to provide buildings and equipment. Mr. Smith states that at the present time a number of homes, farms, etc., are being financed with these loans.

The Republic of Ecuador Opens Up 124,000 Acres Land For Colonization

The Republic of Ecuador, in South America, announces its bid for colonists by opening up 124,000 acres of rich land for British and American colonization. This unusual offer has been made possible by Presidential Decree and the endorsement of

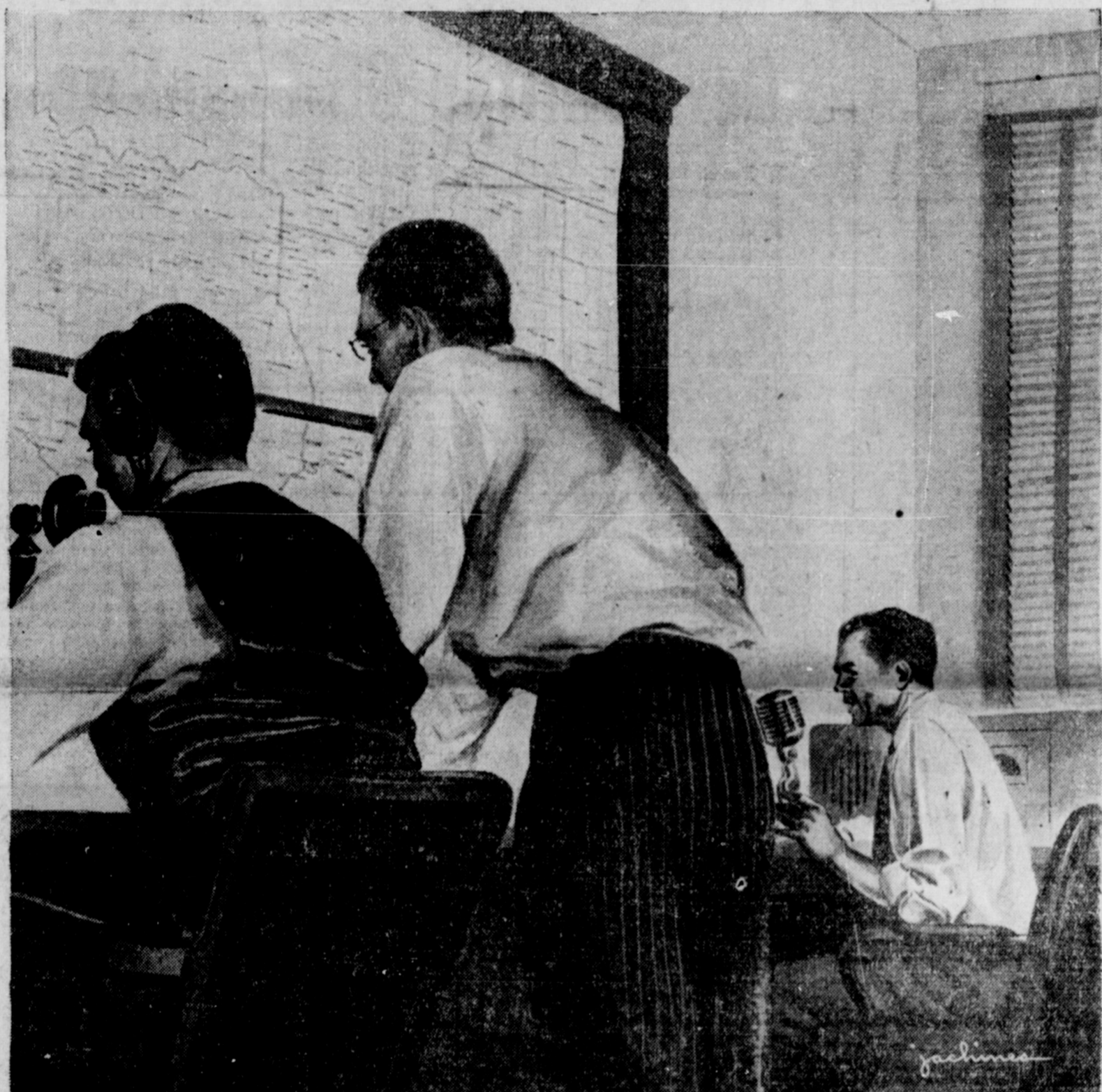
the Minister of Economy and Minister of Public Works. Every settler may obtain 124 acres of potential farm land, a townsite lot in one of two villages of the land concession located upon Ecuador's new, all weather high-

way that links the concession with Quito, capital city of the republic, and will soon link the colony with the port city of Esmeraldas on the Pacific coast. Married men, or heads of families, may have twice as much land, 248 acres.

Although crossed by the equator, this area of Ecuador enjoys a salubrious climate due to the cold antarctic Humboldt current which sweeps close inshore as it flows

north past this part of the country. The nearness of the snow-capped mountains in the central cordillera, also tend to create a climate that is ideal and with no extremes of either heat or cold in spite of the equatorial geographical location.

Soil experts state that the earth in this land concession is equal to that of Java, long recognized as the richest in the world. Java and Ecuador are about the same size,

yet Java supports fifty million people while Ecuador's total population is a scant three million. Among the crops that thrive to perfection upon this land are: Bananas, eleven different kinds; Oranges, Limes, Lemons, the delicious and healthful Papaya, Pineapple, Sugar Cane, Rice, Breadfruit, Coffee, Cacao (chocolate) and a host of other tropical fruits, vegetables and paying crops. The land is crossed by several streams and two rivers flow nearby. Natural wild rubber trees are scattered throughout the area.

The laws of Ecuador provide that settlers need pay no taxes on agricultural developments or land for five years. And even after that, they would enjoy Ecuador's extremely moderate taxes which are famous for their low rate, especially to agriculturists. Furthermore, the American and British settlers may retain their citizenship indefinitely.

A government owned and operated hospital is located near the British-American concession and serves the settlers. Not far distant live the picturesque tribe of peaceful Colorado Indians whose women-folk are noted for their beauty of face and grace of body.

Settlers are allowed to bring in to Ecuador, with them, all of their personal effects, household goods and agricultural equipment free of all customs duty charges.

The language of Ecuador is Spanish, but many of the better educated Ecuadorians speak English, and most of Ecuador's schools are teaching English to

the young people. During the late world war, Ecuador went all out to support the cause of the United Nations and much of the crude rubber and balsa wood, as well as vitally important quinine and other tropical crops that were desperately needed, came from Ecuador.

Top stands of magnificent tropical woods are to be found upon the land and settlers can use this for building purposes, selling the surplus at good local prices.

Under the same Presidential Decree that provides land in this concession for immigrant British and American settlers, a clause was included to make it possible for individuals to acquire land in the colony area as absentee owners. This clause enables business men or small syndicates to take over land here and have it operated for them, after it has been cleared and planted, as a commercial tropical crop and product investment. The absentee owner need not move to and live upon his land but can arrange to either have one of the resident settlers look after it for him, or appoint an authorized representative to work it for him.

Confirmation of the decree by the Ecuadorean Government may be obtained through the Ecuadorean Embassy in Washington or London, or from any Ecuadorean Consulate in North America or Great Britain.

Interested parties may obtain a thirty-six page pamphlet giving full and complete details of the land concession and colony, with

instructions on how they may obtain land either as settlers or absentee owners, by writing to the Government Co - Intermediary, Dr. J. M. Sheppard, Casilla 315, Quito, Ecuador, South America.

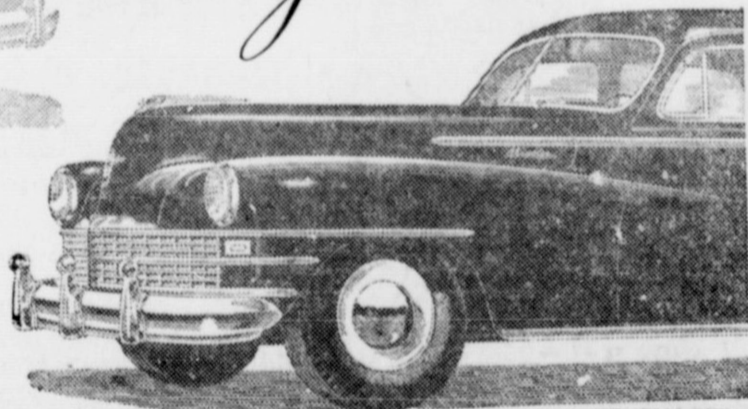



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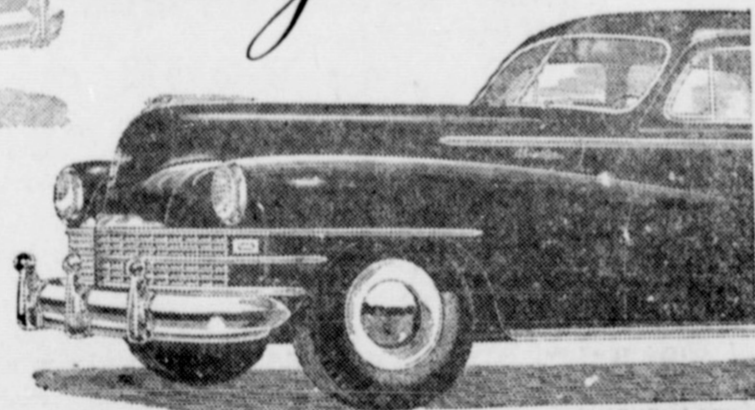


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
